

Of Walls And Men

Along with the macabre anniversary of the erection of the Berlin wall, there was a flood of public discussion about it. all of which characterized the infamous wall as if it were an abnormality in human affairs.

And so indeed, cutting its way through the heart of a great city, the Wall does seem an abnormality, cruel and inhuman and illogical.

Yet, in one of the comments from a West Berliner on the occasion of the 10th anniversary of the Wall, there comes an unsettling suggestion.

"We got used to it," said this West Berliner. "Human beings can get used to almost anything."

While we pause on the verge of resentment of any such statement, or any such condition, we find ourselves being drawn into an even more discouraging possibili-

What if, after all, human beings really like walls?

What if, instead of being classified as a cruel abnormality, the Berlin Wall should be considered just one more expression of a perennial human impulse?

What if the thing that we really have to try to get used to some day is the prospect of not having walls between

Even on this Berlin Wall, if we go back to the time when it was first built, we will find that West Germany and its occupying allies were just as concerned, then, as East Germany and its big Communist friend were concerned, both to halt the steady stream of refugees from East Germany to West Germany.

The East couldn't contemplate letting them go, but the West didn't want them to come, either.

The Communists built the Wall, and the West immediately took its natural propaganda opportunity to denounce them for it. But the West proceeded to enjoy the benefits of the solution of the problem the Wall had imposed.

The human race began building walls about the time it had learned to build itself dwellings. The idea of keeping some things in and other things out has never been far from the center of human motivation. It may be that it is really a wall, a physical wall, which is really needed in, or around, Ulster. Who can escape the realization that, while some Americans cling to the idea that ours has to be a melting pot solution to the question of our racial differences, others on both sides of that division favor organizing different groups behind walls? Most of us do not think we believe in

walls, certainly not any so notorious as the Berlin Wall, not even, we would hope, any much more civilized wall, in appearance and design and label at least, around our own piece of property, or our own nice neighborhood.

But perhaps we ought not to trust ourselves too implicitly. Perhaps, if we watch ourselves more closely, we will detect a surprising number of instances in which, mentally at least, we begin reaching for some equivalent of a row of concrete blocks 11 feet high.

That "Inherent Right"

President Nixon may be doing nobly in reversing the physical direction of the war in Vietnam, but not even he can root our military publicists out of the particular genius they have developed to such a high extent in Vietnam -the genius for making fancy words seem to do work that plain common sense could .

The other day there came a statement from the United States headquarters in Saigon explaining why we have been recently conducting extensive bombings of the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam, and why we threaten even more retalation for North letnamese military activities there. "Any enemy activity along the DMZ," read our official statement, "which threatens the safety of allied forces is viewed with deep concern by com manders who have the responsibility to exercise their inherent right of self lefense for their troops."

Few people, perhaps not even its authors and users, have ever paused during the war in Vietnam to realize what a very useful and elastic phrase that "inherent right of self-defense" has come.

It has seemed to stretch quite easily across thousands of miles of ocean and into the center of a strange country and, without ever bothering to consider or deate the wisdom or the rightness of having our troops there in that situation. oncede that all questions can be healed y invoking the "inherent right of selflefense.'

The phrase has magic even more potent. If, inside that foreign country, you set out to bomb your enemy, and your enemy even dares train his radar on your planes while you are doing it. this authorizes that particular exercise of the "inherent right of self-defense which is called the "protective reaction strike," which is the semanticism for hitting somebody for what he may be thinking.

Although the use of such phrases has been developed to an unusually eloquent and elastic degree by the United States in Vietnam, it would be misleading to ignore the historical circumstances in which the underlying logic has been previously employed.

Hannibal was exercising Carthage's inherent right of self defense when he crossed the Alps toward Rome, Napoleon exercised the same right up to the gates of Moscow. Hitler invoked it against the aggressive thoughts of the Poles, and Japan cashed in on it at Pearl Harbor. When other validations of what you want to do won't quite cover the situation, this is the one you use.

-----Leave Aspirin Alone

It is with a dismal sense of foreboding that we read that, over in Britain, scientists are now hot on the trail of scientific explanations of how aspiron works to reduce fevers and relieve pain.

The bait thrown out to us, to win our miling approval for such research, is that the precise, scientific knowledge of just how aspirin works may open the way for a long list of wonderful new uses for the drug, such as control of rheumatic fever, and either the stimulation or the prevention of abortions.

We refuse the balt and we implore these British scientists to dismantle their laboratories and burn their records before they destroy what surely has been, and surely ought to be allowed to remain, the most effective single ingredient in aspirin.

That, we are sure, is its mystique. The fact that no one has been quite sure how it worked has been one of the elements which has made it easier for all of us to have confidence in aspirin, and having confidence is always at pain. Divest aspirin of its mystery, make pain. Divset aspirin of its mystery, make it anything less of a folk medicine, and we will all suffer the consequences.
