the time, we are informed that our atellite photos of what is going on inside Russia reveal the construction of a new kind of silo or emplacement for what may be some new kind of Russian

In another story of the day, we are told that our admirals are seriously concerned over the way the Russians are building up their navy while we are allowing ours to decline. They tell us our admirals, that, unless this trend is altered, the day will come when any showdown at sea anywhere in the world would go against the United States.

It is getting to be appropriations time again, and our military have a confirmed habit of seeing peril abroad when they want to defend their own spending line at home.

But that consideration alone does not dispose of the fact that there is a missile race in progress and a sea power race

Confronted with such facts, what is the average citizen to think and do? Does he follow his own escapist instincts and decide that, since there is nothing more foolish and unprofitable for big nations to do than engage in races for more missiles and more sea power, he can safely dismiss all reports

Can he decide, to his own satisfaction, that certain things are not really going to happen, which means there is no real need for him to bestir himself or commit himself one way or another?

Or is he himself convinced that the super power game is the natural and inevitable law of this earth jungle of ours, in which case he resigns himself to the grim fate of being part of a system of life which periodically winds itself up to some blood-letting purge of

One of the troubles with the world, of course, is that this fancled average citizen never does draw himself any positive alternative. He may seek season still has in store. refuge in his own instinctive refusal to believe that the stupidity has to keep happening, over and over again. Or he may give his compliance and support to the system that has never worked on the ground that has become the only realistic thing to do. Either way, he lets himself be part of the process which keeps drawing his world into the same senseless cycle, over and over.

Either way, sticking his head in the hand, or following a consensus he imagines, the citizen makes himself a partner and helper to the very things he would like to rule out of the conduct of men and nations. He gets ready for war because he does

not know how to make anything else seem a reasonable, practical option. He counters the danger of being caught without enough missiles and without enough warships by courting the danger that lies in reaching for more missiles and more warships. He concedes that, hard, by the tough, realistic rules he nimself thinks he abhors. He rules, by his own aubmission, that the senseless

The answers are hard and unpleasant, and they will continue so until we average people somehow find some way of applying leverage to the United Nations concept again, raising it back high enough for all to see it, helping it burst out of the bonds the big powers have bound it with, and then belping it grow power of its own sufficient to make it the master, rather than the victim, of those compulsions which would keep grinding us through the same kind of mill, generation after generation, if we

Help For The Working Mother As part of his plans for a "new soci


ety," French Premier Jacques Chaban-Delmas recently announced a dual social reform which introduces a new approach to the problem of the family and the working mother. The chief innovation will be that mothers in the lowest income brackets who

opt to work will be given a special allowance to help pay for day care for their children. This will be in addition to the regular family allowance accorded for each child. The second half of the reform will be

an increase in the existing allowance for households with a single wage earner. This allowance, initiated in 1966, is currently paid to all heads of families whose wives do not work. Under the planned revision, it will be substantially increased for families of two or more children with earnings under a certain ceiling, but it will be suppressed for higher income brackets. The aim of the reform is twofold: to

help maintain living standards at the lowest wage level, and to make it easier for the mother to choose between working and being a full-time homemaker. Some married women have felt compelled to take a job to supplement the family income. The new plan is intended to remove this sense of compulsion, If the woman prefers to stay at home she should be able to do so. On the other hand many married women feel frustrated by being tied to the home and want a wider sphere of activity and inerest. The "new society" recognizes this desire for greater emancipation and

As Thierry Mauinier, member of the French Academy, points out in the Paris daily. Le Figaro, the reform may seem modest measure on the face of it, since its application is limited to the lowest wage groups, but its social implications are much broader. It could, he says, have "very great consequences on the structure of the labor market and perhaps on that of society itself." THE BOARD APPARENTLY ACCEPTS THE POSITION THAT THIS WORK CAN BE ALLOWED UNDER A THEORY OF "HUMANITARIAN DUTY." IF THIS THEORY IS ACCEPTED, IT SHOULD BE EXTENDED TO ALL TAXPAYERS OF MANCHESTER.

THE ONLY REASON THIS MATTER WAS EVEN MENTIONED BY THE M.P.O.A. WAS THAT MR. FAIR-BANKS COULD NOT ACCOUNT FOR THE MATERIAL IN HIS INITIAL INTERVIEW WITH THE M.P.O.A. As it stands now, the inventory the Board furnished varies drastically with that given by Mr. Fairbanks




