# From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Have you ever wondered why the garden pepper carries the name as a condiment? Put the blame on Christopher Columbus. He thought the hot peppers used by the Indians of the West Indies was a kind of pepper, like the seasoning.

Actually the garden pepper is capsicum frutescens while the true pepper is pipper nigrum. Whenever voyagers touched the American tropics during the 16th century, they found peppers in many forms. Of the many varieties known to us today, all had been found by the beginning of the 17th century.

The Spaniards called the peppers chili (from the country Chile). Mild or sweet peppers are called pimientos or pimentos in Spain. When we talk about pimientos in the U.S., we mean a bright red sweet pepper. The kind you find in the center of green olives.

Paprika is made from the pods of a cultivated pepper plant and dried and powdered. Tobacco sauce is made from the tobacco pepper. Cayenne, an other red hot pepper, takes its name from a coastal city in French Guiana, South America.

It is believed that all the many pepper varieties were derived from a tropical woody shrub that grew as high as eight feet.

On French Rd. in Bolton, Casimir Kurys has planted 8,000 pepper plants representing several varieties. A truck garden growing many different vegetables, his produce is in demand at the wholesale market.

A few days ago he drove a large order to the Bronx in New York. Mostly, he sells at the Hartford Regional Market.

At the moment, there are crisp red peppers as well as the dark green ones. Peppers for frying, long hot, charty peppers and the mild hot Hungarian Tomatoes are in heavy demand. Then there is lettuce, succini, yellow squash, cabbage, beets, eggplant, potatoes, to mention a few. Later, there will be acorn squash, butternut squash, pumpkins and field pumpkins, Indian corn, gourds.

Casimir, his wife Helen and their children farm 15 acres of land, ten of which are his own. "All the kids help out and my wife is a great worker," Mr. Kurys said. As he packed huge cartons of tomatoes for market, "the cans and crates all sorts of things for the winter," he said.

Michael, 14, fed the freshly picked tomatoes through the washing machine. The Kurys sell their produce by the pound or in quantity to anyone who drives up.

"We have a lot of peppers to sell this year. The plants are heavy. It's been a great year but not a good one for onions. Onions are very small. The last two years, peppers weren't as good. The blossoms would just fall off the plants and the peppers were not abundant," Mr. Kurys explained.

Helen joined us with her four younger children—Thomas, 14, Joseph, 12, Janet, 10, and Nancy, 7, all of whom had been working in another field. "You can roast the red peppers and freeze them in containers. I use the little margarine ones. The children love the peppers on sandwiches. For the others, you can use containers or simply plastic bags."

**TV Freeze Red Peppers**

Put in half and seal. Place in roasting pan with a small amount of water. Just enough to prevent peppers from sticking. Add peppers and bake at 300 until skin begins to blister. Peel skins and place in freezer container pouring over juice from pan.

**To Freeze Peppers**

Seed peppers and cut in halves or quarters depending on size. Blanch for 1-2 minutes. Cool. Place in plastic bags or freezer containers. When defrosting, fry for another 10 minutes. Use in sandwiches as is or in other cooking. To freeze peppers for stuffing, follow same method, cutting only tops off.

Casimir Kurys lives only a short distance from his birthplace. His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael Kurys, were Polish immigrants who bought a piece of land in Bolton which they farmed. They had seven children, all but one of whom live close to the family homestead. Joe and Andrew, both bachelors, live in the homestead. They grow cucumbers and strawberries commercially but, if you like to pick your own vegetables, such as tomatoes or peppers, you can do so. One of four sisters is deceased. The other three live close by.

The Kurys start ordering seeds in January of each year. In March, the tomato and pepper seeds are started. When the little plants come along, they will be transplanted into flats. The real work of getting them into the field takes place about the end of May.

Peppers are beautiful for stuffing right now. Rita Anderson of W Timber Trail uses the

## Tolland PZC Decides to Shelve Committee on Town Plan

The Planning and Zoning Commission has shelved plans for the formation of a committee of citizens whose duty would be to develop goals for the town's comprehensive plan of development.

The delaying action was taken on the advice of PZC Chairman Clifford Williams, despite the recommendations of Tolland County Estimation Service Agent John Elliott and Conservation Committee member Robert Blum.

Williams claimed a similar suggestion he made some time ago met with disapproval. Elliott lay great importance on the committee which would represent both the town power structure and interested citizens. The extension agent met with the commission to discuss ways of implementing the proposed town comprehensive plan. At times for Saturday classes will be broadcast over WTRC radio.

The Tolland Junior Women's Club Ways and Means Committee be set up in a similar manner. He offered the services of David Moriarty who has directed a planning program in Groton, and who he claims is very interested in working with the town's conservation efforts. Tolland due to its position as a second fastest growing town in the state.

Moriarty would work with a group of people representing the town's conservation efforts. The Conservation Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals, Planning and Zoning Commission, and the Tolland Junior Women's Club. A proper zoning job cannot be done until long-range planning is set up, according to Elliott, who also offers his services on the committee.

The extension agent will check with the soil conservation district people at the TAC, requesting they work up maps for Tolland and obtain information regarding open space and water rights.

Blum, who sat in on the meeting as a representative of the Conservation Commission, urged the formation of a committee suggested by Elliott. He felt a 10-15-member committee would be ideal for a general study of the needs of the town.

The hard prod index to the increased cost of state government, all these burgeoning years, has been the number of employees on the state payroll.

We first began noticing that statistic more than a decade ago, when the figure was climbing toward the 20,000 mark.

Lately, the news has been that the number of state employees was approaching 40,000.

All this long and seemingly irremediable climb in state personnel has been taking place in spite of repeated "freeze" edicts by some - posturing Governors who issued periodic decrees forbidding state departments to hire new employees to fill vacancies which had occurred through death, retirement, or resignation.

Somehow, without ever being revoked, these "freeze" decrees gestured seemed, after their own initial heroic moment in the headlines, to have little or no effect.

The next time one looked there was the state payroll, soaring upward again, as usual.

The latest statistic, however, is something impressively different. It comes from Governor Meskill, and it says that the policy of not filling vacancies inaugurated on his order last January had the result, during the first six months of the year, of reducing the number of full time state employees by 91, from a total of 39,173 down to 38,182.

No other payroll freeze edict has ever managed to claim such a substantial result.

Perhaps no other Governor has ever managed to claim such a result, but quite so rigorously. Certainly, no other payroll order has had such dramatic state financial conditions backing it up and giving it importance and emphasis.

Conceptually, then the present gain - decline in the state payroll, but gain for the taxpayers - can not only be held, but may even be extended, in spite of the increasing hardship on state departments, in spite of the increasing temptation for the new state administration to do some hiring of its own.

So far, at any rate, very good.

To look for more, however, is going to require something more than any flat gubernatorial order.

The "aggrandizement" of the state payroll has not resulted from the mere zeal of department heads or political parties for putting people on the public payroll.

Nor has it, if we may venture something that is likely to be assailed as a sample of perverse ignorance, resulted primarily from the fact that the state has been growing in population and in activity.

The one great key to the expansion of the payroll has been the continual invention, by the Legislature, sometimes in response to its own busy, sometimes in response to the pleas of outside pressure groups, sometimes in response to the pleas of some section of the public, but all adding up, in practice, to heavily increased state expenditures for a dwindling efficiency of return, with both the increased payroll and the dwindling efficiency developing in spite of increasing employment of modern, labor-saving paper work techniques.

The cure for all this, should any Governor be willing to tackle it, it would have to be, we think, throwing out a lot of "progress" and going back to the simplest, earliest, every-day process one might begin by eliminating three out of every four paper forms used in state government functioning.

### Business Mirror Canada To Feel Impact Of New U.S. Economics

NEW YORK (AP) — While much of America switches the reaction to the Japanese yen and the German mark to the new U.S. economic plan, one of the greatest impacts is likely to be not overseas but right next door in Canada.

Two-thirds of Canada's exports go to the United States, a total of about \$10.4 billion a year. About \$2.5 billion of these will be affected by a 10 per cent import surcharge, meaning inevitable damage to the Canadian economy.

That economy hardly was in the position to take such a blow. It too had suffered through a frustrating downturn that it was shaking only gradually. Unemployment in the first half of the year topped 6 per cent, and could go higher.

"Unless some steps can be devised for cushioning the sales and profit impact on the hard-hit firms," said the Bank of Nova Scotia, "this will almost certainly make a dent in the employment that had seemed to be in prospect over the balance of this year."

During the past 15 months the Canadians say they had absorbed a self-imposed surcharge by permitting their dollar to float from a pegged price of 92.5 cents to a better than 97 cents.

In the words of a Canadian government official, "We had, in effect, made a 7 per cent contribution for more than a year."

No wonder then that Canada immediately sought but failed to obtain an exemption from the surcharge. And while that possibility hasn't been foreclosed, the prospects would appear poor.

"The United States has given very little indication that it is willing to grant exemptions either on a country or a commodity basis," said the Canadian official, who declined to be identified. He summed up prospects: "I don't know; I don't even have a view."

It is understandable that some Canadian businessmen reacted somewhat bitterly. They feel they already have made a contribution. And they feel their relationship is a special one because of the high degree of integration between the two economies.

And there is precedent for special consideration. Canadian-made motor vehicles, for example, are exempt from tariffs because of a special agreement, and they will continue to be.

Automobiles, in fact, may be the most important Canadian export with their only reason to applaud the new U.S. game plan because that plan would remove the excise tax not only on domestic but on imported cars as well.

### Evidence Points To Virus Cause Of Arthritis

BOSTON (AP) — A medical team at Robert B. Brigham Hospital has reported more evidence that arthritis, which affects over 8 million Americans, may be caused by viruses.

In collaboration with scientists at Tufts University and the National Institute of Arthritis and Metabolic Diseases, Dr. Peter H. Schur and his colleagues found an antibody in the serum of over half of 101 patients with Systemic Lupus Erythematosus, one of the many types of arthritis.

The antibody was present in only 4 per cent of normal individuals, the team said.

The Robert B. Brigham Hospital is a major teaching hospital of the Harvard Medical School and is the only hospital in the United States specializing in arthritis and rheumatic diseases.

"Arthritis and Rheumatism," the work was published in the journal *Arthritis and Rheumatism*, was supported by grants from the National Institutes of Health and the Massachusetts Arthritis Foundation.







### Basic Civil Rights Lost for Brazilians

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Firmly in control of Latin America's biggest country, Brazil's military-backed government is going all out this week to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the nation's independence from Portugal.

The theme chosen by the generals is "Brazil—Yesterday, Today, Forever."

Since overthrowing the last government of civilians, President Jose Goulart in 1964, the military regime has straightened out Brazil's once chaotic economy and has pressed ahead with monumental development projects aimed at making Brazil a modern nation.

Administrations under three generals have stabilized the currency, the national currency, and have guided exports and profit-sharing for employees of Central Bank reserves to record high. Brazilians are paying taxes and saving more.

Medici was elected by Congress in 1969; he was the only candidate. He says he will try to return the country to full democratic rule by the time he leaves office in 1974.

The government already is making plans for next year's 180th anniversary. There will be a worldwide soccer tournament here, and the body of King Pedro I, Brazil's first emperor and the man who proclaimed independence, will be returned to this country from a foreign land.

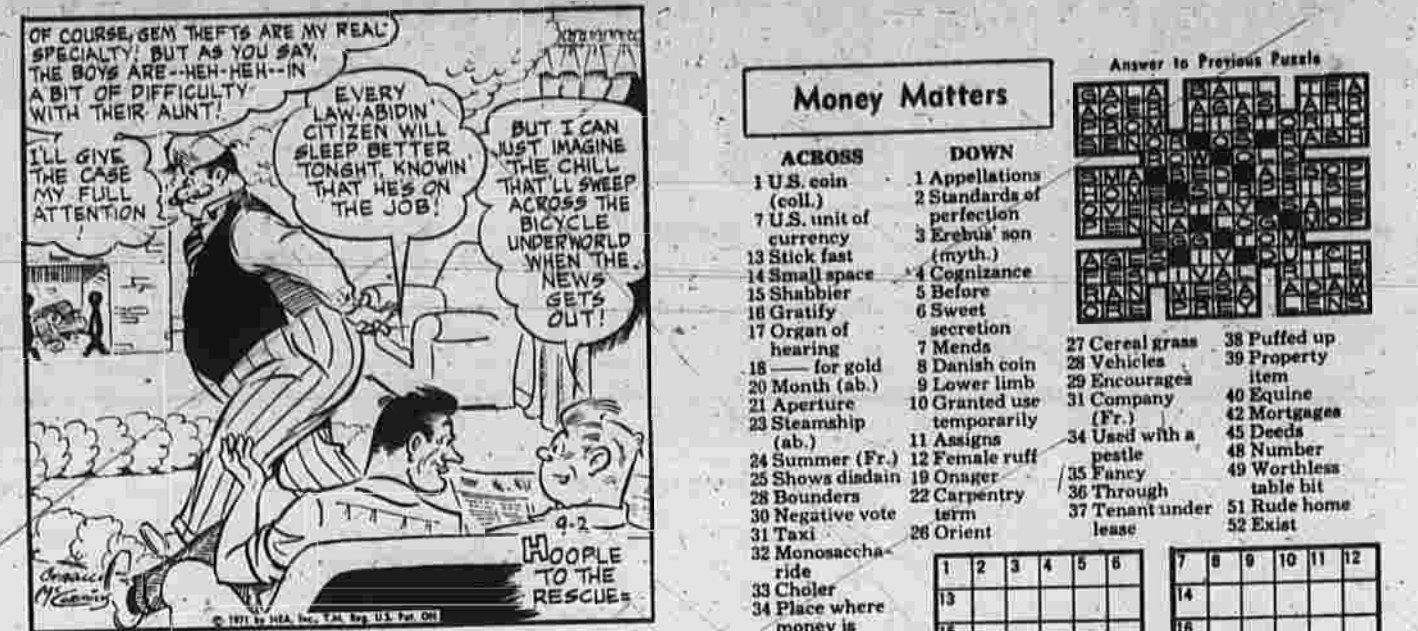

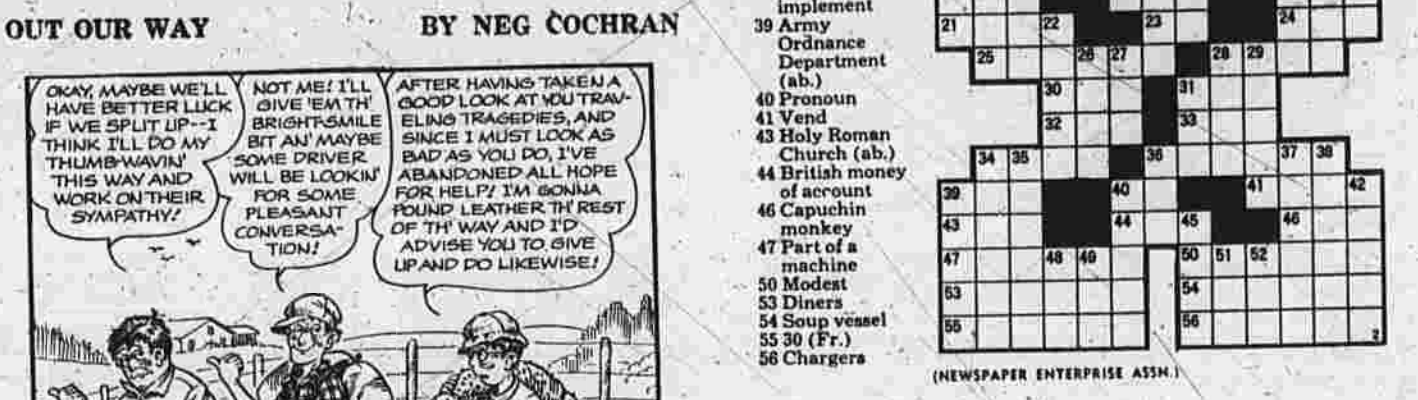

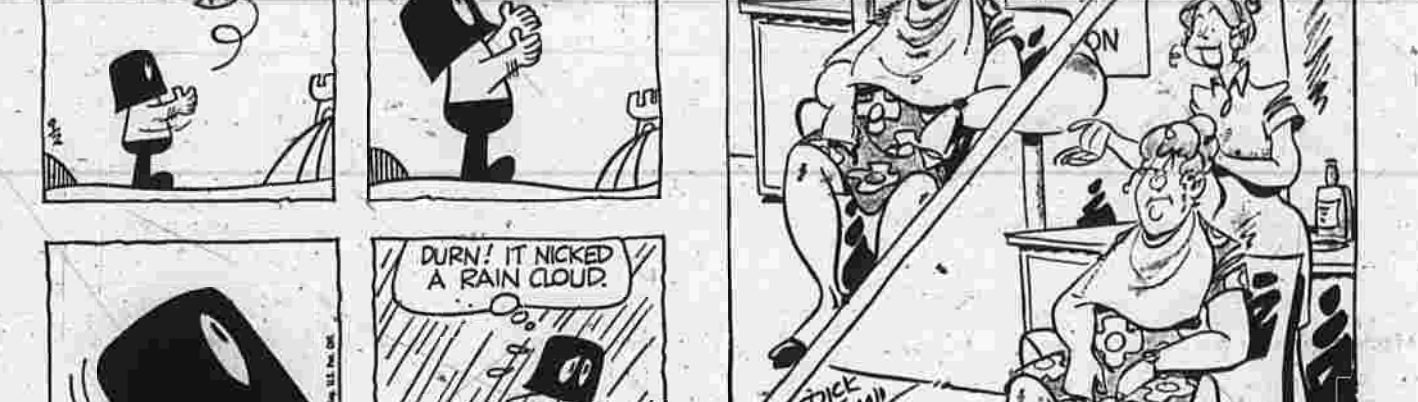
