

Swimmers, Shellfish Suffer in the Sound

HARTFORD (AP) - It has become almost routine to receive bad news about pollution in Long Island Sound, and anyone who has swum off Hammonasset Beach-among othersdoesn't need convincing that the water is filthy. But Connecticut citizens are

far from apathetic, says Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, who recently toured several shoreline areas. The people are reacting with "concern and emotion," he said, "about how the shellfish are dying off or are too riddled with oil and sewage to be edible, about the marshlands and the commercial encroachments upon them, about the industrial and human wastes that pollute the waters of the Sound so swimming and boating can be a hazard to

health. The latest possibilities for arousing emotion and concern. were revealed this week by the state Health Department and the federal Environmental Protec-

tion Agency. The Health Department said 12 more areas of the Connecticut coast have been closed to shell

The EPA said shellfish in New

Haven harbor and vicinity show heavy concentrations of oil since a massive oil spill last January. The EPA study said samplings of oysters and other shellfish before the spill and as late as March 11 "confirmed the presence of higher concentrations, in

samples taken after the oil spill.' The study also said even higher concentrations of oil might have been discovered if the later sampling had been taken during warmer weather.

The oil spill referred to happened Jan. 23 when the Esso tanker Gettysburg reportedly hit an underwater obstruction, rupturing part of her hull and spewing forth 327,000 gallons of No. fuel oil. The 12 areas closed to shellfishing because of possible contamination of the animals by

It's The Documents Which Count Today's "Inside Report" by Novak and Evans on this page contains an interesting and devastating assault on the past-experiness of Daniel Ellaberg, the individual who gave the Penbagon papers to the New York Times.

The attack is interesting and devastating, but it is also far wide of the main point involved in the whole episode of the Pentagon papers.

Novak and Evans can prove that Ellaberg was an unreliable individual expert on Vietnam. Walt Rostow can claim that the New York Times drew the wrong conclusions from the papers it published. William Bundy can write in Newsweek that, since the unpleasant process has begun, now the whole truth ought to be brought out. The Supreme Court itself can differ about whether the New York Times was acting patriotically or even legally when it published the papers vithout consulting with the government

But all of this, although fascinating, is really side issue.

The motives, character, patriotism, ethics of those involved in the publication of the Pentagon papers have nothing to do with the content of the papers hemselves.

We could send everybody connected with the publication to prison for life, and the documents would still be saying what they say.

And what these documents say, that is mportant, and impressive, is not anying interpretation the Pentagon authors themselves, or New York Times accompanying text, may have provided.

The whole case, the whole nature of our policy in Vietnam, is adequately contained in the actual texts of the messages and memoranda the braintrusters and the policy makers of the period were exchanging with one another.

Rostow in his own words, the Bundys in their own words, the generals in their own words - these are the revelations no amount of argument over the motivation of other individuals and newspapers and no amount of frantic intellectual revision by their now embattled authors can alter or cause to fade. We were never supposed to know all this was going on; we do know, and the knowledge is terrible, and will remain terrible, no matter how ingenious the efforts, from now on to divert us into side issues.

Free And Equal On His Own

It is possible that, in these two last troubled decades, there were those of his own race whose enthusiasm for the talent of Louis Armstrong was diminished by their regret over his failure to play a more dramatic role in the field of civil liberties. Perhaps some thought of him as an "Uncle Tom" because he did not take the fame and fortune he had won from the world of whites and try to cash it in for some gains for the whole black community.

Perhaps this was a flaw, a shortcoming in the character of the great musician. If so, it was one for which there was a logical forgiveness.

He himself had, beginning in a day when modern crusading action about civil liberties and racial equalities had not yet become a dominant theme in American living, managed to achieve a style of life in which he always seemed free and always seemed equal.

Perhaps, indeed, he should have turned around more and looked at those other blacks to whom no such minaculous conquest of the world was possible, and reached back more of a hand to

But perhaps, too, he was making his own best contribution to the cause by roviding the personal example for which he was gifted and of which he was capable. It may be a question for philoophical debate, in some future peaceful era for this nation, whether Louis Armstrong did more sociological good with his untrammeled art than he might have lone with less art and more agitation and crusading.

Whatever that future answer, the actual conduct of his life leaves the undiluted excellence of his art clearly before us. It was superb, and caught hearttrings and lighted the hopes and imagiations of a more decent world even while it celebrated the beauty and pathos and wistfulness of the world as it

Making The Desert Bloom

The oldest Israeli dream is to make the desert blossom - and perhaps the second oldest is to export techniques to the Arabs. Now a genial, sprightly pro-fessor of botany has found a way of making both come true. He can grow anything from peaches to camel-fodder in the desert without using a drop of piped water, and he has found a "back, stairs" method of getting the message across the border

The system is cheap, devastatingly simple, and I have eaten enough of the professor's peaches and pistachio nuts to testify that it works-unless he cheats by night with a watering can, which

For 10 years, Professor Michael Eve nari of the Hebrew University has worked in small experimental plots. Now he has borrowed 1,200-acres of desert from a Bedouin sheikh, just south of Beersheba, and begun planting it with saplings and seedlings .

As they grow, young scientists from Surope and America will learn the process. They will come on internationa acholarships, paid for by Germa churches and Swiss charities, which will later send the scientists out as instruc tors to countries that need to know which means principally Arab countries. The principle behind Evenari's method is far from new. King Solomon and his ccessors used it three thousand years ago. So did the Nabateans, who supportdesert cities on the same mis able three inches of rain a year that the Israelis have to make do with. (Evenar vehemently denies that there's been a change of climate since then). The Romans took the system over from the labateans. Only when the nomadic bedouin occupied the desert in the seventh century did the technique die out.

It works, because the yellow, sandy soil which covers much of the Negev, Sinai, Sahara, and similar deserts forms a crust which seals in rainwater and stops it from evaporating. All you need to do is clear your plot of stones and build a shallow dyke to keep in the rainwater. On the 363 or so days when it does not rain, your fields will look as arched as any other patch of desert. underneath the crust the moisture will be so well sealed that your plants can survive even a year of total drought. Evernari began by reconstructing an laborate system of channels, on an original Nabatean farm that had a catchment area many times the size of its fields. With immediate success he grew pricots, peaches, nuts, peas, sunflow ers, oil seeds, asparagus, loganberries, seed onions, and various kinds of fodder

Then he improved on the old system niniaturising it. In self-contain loro-catchments," each big enough or two or three trees, the system work d even better because there was less through evapo

At this level the beauty of the idea is ts cheapness and simplicity. "An Arab amily, with a respectable number of sons and daughters to do the work, can set it all up with no hired labour - for a one-time investment of less than eight ounds an acre," Evenari claims.

The system is of more relevance t rabs than Israelis. Evenari began his work in the Ben-Gurion days, when desert agriculture ranked second only to deence in Israeli priorities. But the Negev ibbutzim, including Ben-Gurion's own 3de Boker, make little economic sense. While the rest of Israel produces more vegetables than it knows what to do with, there is no point in growing more

indusrry is now the watchword for deloping the Negev - although because of Isreal's chronic meat shortage, there still scope for using the Evenari method for pasture. But for the Arabs - and much of India and Pakistan as well the method could make a revolution. "They could graze 20 to 50 times as many sheep, goats, or camels as they do today - without artificial water," Eve-


Evenari belongs to the "nouvelle ague" in development economics, which holds that new countries waste huge amounts of money on prestige projects like dams, while development a grass-roots level is largely ignored. But his criticism is not reserved for eigners. "In Israel we waste between 0 and 40 per cent of the water we have by overwatering."
