Heralding Homes Started As Vacation House



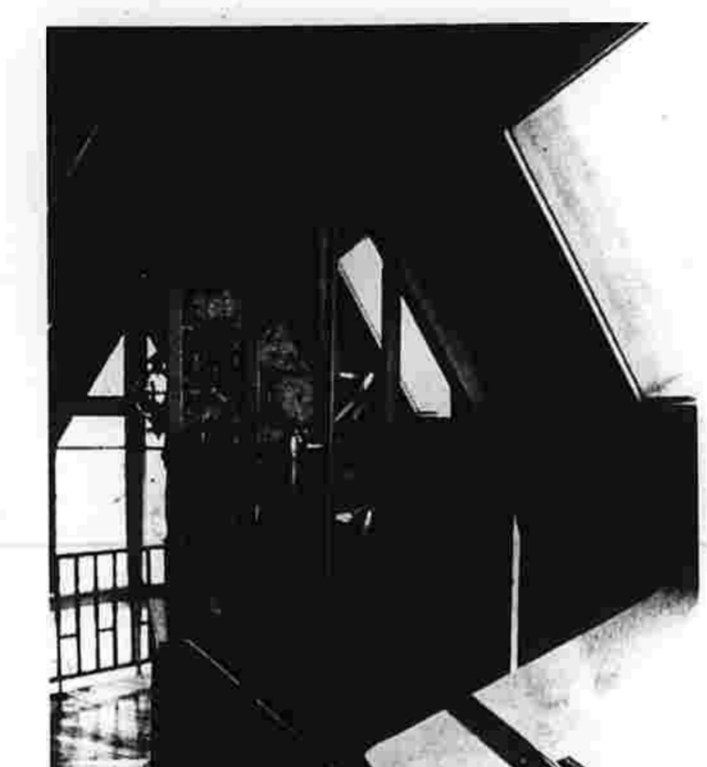
The two level deck of intricate design affords a perfect vantage point for Mrs. Doyle and her three sons to view a babbling brook winding through a small ravine behind their house.

"There isn't too much to see—this is it!"

One ponders Mrs. Fred Doyle's modest understatement as the height of the main A-frame towers overhead to the apex, appearing somewhat to be supported by a mammoth column of field stone rising out of a green carpeted well.

The house, originally planned as a sort of vacation home and later to become a guest house when a more traditional type home would be built on the site, was designed by Dr. Fred W. Doyle, a pathologist at the Windham hospital in Willimantic. As the Doyle's m o v e d in, presumably a vacation style of living grew so that as more extensive plans developed from Dr. Doyle's drafting board, the spectacular peaked roofed dwelling hidden among a stand of hemlocks off South River Rd. in Conway became a permanent home.

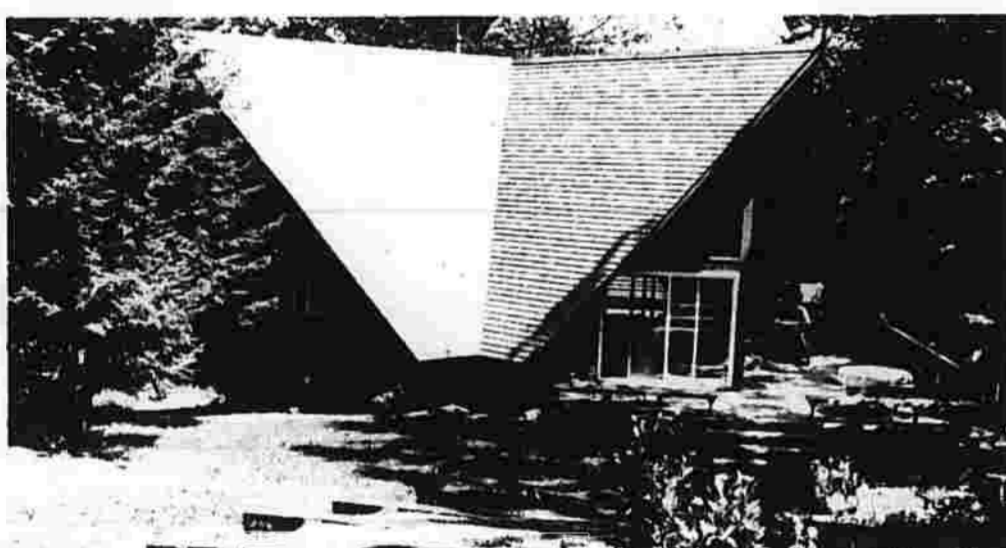
A wide deck partially surrounds the home with one section raised giving the appearance of a curved bridge. Plants set in large pots border one deck.

College Youth Represented By Lobbyist of Their Own

SACRAMENTO, CALIF. (AP) — In an age when college students and politicians are viewed with suspicion, a lobbyist representing college students has emerged.

Twohy, 26, mustached and single, represents 10,000 full-time University of California students before the California Legislature.

"With respect to students, this is an effort to get some of the streets and into the system," he says. "The decisions are made in dull gray committee rooms. If you're concerned not only with venting anger but changing things for the better, then you have to roll up your sleeves."

But he admits there is "a certain amount of skepticism" among students about his efforts to put their interests before California's 120 legislators.

The student lobbyist operates out of a two-room suite in an old office building near the Capitol.

Twohy's \$10,000-a-year salary is paid out of student body dues in 17 of the state's 23 campuses.

"We've had varying responses," Twohy says, "but in general, this effort is pretty well received."

"So far I haven't been thrown out of anyone's office."

Legislators contacted said Twohy maintains a generally low profile.

"He may very well be effective," said one, "but I've only had one contact with him this year."

Twohy contacts legislators in their offices, in the corridors of the Capitol and in committee hearings, as do other lobbyists.

But unlike some other lobbyists, he doesn't buy drinks and dinners for the lawmakers.

"I never have. We'd be glad to do it but the legislator would have to pick up the tab."

He says the part of his job that gives him the most satisfaction is "seeing an item that's being in the 20s because I'm of particular concern to students win passage over determined opposition."

Twohy never attended the University of California. He was picked earlier this year by the student body presidents from a field of 28 candidates.

He grew up in San Jose and attended State University and the New York University School of Law.

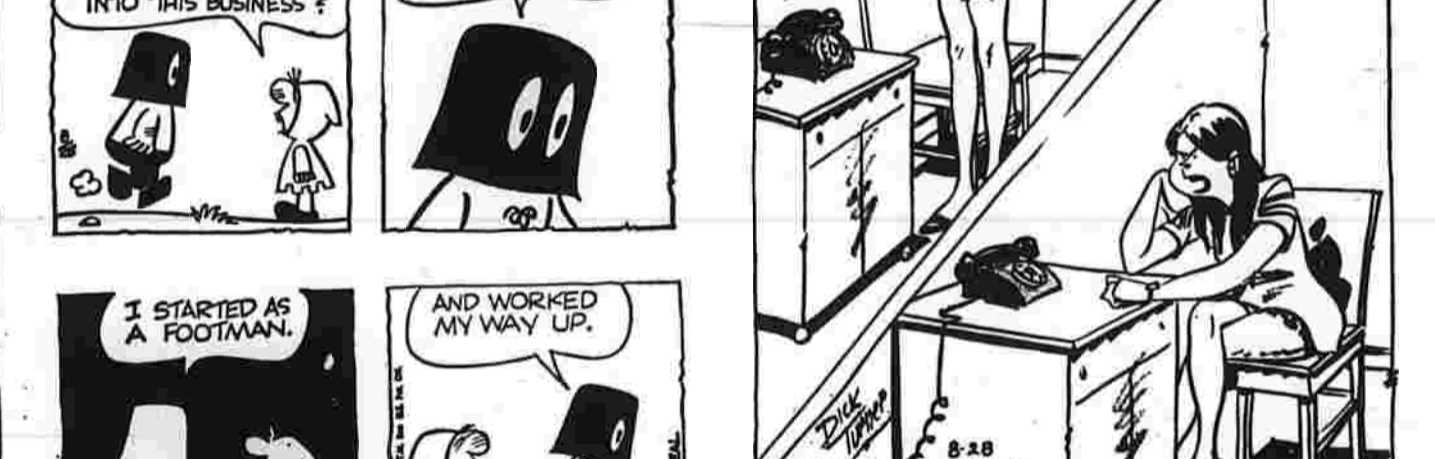
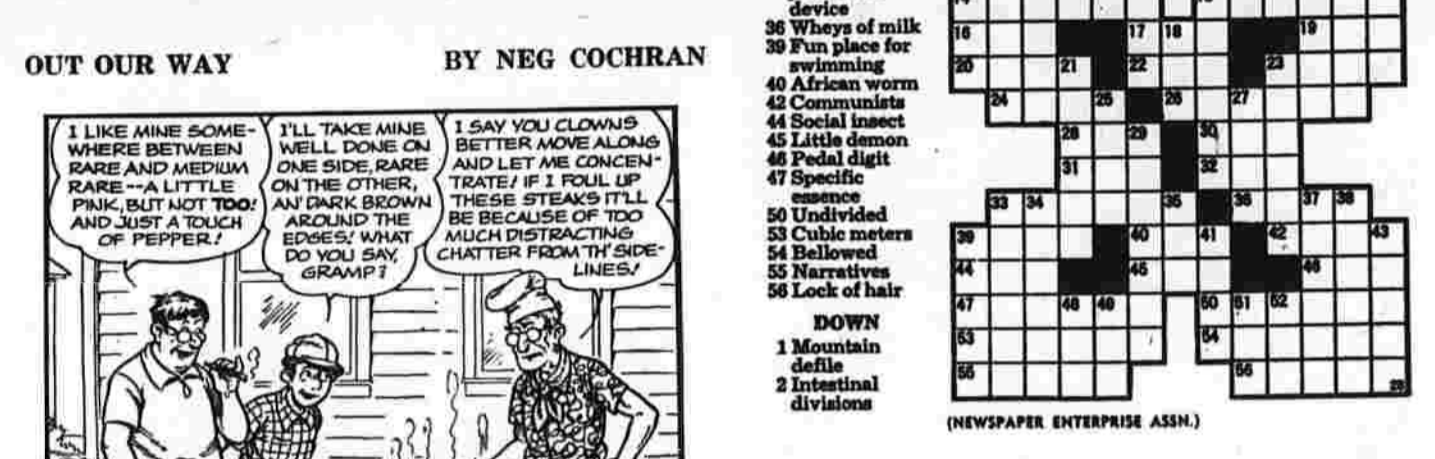
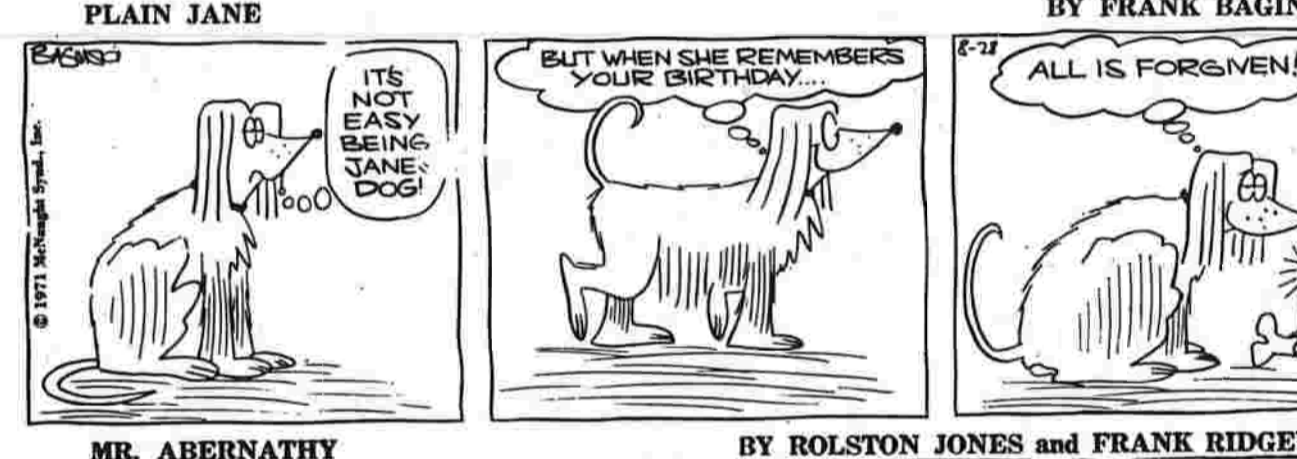

Gates, MCC Teacher, Named Outstanding Educator

A Manchester Community College faculty member has been chosen an Outstanding Educator of America.

Alan W. Gates of 55 Sherwood Circle recently received the honor of being named as one of the nation's most distinguished college and university teachers and scholars. It is based on contributions to the profession and the community. His full biography and record of achievements will appear in the 1971 edition of the organization's publication.

State Won't Take Cut In School Lunch Funds

New regulations by the U.S. Department of Agriculture which place greater restrictions of how federal school lunch program money may be spent and in some cases, reduce the funds allocated, will not financially affect the school lunch program in Connecticut.

According to the state's Director of School Lunch Programs, Mrs. Edith Blakeley, Connecticut will be getting just as much federal assistance as it did last year, although the method of reimbursement may be different when the new policies become effective Sept. 1.

The federal government pays five cents for each regular school lunch served, and an additional 30 cents for each free lunch for needy children. In Connecticut, state funds add four mills (four-tenths of a cent) for each regular lunch, and an additional two cents for each free lunch.

In Connecticut last year, an average of 210,000 school lunches were served daily in the participating 865 schools. About 80,000 of these were provided free to eligible children in poverty areas.

There are stringent regulations governing the distribution of free meals. The request for free meals must be accompanied by an application to the local board of education. The local board has to set up a policy regarding the free lunches, and then the applications to the state for approval.

School lunch directors of several states have attacked the new federal regulations, claiming that they may result in termination of programs in many places and will "preclude any expansion to reach the additional estimated three million to five million hungry children in America."

The American School Food Service Association would like to see 100 per cent federal funding for all school lunches, according to Asst. Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng. "We view the school lunch program as a partnership between the state and federal governments, local school districts, and the parents of children," Lyng added. "That's a fundamental disagreement, I suppose, in the concept of the school lunch program."

Rabbi Wind Gets Degree Sunday Night

Rabbi Leon Wind of Manchester's Temple Beth Shalom will receive the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa, tomorrow at 3:30 p.m., at a special convocation at the Park Avenue Synagogue, New York City.

The first announcement of the award and of tomorrow's convocation was made in early May.

Rabbi Wind is one of 38 clergymen, all leaders in the Conservative rabbinate, who will be honored by the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. Another from Connecticut to be honored is Rabbi Samuel Schwartz, who retired in 1969 from Temple Beth El, Norwalk.

According to Dr. Louis Finkelstein, seminary chancellor, "The convocation has been arranged to recognize the services these men have rendered over the years to their congregations, to their communities and to Judaism."

"The 38 to be honored," he continued, "have accounted for more than a millennium of rabbinic service—a collective rabbinic service—condensing 1,217 years of service into the span of a single human generation."

Rabbi Wind has a degree in Doctor of Hebrew Letters, awarded to him in October 1968. His doctorate manuscript deals with the history of Hebrew Scholarship in Egypt, since its occupation by the Turks in the 16th century.

Rabbi Wind graduated from the Jewish Theological Seminary in June 1943. Before coming to Manchester in 1945, he was associate rabbi and education director at Congregation Beth Shalom in Kansas City, Mo.

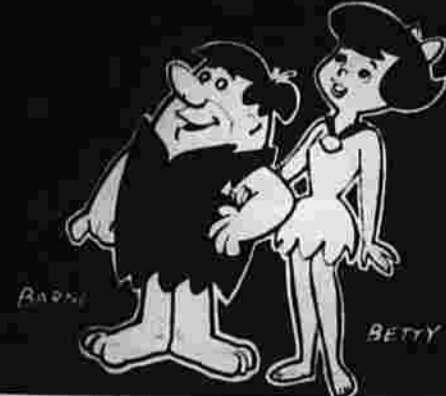

Mission: Impossible Tackling U.S. Crime

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Mission: Impossible" having dispatched endless South American and Iron Curtain dictators and tyrants over a five-year period, will tackle organized crime at home during its sixth season.

"We're domesticating the series," said producer Bruce Lansbury. "It had been getting to be fancy dress time with all those uniforms and medals."

The change of locale involves a lot more than casting and background scenery.

"Over the years, we've had a few stories with American backgrounds," Lansbury said, "and they worked well. We made some audience studies on concepts and found the American settings were acceptable. Then we wondered whether the ambient jeopardy of the dictator countries would work as well if we were on home grounds."

"We also weighed the values against the disadvantages of running out of material and finally decided that the domestic scene would give us a whole fresh loaf to cut."

Lansbury says that the new programs will go in "less for the intellectual congame and more for melodrama."

The show will refer cautiously to "organized crime"—never "Mafia." The bad guys will have the usual nonethnic Anglo-Saxon names. When the heroin traffic is under scrutiny, the center of drug manufacture will be a fictitious island off the west coast of Africa—a further

effort to avoid hurting sensibilities.

The intrepid mission team will return reduced in size: Leonard Nimoy, who succeeded Martin Landau as its master of disguise, will not be replaced. The quintet of regulars plus frequent guest team members occasionally proved unwieldy for story purposes, Lansbury explained, so this season's girl agent will not only be a beautiful lure for susceptible bad guys but double as a makeup and disguise specialist.

Unchanged will be the signature opening of the show—receipt of each week's mission assignment by tape recording which "self-destructs" dramatically upon being played.

"Once we decided to concentrate on organized crime, we started doing research on the subject and scratching around for interesting heavies," Lansbury said. "Our biggest script problem was to come up with plots where it would be impossible to use regular police or law enforcement agencies. One of the advantages of using foreign backgrounds—director countries and cold war situations—was that the local police or army could never be on our side."

Peter Graves continues to be head man for his fifth season. Greg Morris, the electronics wizard, and Peter Lupus, the strong man, are the sole survivors of the original cast. Lynda Day George, the new girl, is the fourth beauty to fill the distaff spot.

'In the News' For Children Begins Sept. 11

"In the News," a pioneering CBS News series presenting current events and topical news stories in a form specifically designed for school-age children, will premier Sept. 11 on the CBS Television Network.

The series will be presented eight times each Saturday in two-and-one-half-minute segments, beginning at 8:56 a.m., and continuing until 12:36 p.m., at four minutes before the hour and the half-hour.

"Although youngsters may frequently watch television news broadcasts," says Joel Heller, producer of "In the News," "most of the regular coverage is aimed at the adult world. We feel we have an obligation to young television viewers to tell them more about the events they watch and present it to them in a format that's within their comprehension."

Utilizing film, maps, charts and other graphics, "In the News" will delve into the explanation of words and phrases connected with the news, as well as the people and events making the headlines, and will be aimed toward the 8-to-11-year-old viewer.

Christopher Glenn, CBS News reporter-producer-writer, will be the narrator and reporter on "In the News."

Color TV Sets At 29 Million

As of July 1, 1971 the total number of color-equipped TV households in the United States increased to 29,700,000—48.2 per cent of all TV households, according to the National Broadcasting Company's latest quarterly estimate.

This new total represents a net gain of more than one million color-TV households during the second quarter of 1971 and a gain of 2.1 million color-TV households since January.

Color television set sales to the public during the January-June 1971 period set an all-time first-half record of 2.8 million—26% over the comparable period in 1970.
