Freedom, Plus Responsibility The defense of the principle of the reedom of the press does not always enjoy the luxury of having a perfect use of that freedom by the press to defend In our opinion, the CBS documentary on "The Selling of the Pentagon" was

a flawed exercise of freedom of the press. We would rather have had it made as it was than not made at all, We regretted, however, that it could not have been made and presented with, shall we say, a less obvious selection of the facts that were to be allowed to

speak for themselves. The program was, for us, a mixture of courageous, enterprising hold it up to the morning sun. journalism and a failure to live up fully to the responsibility the press should al-

ways keep paired with its freedom. That being admitted, we think it right that the House of Representatives at Washington has apparently now diverted itself from its threatened attempt to turn itself into censor and investigator of the news, which would have been the real meaning of any vote to censure CBS for failing to disclose to Congress the Jawn at least enable us to compile a actual details of the way its program was prepared.

The freedom of Congress, or anybody if the day is not too full of an insistent else, to criticize is as much a part of wind drawing the moisture out of every. our general freedom as any privilege thing. Eventually, of course, it has to anteed the press. But to criticize is one thing, and to punish and penalize is another. Criticism is freedom; punshment could be dictatorship.

Criticism has now been made, Congress and elsewhere, and in CBS and everywhere else in the world of the media the lesson has been duly noted. One can be quite sure that the present generation of CBS executives and producers will never again make a docunentary the way they made this one. One can be sure that discussion of this case has led to a sharpened alert, through all the media, television, radio, newspapers, and magazines, to the dangers and the guilts of "arranging" the news. And the leading danger is, of course, that the average listener, viewer, or reader can usually tell when it is

being attempted. CBS has been criticized, and sobered, and all the media have been alerted. and yet the principle of the free press, without which we would have something much worse than an occasional tilting of a documentary, has been left intact. This seems to us a good way to end this particular controversy.

Military news from the Mediterranean area during the past few months would seem to reflect planning somewhat less recent than that. Instead of planning for World War II, everybody seems fascinated by the possibilities of refighting the wars between the Greeks and the Persians, or Rome and Carthage

Consider, if you please, the way both the United States and Russia crowd their rival naval squadrons into these seas, chase each other around in a daily business of bluff and brinkmanship, and pretend both fleets couldn't be annihilated by land-based air

power long before they managed to exhange blows between themselves. Or take Malta, the historic island so central to all the past military and naval history of the Mediterranean, and the way it is trying to charge Britain higher prices for its bases there. In World War II, Malta still had enough importance to be the target of Italian and

German bombing again and again. But if one were to suppose there were to be a new war in the Mediterranean, any of us could solve to our own satisfaction the game of pretending that Malta simply did not exist. It wouldn't make any difference

whether Malta existed or not, just as it makes no military difference, any longer, who holds Gibraltar.

But we are forgetting how the game is to be played. The Phoenicians, in their westward expansion, considered Maita strategic, and somebody probably fortified Gibraltar against them, and it is probably true today that Russia would consider it something o a great triumph if it gets its fleet invited into Maltese harbors, along with or in place of the British or the American fleets. Isn't Russia, just like the earliest imperialistic navigators, considering the occupation of some tiny sland in the middle of the Indian Ocean as if that would be the key to the future control of that whole ocean? And isn't the United States considering some possible counter measure, like, perhaps getting to the same island first?

It might be almost reassuring to have the world's great powers playing such ancient and relatively unsophisticaled games with one another, if it weren't for the fact that, should they happen to flare into something while moving their toy fleets around, the fight ing would be done from and into the very bowels of the earth, by computer. \_\_\_\_\_

### The Dew Gauge

We casual observers will never really know whether the spiders on our lawns work just as hard through nights when clouds prevent the fall of the dew as they do on the nights when, under clear skies, the dew is likely to be heavy.

All we know is that, when th heavy dew does fall, there are, stretch ed here and there about the lawn, webshaped patches of spider strand strong enough to catch and hold the dew and

The webs may be there, catching in sects - and what a catch there should be in this, the liveliest of insect years -every night in the summer, and we wouldn't know it, unless there were dew being caught, too.

This year, when our rain gauges have been rendered practically useless because there are so few falls to measure, the fairy handkerchiefs on the record of the dews. One heavy dew will nourish a garden for one summer day, rain. But the morning web-catch' can, meanwhile, be proof that the moisture is up there, all right, if we can merely figure out some way of getting it down.

### **Those White Moths**

For human beings, there is something both repugnant and foreboding about the multitudes of white linden moths which have appeared within the last few days. But for the birds, the moths have been a bounty. Starlings, grackles, sparrows and even robins have been observed with the white winged moths projecting from their bills. As exterminators, the birds are eager

but inadequate simply because the moths are so numerous. The most voracious appetites and the utmost energy of the birds cannot cope with the clouds of moths which have emerged from the heavy infestation of span worms, the late spring scourge.

The span worms, together with the gypsy moth larvae, accounted for an almost unprecedented defoliation of thousands of trees, - oak, birth, maple, nd others. In some areas the trees were stripped so completely as to appare s barren of leaves as trees in mid-winter. The adults of the gypsy moth have yet to appear. They are not so conspicious as the wihte linden moths, although the larvae are fully as destructive. The adult moths do not eat, of course; their function is simply to mate ; then the female lays eggs which will hatch next year into the caterpillars which devour the leaves. In their larval state, the linden moths were repulsive; in their adult stage, they are foreboding. Their very whiteness arouses aversion. The color white in nature commonly inspires fear.Ghosts traditionally, are white; Moby Dick, Herman Melville's animistic incarnation o evil, was a white whale; tuberculosis was familiarly referred to as the white plague, and a translucent whiteness was egarded as a mark of leprosy. The clouds of white moths which flutter like wraiths about the landscape now will be gone within days, but their ghosts will not be so easily laid. Unless some steps are taken, their offspring will wreak not merely annoyance but serious economic destruction next spring. -



(AP) - President Nixon's surprise announcement that he will visit Communist China brought followup word from the Western White House today that the trip will take place well in advance of next May 1.

In announcing Thursday night that he had accepted an invita-tion from Premier Chou En-lai to go to Peking, Nixon said the ourney would be undertaken before next May.
