### The Man Who Can't Retire

The losses of Justices Black and Haran from the Supreme Court, and the retirement of Secretary General U Thant bring to mind a man who would like to retire but cannot: Dr. Ralph J. Bunche. Dr. Bunche, the United Nations Under Secretary for Special Political Affairs, is 67 years old. His health is not good, and there are strong indications that he would like to retire from this strenuous position.

Bunche has had a full and famed career as a professor of political sciance, international statesman, author, and member of distinguished commissions. He has been under pressure from U.N. Secretary General U Thant to remain on the job and from liberal internationalists not to leave it.

In 1946 Bunche was an expert on colonial problems and Africa in the United States Department of State and was seconded to the United Nations. He

became the Director of the Division of Prusteeship at the U. N., then served as Acting U. N. Mediator on Palestine in 1948 and 1949. In 1954 Bunche became the Under Secretary for Special Political Affairs. Most would call his career a very real success, and one worthy of the Nobel Prize for Peace which he received in 1950. It is extremely difficult for Bunche to resign as Under Secretary because the position is an institution, and the United States considers it an American-led institution.

This institution is greater than the man. Those who think that involvement in special political affairs is what the United Nations is all about would be surprised to know that only four or five rofessionals work there. They are Individuals such as Brian Urghart, the bright and toughminded Englishman who directs this section of the U. N., hold together the operation even though the chief is ailing. But the problem lies in the concept of the office as an American institution. There is no written accord that makes this particular Under Secretariat an American fieldom, but the United States considers that the position should be filled by an American national. The New York Times recently called for a "fresh American commitment" to the principles of international cooperation established by the United Nations Charter. A fitting corollary to a stronger American role in the U. ### What's Going On In There?

China watchers in Japan say that this removal of pictures indicates that Mao's leadership has been stabilized and that his personality cult is no longer needed. A Polish newspaper believes that Mao's role is diminishing while Premier Chou En-lai is moving into a position of great er strength.

The Italian Ambassador to Peking has reported by telephone that the recent events are in accordance with changes Mao described to American writer Edgar R. Snow recently. Mao supposedly told Snow that he intended to redimension" everything, to diminish everything built on his name and retain only the title of "great educator."

Chairman Mao has always had a bit of the existentialist in him; he has always started life over again with renewed purpose. He has been the master of the constant change, including such major upheavals as the Great Leap Forward, the Hundred Flowers Bloom experiment in criticism, and the Cultural Revolution. As father of the modern Chinese Revolution, Mao has never staved still.

A Soviet noet named Yevgeny Yevtushenko conceded once that his success might corrupt his identity as a poet. He

Meanwhile, major business organizations, including the Japan Chamber of Commerce and Industry, urged the government to set a new parity promptly so that industries could trade change.

Prime Minister Eisaku Sato told the chamber he knew of the difficulties faced by businessmen, but stressed that current monetary uncertainties, in cluding any revaluation of the yen, must be solved within th framework of an international monetary realignment.

Government officials sai their concern centers primarily on small and medium in dustries, which lack reserv funds. These concerns account for nearly 60 per cent of Japan's total exports. Small in-dustries have been urging the government to take measure

to ease their burdens. Apart from them, the ship-building, industrial machine, fertilizer, and some other maor industries are concerned that they would be hit hard by a revaluation because of out-standing credits offered to sell their products abroad. To prevent losses in foreign exchange, traders are trying to conclude yen-based contracts. Some of them, including au-

In addition to the 10 per cent import surcharge imposed by President Nixon, American im porters of Japanese products have to pay more than before because the floating yen is currently about 7 per cent up from the old parity of 360 yen to \$1. Officials fear that if the U.S. import surcharge remains in force through the end of this fiscal year ending next March 31, the nation's exports will be held to a 10 per cent increase. The original export target was a 20 per cent increase. Officials also anticipate at least a 1 per cent drop in the





(Continued from Page One) Tran Hung Dao, 18 miles north of Tay Ninh city, was in danger of being overrun and U.S. B52 bombers and smaller tactical fighter-bombers hit at North letnamese troop concentrations and gun positions within 1,000 yards of the base.

Other B52s bombed within a few miles of the Cambodian rubber plantation town of Krek seven miles from the Vietnam ese border, where other Saigon forces are threatened by the North Vietnamese 5th Division. Computer Industry Moving

NEW YORK (AP) — The volatile computer industry, with annual revenues of \$12.6 billion, has been hit by another of its periodic shakeouts. RCA Corp. stunned the in-

RCA Corp. stunned the industry on Sept. 17 by pulling out of the highly competitive general purpose computer market.

W. Sarnoff, chairman of RCA, had challenged the industry giant, International Business Machines Corp., with a new line of big computers.

With a year of dismal experience behind it, RCA decided to withdraw rather than spend an additional \$500 million in the next five years in an effort to make its computer operations profitable. RCA said it expected to write off a \$250 million loss this year. Memorex Corp. of Santa

Clara, Calif., a manufacturer of computer peripheral equipment, charged that RCA was a victim of IBM's "monopolistic position" in the industry. IBM has declined to reply, or

to speculate publicly on the reasons for RCA's withdrawai or its long range impact on the computer industry. In another development, Hon-

In another development, Honeywell Corp. said it was expanding its capacity to make large scale computers but said that this had nothing to do with RCA's withdrawal.

RCA said it would continue to tlevelop and make specialized communications systems for government and defense, communications networks and business.

RCA employed about 10,000 people in its computer division. Layoffs already have started at manufacturing facilities in Massachusetts, Florida, Maine and New Jersey. RCA computers accounted for

RCA computers accounted for about 4 per cent of the total market and in 1970 produced about \$225 million in revenues, 7 per cent of the company's total income.

Most of ROA's computer business is expected to go to IBM, which has about 70 per cent of the market. Scrambling for the balance will be Honeywell, Sperry Rand, Burroughs, National Cash Register and Control Data.

RCA's pullback was the biggest development in the industry since General Electric Co, gave up on its unprofitable computer business and sold it to Honeywell in October 1970. In another consolidation in 1969, Xerox Corp. acquired Sci-

entific Data Systems, Inc. Industry sources estimate there are 2,000 to 3,000 companies operating in all sectors of the computer industry with employment, including operating and programming personnel, approximating one million.


