This is just as well, for the truth has been, all along, that the visible efforts of American diplomacy and power to dress up the election so it would look more respectable have been almost as unfortunate, in their result, as the oneandidate election itself,

We do not seem to have realized, as we made our efforts to change the ourse of political events in South Vietnam, that such obvious and overt Amercan management of that country's inrnal political affairs, even if it could succeed, would in itself be a travesty on pronounced purpose of protecting uth Vietnam's right to self determina-

How a great nation like ourselves, with such good intentions, can run into so much bad luck, so many lose if we do, lose if we don't situations, is not necessarily too much of a mystery.

There is always a point, near the beinning of a policy, when we ourselves take our own pure intentions too much for granted. Get down to the hard core of our original decisions to mix into Vietnam and we might have to admit that what we were-after, all along, was not something for the Vietnamese, but something for ourselves in the husiness of world power politics, and that, consequently, part of the attitude of native leadership toward us will eventually equate us with any other outside force seeking objectives of its own inside the territory and the humanity of another nation." No such outside force has ever won, in all history, except by the kind of victory involved in finally getting out and getting free of its involvement.

Press secretary, Ronald L Ziegler, says Nixon has been following a pattern of getting to oceanside office about i a.m. and returning to his next door "Casa Pacifica" villa around 2 p.nl. Sometimes he reads there in his small, booklined second-floor study with its

spectacular ocean view. But often in the afternoon, Nixon calls over his close friend C.G. "Bebe" Reboso for some excursion on beach





Russell Cheney, who practiced his craft in this idyllic atm re. was born the sphere, was som the eleventh and youngest child of Knight Dexter Cheney and his wife, Ednah Dow Smith Cheney, at South Manchester on Oct. 16, 1881. His grandfather, Charles, was one of the Cheney brothers who founded the silk industry in Manchester in 1821. His greatuncles, Seth and John Cheney, were noted engravers. \

After graduating from Hart-ford High School, for there was no high school in Manchester at that time, he entered Yale, following his four brothers. He graduated in 1905 with no speal vocation but with a host of friends who remained loyal to him throughout his life.

... Pledged his life to quest for beauty. . .

In a letter to one of these friends he told how one evefriends he told how one eve-ning when all by himself in the studio at the Homestead, where his great-uncles had worked, he was suddenly overcome by the beauty of the replica of the statue of Venus de Milo which they had made from the ori-ginal in the Louvre, Kneeling before it, he secretly dedicated his life to the quest for beauty. When he told his parents of his desire to study art, he received their warm support. their warm support.

He enrolled at the Art Stu-dents' League in New York City and studied there under such famous teachers as Kenyon Con and William M. Chase for three years. This was followed by three years of study in Paris at the Academic Julien under Jean-Paul Laurens. Unlike many Americans of that ere, he chose not to remain in Paris but to return to his native country to pursue his career.

In 1913 he became the presi-dent of the Art Students' League, During the summers he joined with a group of artists who surrounded Charles H. Woodbury at his art colony in Ogunquit, Maine. Throughout his life, he sought out master painters, always keeping an open mind to new coperiances. This kept his work vital and his shift young to the end. his spirit young to the end.

Through the years Cheney exhibited his paintings in many prominent art galleries, includ-ing the Babcock, the Montroas and the Ferargil in New York. He is represented in the Wads-worth Atheneum in Hartford and in musuems in San Fran-cisco, Newark, Boston, Port-iand, Santa Fe and at Yale.
