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

Discussions Of The Periphery

Events such as the insurrection at Attica bring forth a flood of judgments. We think that the core issue that should be raised is the role of correctional institutions in our society. They are not

We are not against discussion of the wisdom of particular tactics used in negotiation and retaking of the prison Nor are we objecting to inevitable and necessary global judgments about the horror of killing, the nature of man in confinement, or the difficulty of reaching decisions about men's lives. We must talk about such matters.

We do object to discussion which remains peripheral. No sooner had the extent of the Attica crisis become evident than most of us were talking about whether or not Commissioner Oswald and Governor Rockefeller had acted properly. Although such discussions tell a lot about people's politics, they miss the main point. We have prisons for three reasons: to help deter unlawful conduct, to protect society from lawbreakers, and supposedly to rehabilitate

offenders. Our prisons are not achieving these goals at all adequately. correctional reform some bad habits learned long ago -contenting ourselves with a decision about the relevant but non central aspects of a problem. When crime became a major political issue in the United States, most people contented themselves with deciding that they were for "law and order," leaving it at that. The causes of crime, the as-

Bailey's reference to training raises surance of justice, or the fact that maintaining order in many American communities is in effect repression did not disturb the pervasive happiness over having made a decision about part of the problem. In university communities, legitimate

and badly needed reforms were ignored in several universities. Without student and faculty participation in attacking problems and adapting to change, some universities were in trouble. A leader among the ostriches was Harvard. When the gap became politicized and the break came, as it inevitably would, the matters of education and running a university gave way to discussions of whether or not President Nathan Pusey had done the "right thing" or whether modern students were good or evil, if strange creatures. After weighing the peripheral one could ignore the essential.

The events at Attica, needless to say, are part of a very broad spectrum of social malaise. By demonstrated experience, our prisons do not "teach" someone a lesson." they all too often confirm a person in a life of crime. Incarceration as we administer it freqently breeds violence and takes away the fundamentally human parts of lifesecurity, meaningful work, love, sex, and artistic expression. Men are also learning a lot about revolution and racial polarization in prison these days.

One cannot get at our prison problem by saying he is for or against what happened at Attica. Being against prison riots is as meaningless as being for law and order. Nor, in fact, do any of the immediate tactical considerations offer a means of preventing further Atticas. Those prisoners knew that they were risking death, and so do thousands of other inmates who may decide to actheir lives in prison and society's problem have little to do with the immediate issues of negotiating with prisoners holding hostages or the lesson effect of

violent retaliation. The effect of the Attien riots and the state's response to them is that we have escalated a bit further the politiciza-

tion of the issue of social correction Those in office or seeking to be will have to have policies for the treatment of the offender, and their policies will be examined by the public. It will not be enough to say that we have good prisons or inadequate prisons. The riots will force reconsideration of the basic issue and measurement of its budgetary implications against all other demands. After Attica there should be an interest in upgrading correctional facilities.

We are against the peripheral and for attacking the material, not just because the non-essential is annoying. In this country we need a lot of prodding to change things. Not until the direct action of the civil rights campaigns was segregation weakened; not until the Dean's office was seized did changes occur in the universities. And one year after the riots in the Manhattan House cf Detention -the Tombs -Wayden Albert Glick reports that it is more overcrowded than on the eye of the October.

Not to form a public consensus on the priority of correctional improvement is to risk serious social division, and perhaps more Atticas.

If this experience does not result in breaking away from discussion of the tactics used and the nature of revolution, then the tragedy of Attica will be greater than it has been. We will have learned and done nothing.

Meskill On Attica

After meeting with Correction Commissioner John Manson and State Police Commissioner Cleveland Fuessenich. Governor Thomas Meskill stated his conviction that "our prison system is superior to Attica's, ...more humane. . . and therefore was not as susceptible to rebellion among prisoners. The Governor also confirmed an earlier statement that he would "act swiftly" in the event of a rebellion and would "not negotiate

Democratic State Chairman John M. Bailey's retort maintained that the state prisons and jails were short 100 guards because of the "Meskill freeze," referred to an "already dangerous security situation," and suggested that "tough Instead, Bailey recommended improved staffing by trained personnel.

Although we like to think that our prisons are such that Connecticut would not have an Attica, the claim of superiority reminds us of declarations of stability by flat in a third world country. It's risky and raises doubts.

On the other hand, the Governor was wise to state publicly what he would do in case hostages were seized in a state prison. The declaration could serve as a deterrent, and does give inmates contemplating risking their lives in an insurrection a guideline of what the Governor's policies are to be

an interesting point. We would have confidence in the Governor's roclamation if it were supported by reasons and data. An example would be assurances that the State had enough -or was training - skilled black and Spanish-speaking guards and administrators to deal with minority prisoners. Or that inmate leaders participating in prison administration could confirm a easonable sense of community and progress in our correctional institutions. We are all entitled to a healthy share of scepticism. We want to believe the Governor, and he could only gain by demonstrating the substance of his

The Wrecking Crew-

Governor Meskill appears to be on the verge of sending in a wrecking crew to attend to the University of Connecticut. One other tee also voted against the proposal.

The problem here is that this is a long term program that requires long term planning by students. It is a more expensive program than the average large lecture course, but students also pay a large share of the extra cost. Irrespective of the finances, the Meskill administration has clearly no right to interfere in the internal administration of the university. If this procedure continues, soon the university will not be able to spend money for science courses, which often cost far more per student than the hu-

Prison In Japan

To Be Razed TOKYO (AP) — Sugamo Prison, where Japan's wartime leaders were held and executed, has been condemned to the wreckers. In its place will rise a \$236-million housing and shopping complex.
To allow future generations

to reflect on Japan's belligerent past, a corner of the prison compound where the executions took place will be preserved as a memorial garden.

A small garden has existed there since 1952 when the United States returned control of the prison to Japan. Screened by a 10-foot concrete wall, the garden has small oal

frees and tea bushes donated mostly by relatives of executed prisoners.
The only remainders of the past are five concrete mounds where five gallows once stood. Gen. Hideki Tojo, wartime prime minister, was hanged there in 1948.

The Japan Urban Development Co., which purchased the prison property from the gov-ernment for \$17.7 million, plans to enlarge the garden's area tenfold and tear down the wall. In all, U.S. occupation authorities executed 60 of St gamo's 4,200 inmates, Most of the others, also convicted by ar international war crimes tri bunal, were sentenced to prison terms. Those still serving time in 1962 when the prison was returned to Japan, received am

Tojo was considered the criminal in chief. He was hanged on the same day as six other men, all members of a hi-erarchy which had led Japan into World War II.
