



An Ultimate In Cruel And Unusual lay, that it will hear cases in its next term in order to give an answer to one specific question, as follows:

"Does the imposition and carrying out stitute cruel and unusual punishment in violation of the Eighth and Fourteenth

The Eighth Amendment says simply: Excemive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted."

The Fourteen Amendment, drawn and ratified after the Civil War to strengthen the guarantees for equal treatment of all Americans, included the provision: "No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or imnunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws."

After hearing arguments in which the foca of capital punishment will undoubtedly try to prove that it is somewhat cruel and unusual, and arguments in which they will also try to prove that equally among a state's citizens, the Supreme Court will have its chance to find that capital punishment is unconstitu-

Meanwhile, by the nature of the other decision Monday in which it set aside death sentences for a special 39 of the 669 persons now under sentence of death in this nation's prisons, the Supreme Court added measurably to the technical difficulty of getting the death penalty erdict in the future. In these 39 cases, utomatic exclusion, from the juries which tried and convicted them, of jurors who might not believe in the death penalty. Obviously, if people who do not believe in capital punishment cannot be kept off murder juries, the death penalty is going to be more difficult to
