HARTFORD (AP) — Leaders of the General Assembly, two weeks into a special session and rushing toward a July 1 deadine, meet again this afternoon in an attempt to fashion a state budget that Gov. Thomas J. Meskill will accept.

When Friday's starting session of a third round of negotiations broke up after 11 p.m., there were signs of compromise but also indications of the stubborn disagreement that has blocked progress since the regular session ended June 9.

"I think a great deal of progress was made," Democratic State Chairman John M. Balley said to newsmen after the talks recessed for the night.

The results of resort to such remedies are seldom prompt and atisfactory, but they are the methods of a democratic society and to be preterred, even when their immediate result may seem inferior, to any attempt to locate the ultimate political power in

The Lesson Of The Documents to snarl ourselves into over-doing the

Because the various newspapers of the country will rightly see it as their duty to publish what comes out, and because the Nixon Administration, for its part, rightly conceives it to be its own responsibility to defend the idea that there can and must be some governmental control of governmental secrets, the business of getting and publishing all the contents of the Pentagon study is going to take a long time and a lot of space. Pretty soon, one can guess, the public is going to be indifferent to the Pentagon disclosures as it was to the original things the Kennedy and Johnson administrations did in the course of their not so secret, even then, ever deeper involvement in Vietnam.

The truth is that much of what is now being disclosed was at least being rumored or alleged back when it was

The supreme importance of the current Pentagon disclosures is that they have provided the cold, textual, docunentary proof that what was suspected or rumored or leaked then was actually

the disclosures was actually accomplished almost as fully as it ever needs to be

the first three days of the New York Times publication of these documents.

The interpretation or evaluation which accompanied these documents, aside from its service in locating their place in the chain of events, had no conclusive importance. The important thing was that the American people had the chance to read, word for word, what the braintrusters of the period were saying and writing to one another and to their superiors as they took their fling at running the world, which they considered, they probably confided to one another, their ineluctable duty because of the great unlimited power of their country and their own superior intelligence.

The appearance of these documents has been enough, in itself, to confirm the fact that this nation was being led by a brand of intellectual madness, in which morality was nonsense, the truth merely a hazard, and the public a big fat moron that must be deceived for its This is what we now know. There is

not much more we really need to know. Yet the process of disclosure and revelation is obviously fated to go on and on, with or without court permission, until we have turned over every last policy discussion and decision made during this period of history and examined every wriggier we find underneath it. We are bound to get bored, pretty soon, by the next instance of what so and so really did while such and such a deed was being perpetrated. We are likely to begin to forget the real point of the whole disclosure because we are being swamped by subsidiary cir-

We can imagine no way of shutting off the business of further disclosure. We do calculate that the more quickly it can be accomplished and passed through the public scrutiny on its way to the historians the better it will be from every

What should come out of it all? Surely not any witch hunt in which we try to convict certain leaders of some special kind of guilt for the mess we are in Any witch hunt would have to begin

with Mr. Ordinary American, who didn't give a hoot what was really going on no matter how often he was invited to suspect what it was like. The only hope that can be expressed

-the kind of hope that human experience renders so very faint it almost seems unforgivably naive to express it care of our own proper business in the future. It is our proper business to inourselves when the information is available, to care when questions of morality in governmental conduct are raised, to avoid that worst of all surrenders, the surrender of our own right to know and our own duty to care in favor of deputizing borderline business

Common Sense And Electricity The warmer parts of the United States have just had their first breath of full summer heat. With it have come the now usual pleas from various public authorities for people to "save electricity." This is all fine and commendable. And Presi-dent Richard Nixon has approached an-other angle of the problem with various proposals for increasing old and new

cources of energy.

Given an unusual degree of self-control (for which Americans are not notorious) and rapid response to the President's proposals (which is unlikely), it is theo-retically possible for the larger Ameri-can cities to look forward sometime to a summer when supply and demand will be in balance even in the full heat of summer. And that would bring that millennial thing of which many now dream
— a summer without "brownouts." But it will certainly be a "midsummer

right's dream' this summer, and prob-ably for many to come. And this points straight to an inclination of Americans o do some pretty silly things. One of the stiffiest is to allow anyone who wishes to go in installing new air-conditioning systems in buildings, pub-lic and private, when there simply isn't going to be enough electricity to run all the air-cooling devices already installed let alone those being rushed into place

There are two means of bringing sup-ply and demand back into quick balance The classic way would be to allow the power companies to raise their rates on electricity to the point where the demand would slacken down to the level of available supply. This could have the extra advantage of providing the funds for building new sources of supply. Or the sale of new electricity-consum-

ing appliances could be taxed to the point where sales would drop off and allow supply to catch up with demand. The British once used a horsepower tax to cut down the size of automobiles on their

limited road system.

Brownouts could be avoided this summer by either method. The old interplay of supply and demand could still work, allowed to do so. But for those unwilling to be that "conservative" there is alvays the power to tax.

Using either device would be common
