Where China Could Help Any evaluation of the President's anouncement Thursday night has to consider the possibility, even a probability, that as much good will come of the proposed trip to Peking before it is actually

undertaken as might be hoped for as a result of any confrontation itself. The President's emissary to Peking, Dr. Kissinger, didn't just develop, in Pakistan, an imaginary tummy ache and a desire to visit China. The arrangement for his trip, like the arrangement now for the President's, was part of a new diplomacy which China itself had

By making his own personal response to this new atmosphere inside China, President Nixon has given his own strong, clear signal that he is both willing and hopeful.

He gives this signal at a time when there is already some new kind of fluidithing with a more creditable intent, in the peace position taken by Hanoi.

China itself has, through one of its Australian visitors, suggested that it is now willing to play a part in a Genevatype international conference to try to resume jurisdiction over affairs in Vietnam. The importance of this is that it might lead toward the kind of international supervision and guarantee of cease fire after American troops had left which would clear the way for President Nixon to accept Hanol's deal proposing joint American withdrawal and release of American prisoners. For the United States to retire with a clear conscience from the mess it has helped create in Vietnam there has to be the establishment of some international guarantee against renewed or continuing bloodshed. China could help create and give such a guarantee.

It may happen, some day, that China itself is once again a leader of world civilization, peaceful in tis own continent. In such case, the temporary role of the United States on the Asian mainland may have faded into history as merely one more, and perhaps the last, of the colonial-style intrusions which China's own periods of weakness and division have so often invited. It should be in China's own interest to have us able to make a graceful exit and President Nixon's journey to Peking, when it comes, may signal not any new move into Asia, but the fact that we have already gone home.

and doing nothing more important, also research and introspect ourselves into some determination of what we really like and care about, and what we would never miss if we never saw it or experienced it again.

And let us, while we are at it, and have nothing more pressing to do, decide, to our own satisfaction at least, all those questions which have been clattering around on the edge of our mind all these years. What do we believe? What is our own nature? Are we optimists? Or have we merely been leading lives noisy desperation?

Do we really have any very deep ideas about how the country ought to be run or how the economy ought to be set up, or how people should deal with one an-

If we have, we ought to take a little more time off and ask ourselves just what we think we ought to do to come closer to our own ideals in such re-

But the important thing would be for is all to stay on strike -all of us -until we couldn't stand not going back to work again. Perhaps, in that moment, we would sense some voluntary compact among ourselves which would seem good enough to inspire us to enjoy what we were doing, and fantastic thought indeed, even consider work itself, of the right sort, of course, a privilege.

We have been seeking no state or Federal aid for religious purposes, but only for the secular purpose of schools which do benefit greatly the local communities and the State of Connecticut. Following this recent decision, the

crisis of the nonpublic schools has deepened. The 1971-72 school year will be one of critical decision. If during the next school year, a constitutional plan of state aid is developed in accord with the Supreme Court tests, then parochial schools will continue to help the state and taxpayers on a broad scale. Short of such aid. I see ahead only widespread closings of parochial schools in the archdiocese, to the detriment of the common good, freedom of choice in education, and wishes and rights of many parents. On this difficult question there has been shown much good will to Connecticut. There is presently widespread sympathy for the plight of these schools. Officers said another 10 miners were feared trapped under piles of dirt about 1,148 feet underground. The cause of the cave-in remained unknown.

Sumitomo spokesmen said a gas explosion in the same mine on May 16, 1989, killed 17 miners. The mine is at Utashinai, about 66 miles northeast of Sapporo on the northern Japanese island of Hokkaido.


