



The Attorney General intended, in his speech, to frighten us all into such fear for our survival as a nation that we would all join in an eager chorus to support whatever extraordinary measures he might want to take to pro-

In pursuit of this purpose, Attorney General Mitchell made statements like

"Never in our history has this country been confronted with so many revolutionary elements determined to destroy by force the Government and the society

"The threat to our society from socalled 'domestic' subversion is as serious as any threat from abroad."

All these observations were made in the course of a speech in which Attorney General Mitchell was specifically defending the Nixon Administration's contention that it has the right to wiretap "dangerous" radicals without court ap-

Now that the speech has been delivered, the question is whether it so alarms us that we are willing to allow the Nixon administration to do as much wiretapping, and as much other possibly outside-the-law activity as it considers necessary in order to preserve the law.

The answer, for some of us at least, will be that we are more frightened by Mr. Mitchell's importunate demand for extra-legal powers and practices in order to protect us than we are by his assessment of the strength and number and importance of the forces seeking to destroy us by domestic subversion.

The trouble is that, while we may feel that this whole nation together has a chance, operating out of its own traditional instincts and common sense, of dealing successfully with today's generation of bum-like radicals, who have yet to demonstrate real control of or influence upon anything, we are much less sanguine and confident about how we would ever de-fang or banish certain terrible powers once they had been conceded to the potential ruthlessness of government officials whose pants hold shape better than some of their ideas.

The Attorney General gives an illusion of being an extremist who is ready to deal with other extremists, with extremist evaluations and methods of his own. We would almost as soon trust the radicals to spare us as trust him to save us. What we really trust, and what we must all continue to trust, is indeed a silent majority which one must hope still exists-of level heads and civilized instincts and decent feelings about other human beings.

Time For An Income Tax The long deadlock on a state tax program — the deadlock that has made a special session of the legislature necessary — may yet result in a better tax program than either the Republican governor or the Democratic legislature interests.

Gov. Meskill has proposed a 40 per cent increase in the state's sales tax, which would rise to 7 per cent from the present 5 per cent. This would make it one of the highest in the nation. In addi-tion, he would expand the sales tax to

The Democrats' tax proposal is hardly better. It includes a 10 per cent tax on personal income from interest, dividends and capital gains, but not on wages and

As many semior citizens of the Valley have pointed out, such a tax would fall heavily on retired or disabled persons who depend on investment income to support them in their old age. It seems unfair that those who, for one reason or another, cannot work should be taxed while those who can work and earn a good living should escape. So neither the governor's plan nor the


Democrats' plan seems equitable. However, some political observers be-lieve that out of the deadlock between governor and legislature may emerge a state income tax. This would be the fairest, simplest and least painful way of raising the large amounts of money the state needs to balance its budget.







The rules and regulations of the District's fire companies may allow qualified persons residing outside the District to become members of a fire company on application to the president and directors for such appointment with the prior approval of the fire chief and a majority of the members of the fire company. The president and directors may contract with the Town of Manchester to furnish fire protection for areas of the Town of Manchester outside the boundaries of the District or may contract with the Town of Manchester within the District's boundaries.

The District shall not sell any real or personal property until opportunity shall be given for competitive bidding under such rules and regulations as the president and directors may establish. All moneys received from any such sale shall be paid to the District treasurer. The president and directors may waive the requirement of competitive bidding when, in their opinion, circumstances of a particular case and the business interest of the District should permit its waiver, and a majority of the president and directors in the case of such waiver shall put such waiver in writing and the reasons there-

Section 10. ANNUAL BUDGET. The president shall prepare an annual budget for the District and shall submit the same to the board of directors for its approval, which budget shall be presented at the annual meeting. The budget may provide for a contingent fund to be appropriated annually as limited by the provisions of the general statutes. Any expenditure from the contingent fund may be made by the president and directors for any proper use of the District. The president and directors may make transfers from one appropriated budget item to another, provided, however, the sums expended shall not exceed the total budget appropriation.


