

The federal panel, which sev eral years ago warned the Alabama governor to stop interfering with school integration, answered Solomon's request by saying that in March 1970 the statewide school integration case was "fragmented." That meant the Calhoun and Limestone County schools, which were affected by Wallace's recent decrees, were no longer under its legal supervision. However, the panel added, "If the plaintiffs are entitled to any relief ... there is no reason why they cannot secure this relief in the Northern District. Birmingham is the seat for the Northern District, and one of the federal judges there has ruled against Wallace in recent weeks. U.S. District Court Judge Sam C. Pointer Jr., acting on a suit concerning a Wallace order to the Jefferson County school board, said the governor's order had no legal meaning and did not supersede the directives of the court.



It must be considered small not because the people who live south of a certain line are so different, in their habits and beliefs and desires, from the people who live north of it, but because the fates of the big power kind of order in the world have decreed that one half of Korea shall be inside the area of influence and domination by the United States and the other half inside the area of dictatorial rule by Russia and

The interesting question is this: If South Korea did not have its great powerful patron in the United States, and if the United States did not conceive that it has a power politics position it must hold and defend in South Korea, and if, on the other hand, North Korea was free of its vassal entanglements with Russia and China -then how might the two halves of Korea make out in

creating a united national life together? History says it has been big power partition which has created the major differences between North and South Korea. Our cynicism says that even if the big power hands were suddenly removed, North and South Korea would, in the spirit of our world, still find something to quarrel about.

The Unprovable Point

In Connecticut, three former members of the state police have just been given suspended sentences on charges of perjury. They had been convicted of faisifying story and evidence after they had shot and killed two men they had trapped in the midst of an alleged burglary. Out in Illinois, a number of law enforcement officials, including not only eight Chicago policemen, but a state's attorney himself, have just been indicted on charges that they conspired to prevent the prosecution of the Chicago policemen who raided a Black Panther apartment back in 1969, killing two Black Panthers.

In both cases, the formal charges, pressed to convictions in Connecticut, still awaiting possible court trial in Illinois, do not seek an answer to the real question involved.

In each case the real question was not whether the policemen involved had tried to hide or alter the supposed circumstantial facts involved in the killings which had taken place.

The real question, on which no trial

would ever seem possible, was whether or not the policemen in question, at the scene and moment in question, were in a state of mind in which they were perhaps half intending to kill, whether r not their adversaries were armed. or resisted.

The real question, carried one ster further, was not whether the policemen in the two situations had been guilty of what the Connecticut judge called a "human error" but whether they had been guilty of some degree of intent to have things work out as they did. It would be impossible to obtain either

a trial or a verdict on such a point. That being so, it is something of a triumph for the spirit of justice, that there has developed, both in Connecticut and in Illinois, actual legal action

on the more tangible and provable conduct which followed the killings. Good police enforce the law on the books and deliver its alleged violators over to the processes of justice. They do not make and enforce their own law and provide their own justice.

Updating Shakespeare

Any English Lit major knows that people interpret Shakespeare according to the temper and preoccupations of their time. So it isn't surprising that the World Shakespeare Congress which opened yes terday in Vancouver, British Columbia, includes on its agenda such topics a "Shakespeare and the Computer" and Psychoanalysis and Shakespeare." Ar international group led by director Jan Kott is considering the problems o adapting the plays to "embody present day political and philosophical points o view." And Marshall McLuhan is listed as a consulting member of a committee "New Research Methods."

These are some of the more novel ele ments of a rich program of lectures, discussions, films and dramatic presenta tions the weeklong Congress offers, It is co-sponsored by Simon Fraser University in Vancouver and the Japanese Shakespeare Society. Any bard lover who pays \$75 may attend. The disputes that go on are as old as is Shakespeare

One of the scheduled lecturers at the congress, W. Nicholas Knight of Wesleyan University, believes he has proof that a signature inside a popular Elizabethan law text is Shakespeare's The book, a Latin translation, belongs to the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, D. C. Knight explains in the May issue of The Shakespeare News letter that the signature was first discov ered by a Folger curator in 1938, but that he can now prove its validity by using ultra-violet light. If the signature is real, he says, it could be "the only one outside of England, the only one not on a legal document, the only one in a book and the only one of literary im-

The most significant implication of his theory, Knight says, is that Shakespeare had a scholarly, not casual, grasp o jurisprudence. If this is so, then Ben Jon son was wrong when he wrote in 1623 that his rival knew "small Latine, and lesse Greeke." The theory also suggests that the young dramatist may have served as a law clerk, an idea put forward in the 18th century by biographer Edmund

Malone. Other biographers and legendmakers have chosen different avocations for their subject - Franciscan monk soldier, barber-surgeon, gardener -to name a few. Whatever else he may have been, Shakespeare was man enough and genius enough to have kept his fellow humans captivated and curious for going on four centuries. The Shakespear scholars at the congress are only the last in the long series, and their studies are only the latest examples of updating on a man who refuses to become outda ed.-MERIDEN RECORD.

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
