Hasn't A Line Been Set?

There should come an end, sooner or ater, to the search for new legal devices to try to establish additional flow of public money into private, religiou ly-oriented schools.

Such a search ill becomes either the church which is maintaining such schools, or the legislative body or the political regime which is trying to prove friendly to such search.

There is a cumulative suggestion, in the latest Supreme Court rulings on the subject of state and federal aid toprivate schools, that the limits now outlined ought to be made permanent, and struggled against no longer.

This nation, and its various political units, ought to maintain the separation of church and state as a separation, and not seek, nor be asked, to transform it into such a union that the life and death of the private school can ever come to depend upon the public tax dollar.

It is sometimes argued that such public policy may, in the end, cost the public, by forcing upon the public tax dollar the expense of providing the education the private schools have been providing.

But the argument should not become, and financing.

The important thing is that there is a principle at stake, a principle established in the Constitution itself, and rede fined and reinterpreted but never abandoned, by various decisions of the Supreme Court,

The object should be to follow the right principle, whatever and wherever the cost, and this should apply both to those who want to provide a special kind of schooling for their own children and to those who want to keep church and state from those mutual entanglements the document which is the foundation of this nation's experiment in self-governing democracy declared to be beyond our proper law and practice.

Secrets The Times Didn't Publish

Strangely enough, no one, not even the New York Times itself, that we have oticed, has tried to make any comvarison between what that newspaper did with its Pentagon papers in 1971 and what it did with its secret advance knowledge about the Bay of Pigs back in the year 1961.

Then the Times had information about the preparation of a force designed to make a landing in Cuba with the hope of overthrowing the Castro regime, and then the New York Times decided that it would not be in the national interest for it to disclose the information it had.

The New York Times censored itself, the Bay of Pigs invasion went ahead, and became a terrible and costly failure, not only in itself and in the disastrous end of that particular venture, but also in its influence on the future pattern of American policy and behavior.

For it was President John Kennedy's bitter sense of failure in the Bay of Pigs episode which helped build up, in him, his sense that he must meet and face the Communist world in some other confrontation, just to prove that he was not chicken, and that his country was not weak and futile. From that failure in the Bay of Pigs, which the New York Times policy of secrecy permitted to happen, stemmed some of President Kennedy's drive into two confrontations. One of these, the Cuban missile crisis. he won, in dramatic fashion. The other rontation he sought and accepted, in Vietnam, is with us yet, and, in some of rdest aspects, not too far from

In 1961, on the other hand, the interference of publication with the national security would have been very clear. Publication of what the Times knew then would have had the obvious result of rendering impossible a classified secret military operation which had been designed, financed, authorized and directed by our highest national officials.

Publication would have so violated the national security that the Bay of Pigs operation would have had to be abandon-

Isn't that another way of saying that publication in 1961 would have been even more in the mational interest, even though it clearly invaded vital policy territory, than the publication in 1971 has been?

Using our hindsight, couldn't we judge that the Times had an even higher obligation to publish its secrets then?

Spain's Backward Youth

Spanish psychiatrist is in trouble with the Spanish rightist dictatorship because he has been conducting sex surveys among Spanish students. He may go to jail, which would be a wicked, reactionary thing for the Franco govern ment to do to him.

Meanwhile, we are given some indica tion of the kind of statistic -seemingly shockingly deplorable to his expert judgment - that has been resulting from his

The Spanish psychiatrist has found that sexual instruction is all but nonexistent in Spanish middle and uppermiddle class homes. Only seven per cent of the students responding to his surveys ever learned from their families, their schools, or their priests how bables are

Perhaps because of just such a woeful lack of instruction, there were a number of students who had never "so much as kissed anyone." There was an "astonishing" amount of total innocence of sexual experience.

Judging by these statistics, things look rather dark for the future of Spain.

Still, we venture the optimistic point lack of instruction and early practice the young people of Spain will sooner or blunder their way into a chance discovery of enough sex to suffice.
