





The Monroe County medi-cal examiner said today that all nine hostages killed at Attica state prison during the four-day upris-ing died of gunshot wounds Dr. John F. Edland said

"There were no cut throats of any kind of mutilation." The bodies of two more pris cners were found today, unofficial sources said, bringing the total dead to 40.

There was no immediate ex planation of how the gunshots were fired, from where or by whom.

According to all official re-ports Monday, the only guns rebel prisoners were carrying were gas projectile guns. Most of them were armed with clubs, firebombs and makeshif knives, officials said.

Related stories on the Attica Prison confrontation appear on Page 17.

The bodies of the nine hos tages and prisoners who died earlier in the clash were taken to the Monroe County medica examiner. Carl Lupo, a super-visor in the examiner's office. said the hostages died of gun-shot wounds and not slashed throats.

Jerry Houlihan, a spokesma for the prison, said Monday several of the hostages had eir throats slashed.

Prison authorities would not comment on the report that two, more bodies had been found. It came from a police official who asked that e not be identified.

the approaching farce of the presidentia election in South Vietnam, and threatens to use this farce as the reason for change ing his own attitude on prolonging American aid to and the American presence in South Vietnam, he is also being irrelevant and illogical. And he, in the bargain, can be suspected of some hypocritical maneuvering in which he is trying to disassociate himself from . what might be his own truly instinctual position.

Why is Senator Jackson looking for some opening which will help him to seem something less of a hawk than he really has been, or really might like to continue to ba?

The answer is that Senator Jackson has now entered the process of trying to construct a Presidential image, and that, for such purposes, he would like to move himself into that middle area already occupied by Senator Muskie, an area Mayor Lindsay would also like to invade if he can.

But whether it is dove or hawk trying to ride the political situation in South Vietnam for sincere or for hypocritical reasons, the reminder to both should be the same.

What this country needs is an honest way out of Vietnam, and no kind of exit based on our supposedly sudden discovery that no perfect democracy exists there can be honest. Perhaps the first necessary preparation for an honest exit will be for us all to admit that there is no fairy tale explanation of our own presence there. We went there in a fancied protection of our own fancied national power politics interests, and that is the area in which we have the right to proclaim ourselves to be disillusioned and regretful. Clinging to the bark of our Japanese maple Monday morning we found the cast skin of a cicada, the chitinous envelope from which the creature had crawled upon emerging to full adulthood. The insect, commonly known as the 17year-locust (cicada septendecim) spends most of his years underground, emerging normally only every 17 years in sponse to an uncannily accurate time clock which keeps the cloada tribe mysteriously on schedule.

The last mass cicada emergence this area occurred in 1962; previous local appearances were in 1945 and 1928. The text deployment in force will be in 1979. ething went wrong with the individual cicada which crawled out of the soil, climbed the trunk of our maple tree, souirmed out of his skin, and then flew away. Either he is a precocious member of the Class of 1979 whose swift metabolism enabled him to finish the course eight years ahead of time, or he is a slow learner who should have gone out into the world as a member of the Class of

Actually, we believe, this maverick is the offspring of other earlier generations who somehow got their calendars mixed up and have been keeping step to a dif-ferent drummer in all the years since. The insect world has its mavericks no less than the animal world, and these are

Even if we were to see the cloada who left his pupal skin on our tree, we would have no way of identifying him. All ci-cadas look alike to us. They bear the embossed W on their thorax and a P in the veining of their wings, signifying, saying the traditionalists, both War and Peace. But since the world is always at war or at peace, usually (as now) both at the same time, depending upon where in the world you look, the value of the initials for purposes of prognostication is nil. As for the member of the Class of 1971, all we can say is that we are thankful he is alone. After the Year of the Span Worm and the Year of the Gipsy Moth, to have this be also the Year of the Cicada would have been just too much for either our trees, or oursely to take. - W. F. G. When Governor Thomas Mes kill revoked his own early promise to approve such a measure, and vetoed the bill which would have made the birthday of the late Rev. Martin Luther King a legal holida; for Connecticut, he displayed a toughness and courage of a rare

There were many members of the General Assembly who voted for the bill not because they really believed in it, but because they were unwilling to put themselves into a voting position which could be accuse of showing race prejudice.

In the normal course of such events, the new legal holiday would have been created, even though very few people were really certain they felt it logical and appropriate. But Gover-nor Meskill dared challenge the special advocacy and interest of the state's black community and his courage liberated enough votes in the General As sembly to sustain his veto, and the establishment of such a first precedent of its kind may increase the state's future capac ity to resist high emotional pressure from special groups. Governor Meskill's spectacular defiance of one such instance of pressure left, however, one question dangling.

Would the Governor abo equal courage and firmness in dealing with some other specia interest which might have a highly emotional commitment from some other particular seg ment of the state's population
