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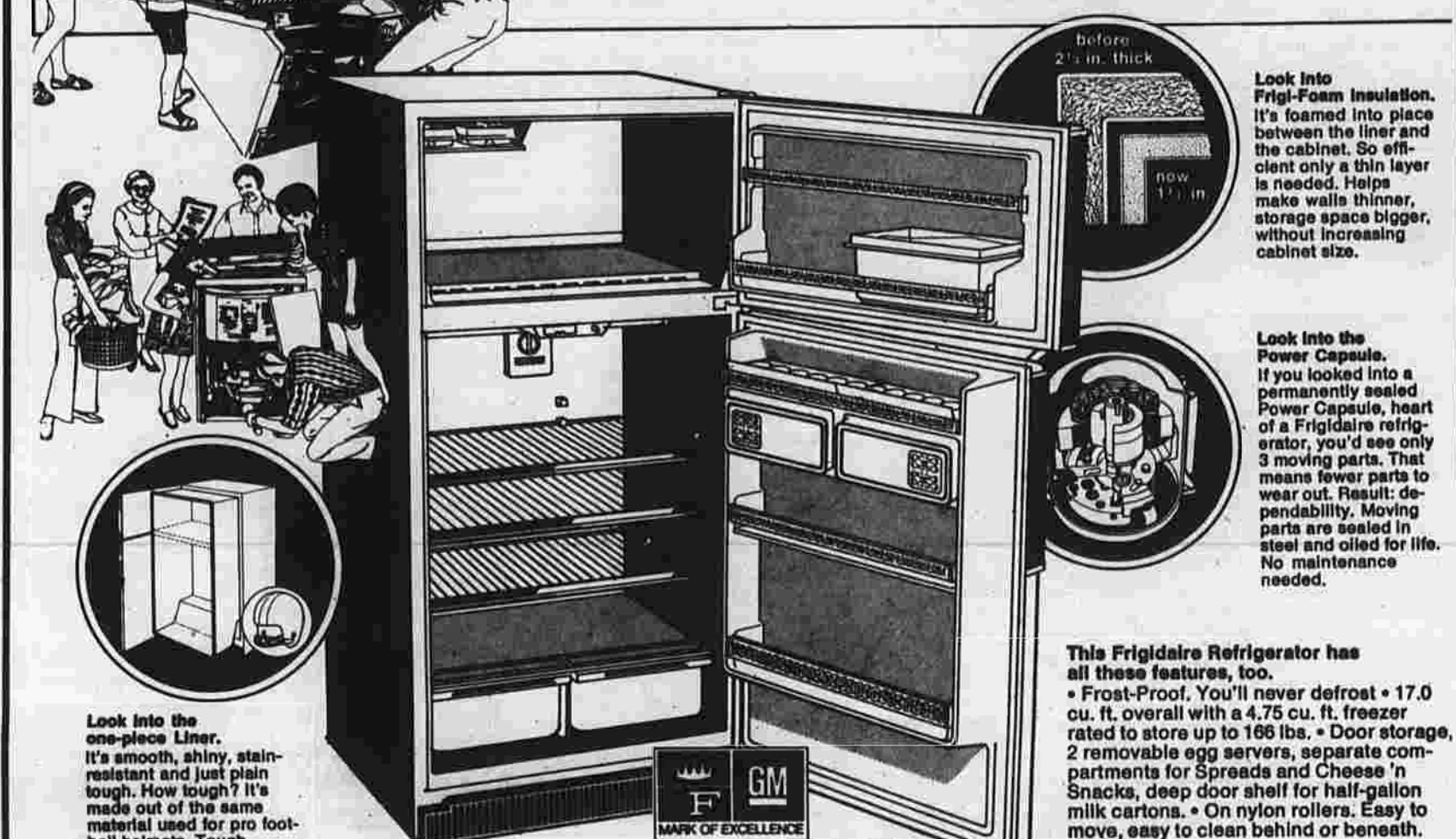

GIs Leave Border Base After Shelling Nixon Picks Director Of Pay Board

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. troops pulled out of the only American artillery base on the Cambodian border today after 28 days of North Vietnamese shelling and two incidents of GIs being taken out on patrol. The Americans left the Fire Base base to the South Vietnamese garrison that had held the base since the war. The base was left behind their four big guns, but the U.S. Command said they would be taken out later. Five U.S. infantrymen at the base objected on Oct. 9 to going out on a night ambush patrol, claiming it was an "unnecessary risk." The patrol was canceled and the men's company was replaced by a Viet Cong unit. Today it was learned that 20 men in the replacement company refused to go on patrol soon after arriving at the border post. Maj. Gen. Jack Wagstaff, commander of U.S. forces in the 3rd Military Region, said the base commander persuaded them to move out, and "the whole thing was over in 30 minutes." Both the U.S. Command and Wagstaff said the removal of U.S. troops from Fire Base was planned for some time as part of the Vietnamization program, but some senior officers conceded that the two incidents apparently hastened the withdrawal order. "The publicity was causing all kinds of consternation in the states," said one officer. "If I were a private citizen and read about my army like that, I'd be very upset." Face was the fourth American artillery base in the Cambodian border region to be evacuated in the month, although North Vietnamese troops have been on the offensive in the region to military northwest of Saigon since Sept. 28. Food Price Dip Slows Rise In Cost of Living

WASHINGTON (AP)—The biggest drop in food prices in four years sharply slowed September's overall rise in living costs in the first full month of President Nixon's freeze on prices and wages, the government said today. Grocery prices fell one per cent because of a shorter average and the decline in automobile prices also helped. The average pay check was down last month's consumer price average, said the Bureau of Economic Analysis. The government's Consumer Price Index, measuring prices of goods and services, rose 0.2 per cent in September, the lowest for the first quarter of 1971 ending in September. Prices rose at an annual rate of 3.3 per cent, the lowest for any quarter since 1967. The report included some price hikes from before the freeze, which began Aug. 15, and the exact effect of the freeze on overall living prices could not be precisely measured, the report said. The rise brought the price index up to 124.8 in September, meaning it took \$12.24 last month for every \$10 in the base period four years ago. U.S. Economy In Slowdown For Quarter

WASHINGTON (AP)—The nation's economy slowed in the July-September quarter, with output rising at a 3 per cent annual rate, the Commerce Department said today. Gross National Product, market value of the nation's production of goods and services, increased by \$10 billion in the third quarter, but only half of the estimated 6 per cent growth was in terms of noninflation-adjusted figures. But while the economy's growth rate slowed, the rate of inflation as measured by GNP also slackened, dropping to 3.3 per cent, the lowest this year. In the second quarter, inflation rose at a 4 per cent rate of increase and the economy grew by 4.7 per cent in terms of noninflation-adjusted figures. The department blamed the economic slowdown on what it called the "correction of steel inventories," which ballooned in the early part of the year as a hedge against a possible strike, declined sharply in the third quarter as steel companies got rid of their surplus inventories. The department said third-quarter GNP reached a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$109 billion, according to preliminary figures announced. Final GNP figures will be completed next month. Sales increased by \$20 billion in the third quarter, but this was offset by the \$4 billion drop in steel inventories. The new report gave the Nixon administration a boost as it seeks to spur economic growth to cut into unemployment, which has stayed above 6 per cent since Nixon has predicted the economy will show a strong upsurge in the last four months of the year. The Commerce Department said consumer spending increased \$11.35 billion in the third quarter and outlays for services climbed \$2.25 billion. Automobile purchases were up by \$1 billion, mostly because of Nixon's proposal to reduce the automobile excise tax. The report provided the administration with hope that consumer spending may be beginning to pick up. The savings rate of Americans, which has been well over 8 per cent of disposable personal income all year, fell to 7.5 per cent. (See Page Eight)

Supreme Court Nominees May Escape Senate Battle

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon's nomination of Lewis F. Powell Jr. and William H. Rehnquist to the Supreme Court has left battle-primed Senate Democrats without their expected targets. The President disclosed his choices for the two court vacancies in a television-radio address to the nation Thursday night. The immediate reaction, in and out of Congress, indicated they would be expected to face a Senate battle that has divided the Senate in the past. Powell, 64, a Richmond, Va., trial lawyer, and Rehnquist, 47, an assistant attorney general, were described by Nixon as judicial conservatives like himself. He indicated he expects a shift in the balance of power in American society against "the peace forces." He said, however, that "their sole obligation is to the Constitution and the American people and not to the President who appointed them." Republicans in Congress were generally quick to laud the President's selections. And even such Democratic senators as Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts and Birch Bayh of Indiana, who had been blasting Nixon's rumored choices, had no fault to find. Nominee Rehnquist Called 'Fantastic' by President

BY JAMES PHILLIPS WASHINGTON (AP)—A lawyer who left his practice in Phoenix, Ariz., to follow his law-and-order conservatism to the Nixon administration's justice department stands today as a Supreme Court nominee. The President who nominated him Thursday night thinks William H. Rehnquist is "fantastic." Rehnquist, an assistant attorney general, wasn't saying what he thought of the nomination. "You can't be shot for what you don't say," he told questioners, declining further comment until after the Senate has acted. In Rehnquist, the President found a nominee about whose legal stance there could be little doubt. He has been interpreting law for the administration since 1969 as chief of the Department's Office of Legal Counsel. (See Page Four)

Seven Burned in Memphis Firebombing

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—Seven white persons were burned early today when three homemade firebombs were tossed into a tavern. Police said later they were seeking white men seen fleeing the scene. The incident caught three nights of violence, disorder and looting in black residential neighborhoods of this Mississippi River city, but there was no apparent connection with the other trouble. Calm returned to the city with daylight. Police said the bombs exploded in the Red Lantern Lounge, just hours after a 3-year-old Negro boy was struck and killed by a police cruiser on route to another firebombing. The trouble began during the funeral Tuesday night of a black teenager, arrested after a police chase and whose death is listed by the district attorney at Memphis as homicide. That death occurred a week ago tonight and 22 policemen have been suspended temporarily pending an investigation. Fire Chief Eddie Hamilton said two women were among those injured when the bombs, made from gasoline and soap, were tossed into the tavern. One man was severely burned and in critical condition, he said. Of the seven injured, five remained hospitalized. "These bombs were made just like napalm bombs," Hamilton said. (See Page Thirteen)

Northeast Elementary School Plans

The Northeast Elementary School, a four-story, one-building structure designed to be erected on an approximately 12-acre tract at Kennedy Rd. and Kent Dr., is one of three school referenda to be submitted to voters Nov. 2.

The proposed 96,885-square-foot school is divided as follows: 25,000 for basic educational spaces (kindergarten, instructional areas, special education); 23,700 for other educational spaces (science, art, woodworking, speech and hearing, production, library-media center, gymnasium and locker rooms, music, educational storage, cafeteria); 2,700 for administrative spaces (offices, health unit, staff work); and 4,485 for service areas (kitchen and storage, custodial, mechanical, grounds storage, lavatories).

Facilities are planned to accommodate 650 children in Grades 1-6 and another 100 in two kindergarten rooms.

Although the floor plans shown here are of two basic levels, each is composed of two half-levels. The levels of the main structure, whose length would be northwesterly-southeasterly in direction, are adapted to the gently sloping southern terrain.

In the plan below, the lowest level, facing Kennedy Rd. to the south, has been designed to contain the audio-visual center, art and woodworking areas, two rooms for handicapped children, and a music room.

A half level up and closest to Kennedy Rd. are the gymnasium and shower and locker room facilities. Tentative plans are for bleachers, seating approximately 300, along one side

of the gym. These facilities, with adjoining parking areas, have been planned for community as well as school use.

Also at this level are the kindergarten rooms; to their rear, special education and speech and hearing rooms; between the kindergarten and main instructional area, teacher work areas; and at the front, administrative offices and health services.

The media center, the "market place" of the school, and an adjoining science area are located in the entire center portion of the second half level of the large instructional area; and nine general classrooms at the north and east sides of the building complete this level.

In the above plan, the entire third half level above the media center would be occupied by seven general classrooms facing Kennedy Rd.

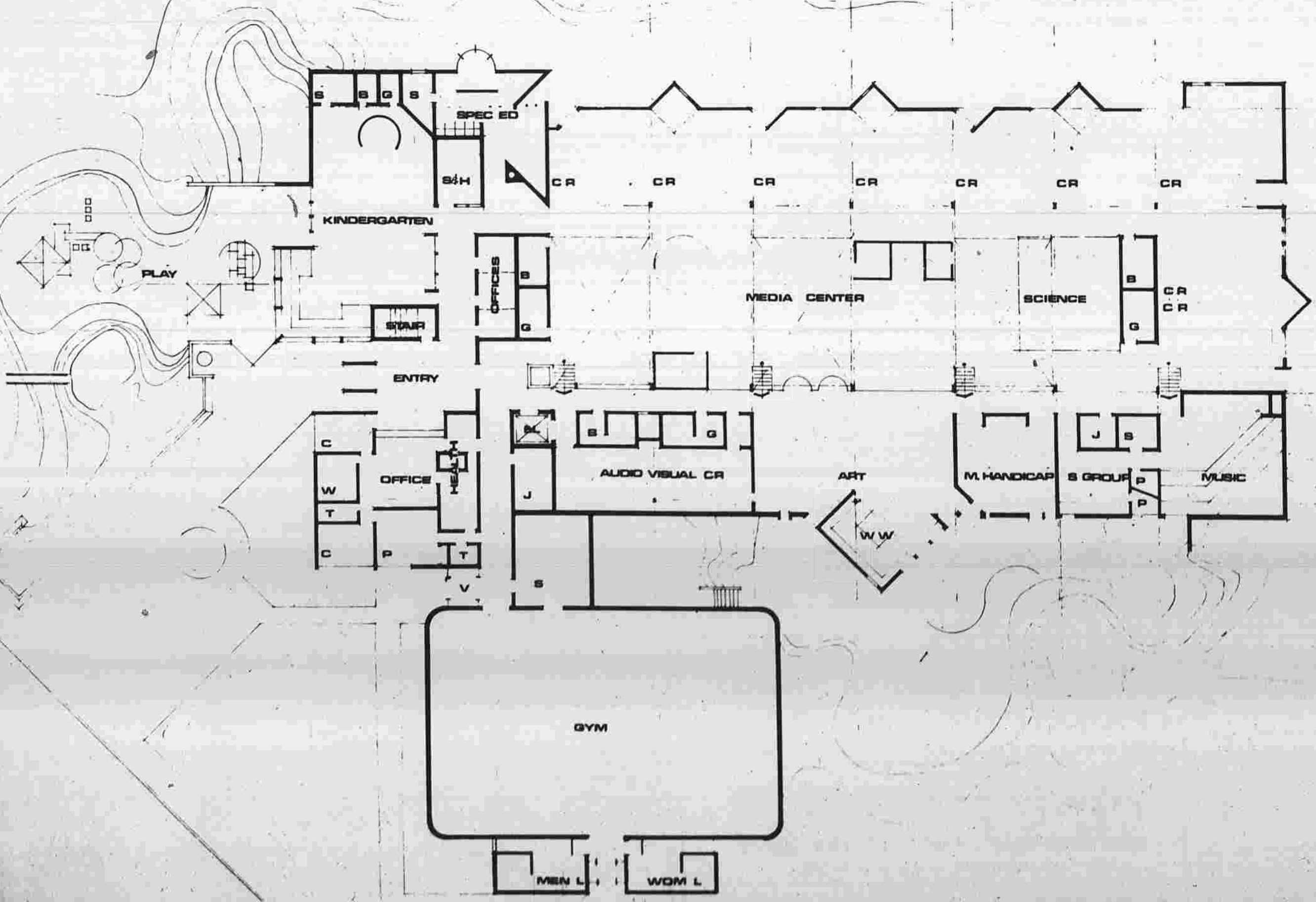
On the fourth half level are three large group instructional areas (lots) running above and across the media center. They open into two smaller seminar rooms at the rear of the building. The lot areas can also serve as corridors for traffic flow between the seminar rooms and lower levels. From the multi-classrooms, children will be able to look down into the media center as part of the school's philosophy to provide as much exposure as possible to educational areas and materials.

Completing the fourth half level is the cafeteria above the kindergarten. Two ramps from Kent Dr. would provide vehicular service approaches to the kitchen and cafeteria.

It is planned to keep the rough terrain to the west of the school in its present state, as much as possible, for nature study. Game fields and other recreational facilities would be located to the east.

In making their June presentation to the Town Building Committee, Board of Education, and school administrators, representatives of the Bloomfield architectural firm of Stocker and Colavecchio stated that the main objectives in their basic concept for the Northeast Elementary School were to make the media center the "market place," or heart, of the plan; locate special facilities so all children can participate and observe.

Also, establish a lineal scheme for future expansion, site implications, and maximum exposures on circulation routes; and establish these routes to permit all children to interact with each other in all the activities taking place in the school.

Tolland County Superior Court

The first youth was accepted under the new Youthful Offender Act in Tolland County Superior Court yesterday. A private hearing was held in the chambers of Judge Henry J. Naruk to consider the application of James W. Howard, 17, of Bakersfield, Calif.

He was arrested along with 22 others, mostly students at the University of Connecticut, last spring and charged with three counts of sale of controlled drugs.

Under the provisions of the act any 16-to-18-year-old youth charged with any crime other than a Class A felony (murder or kidnapping) may apply for eligibility and if accepted by the court, from then on all proceedings are not publicized. Most importantly, even if convicted of a youthful offender crime, punished the youth has accumulated no criminal record in the process.

Once application for the status of youthful offender is made in open court the probation officer does a preliminary investigation to determine basic eligibility and then it is up to the court to decide, based on the severity of the alleged crime and the results of all examinations, whether or not the youth may be accepted in the new category.

Yesterday Howard was accepted and no further information in the case will be made public. His father flew out from California to be present for the first of its kind proceedings in this county.

According to Probation Officer Paul J. McCreary six applications for youthful offender status have already been made to his office which covers Tolland County Superior Court and the 12th Circuit Courts in Manchester, Rockville and Stafford Springs.

The act, Public Act 72, became effective Oct. 1.

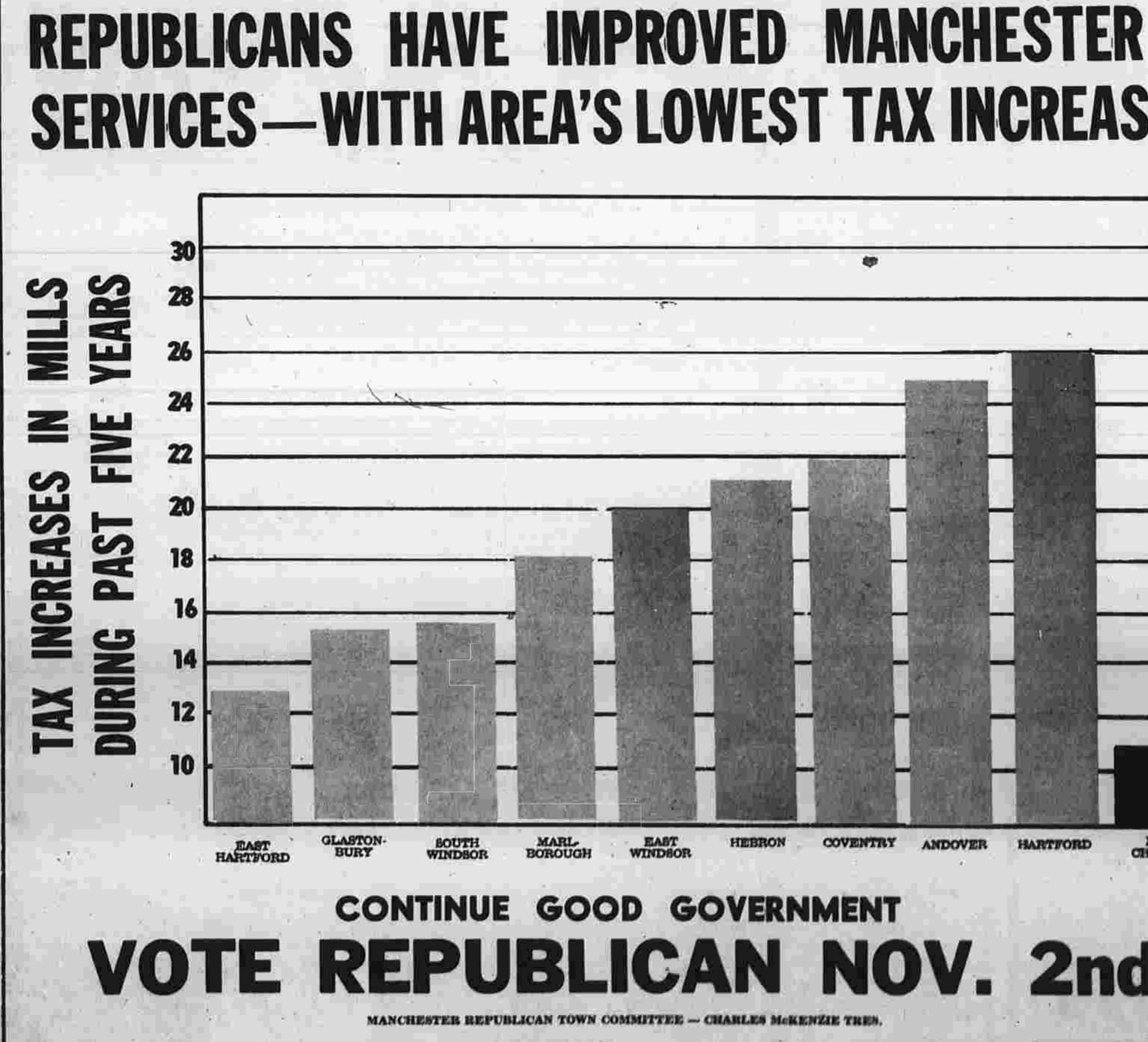

Andover Lunch Program Deficit Is Topic at PTA Meeting

The Andover PTA, Tuesday night sponsored a group discussion with the theme of "where do we go from here?"

Nearly 100 people turned out for the discussion. Principal Donald Libby spoke on two subjects of current importance. The first was the perennial sore-spot, the school's lunch program.

"The lunch program is in a bad way," Libby said, "and we must decide whether to keep the program or to let it go defunct." Libby said that with daily luncheon wage costs of over \$3, milk costs of \$4 and food cost of \$1, there is a total daily cost of over \$10.

Starting from the beginning of the school year, Libby said the daily paid lunches averaged \$50, adult lunches another \$4.80, that of milk, \$7.25 with an additional 70 cents for milk sold other than with lunches. Government subsidies for food and milk came to another \$17 for a net total of some \$60.

He said the lunch program is running a \$40 per day deficit, and while there is still some money remaining in the lunch budget from a previous year when the town paid luncheon salaries, this would soon disappear.

Libby said that according to a representative of the State Department of Education, increased participation would be necessary to keep the program going. He said the small student population at the school makes it difficult to increase participation very much.

One solution, according to Libby, would be to utilize a government surplus food program, which would allow the school to use surplus food. However, he said, "what can you do with grapefruit sections and lima beans?" He said under the program, a school may request any item in any quantity, "but they keep sending us lima beans."

"If we could alternate between pizza and grinder days, we probably would have all the participation we need," but that would leave the school with all those lima beans. The decision on whether to continue the program or to let it go defunct is up to the PTA.

Other parents said that they prefer to give their children lunches on days when the youngsters don't like the school menu.

Another questionnaire concerning what goals were desirable for both the children and the school, was distributed. Libby said he would compile all of the answers and try to include some of the findings in the school's weekly newsletter to the parents.

Those Pesky Cold Sores; Hiding, Wait to Emerge

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Some scientists speculate the pesky cold sore virus may hide for months in nerve cells and then dart out when your body undergoes some stress, a medical scientist reports.

The herpes virus, after its retreat to nerve cells and live there for months as "subviral" units, may be reactivated by stress, and eventually be triggered by some physical or emotional stress. To prove that the cold sore virus retracts to nerve cells, the UCLA scientists injected it into the footpads of mice. The mice suffered paralysis of their limbs as a result, but recovery was complete after a few days.

Several months later, the nerve tissue was removed and placed in a tissue culture. The virus began to grow, providing the proof.

The search now is for an explanation of how the virus enters the cell and how it leaves. Medical scientists have suspected that the virus harbors the herpes virus but no direct evidence has been found.

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Soviet Union Tightens Penalties on VD Spread

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet government has launched a major propaganda campaign against venereal disease and stiffened penalties for those who knowingly infect others.

President Nikhita Khrushchev on Oct. 1 signed a decree providing for up to three years imprisonment for anyone knowingly passing on syphilis or gonorrhea. One year in prison was prescribed for persons who do not get treatment after being ordered to do so by the health authorities.

Under a nationwide health system, Russians can get free treatment for VD at special institutes and clinics in most major cities. 23 of them in Moscow.

Nikhita stressed that the state can order emergency hospitalization for anyone infected with syphilis. Such patients are also required to submit to regular checkups for two to five years after they are released from the hospital.

Nikhita said medical teams are traveling to every city and in capitalist countries, venereal disease is increasing because of unemployment, prostitution, the cult of sex and the absence of a state system to fight it.

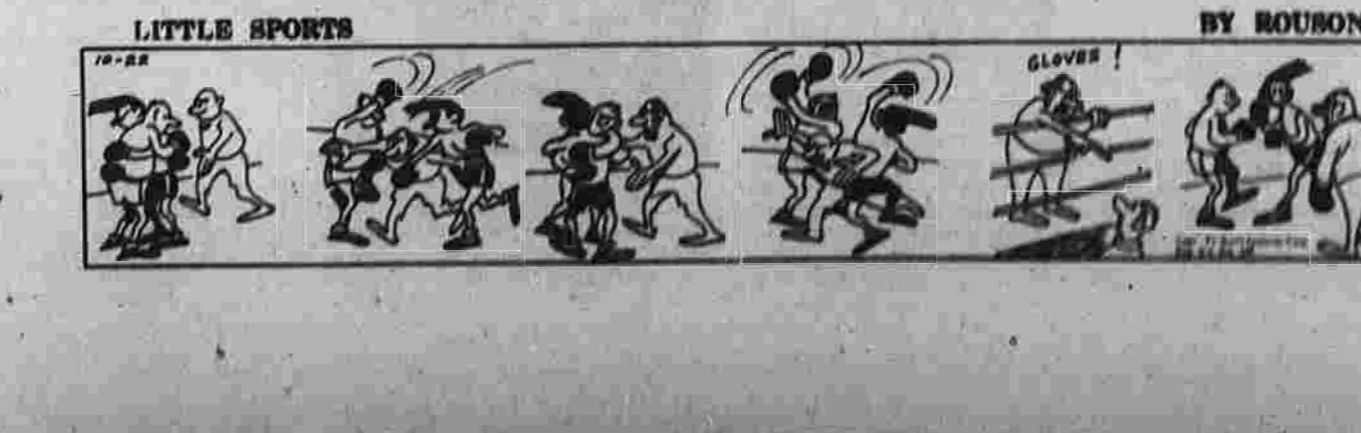
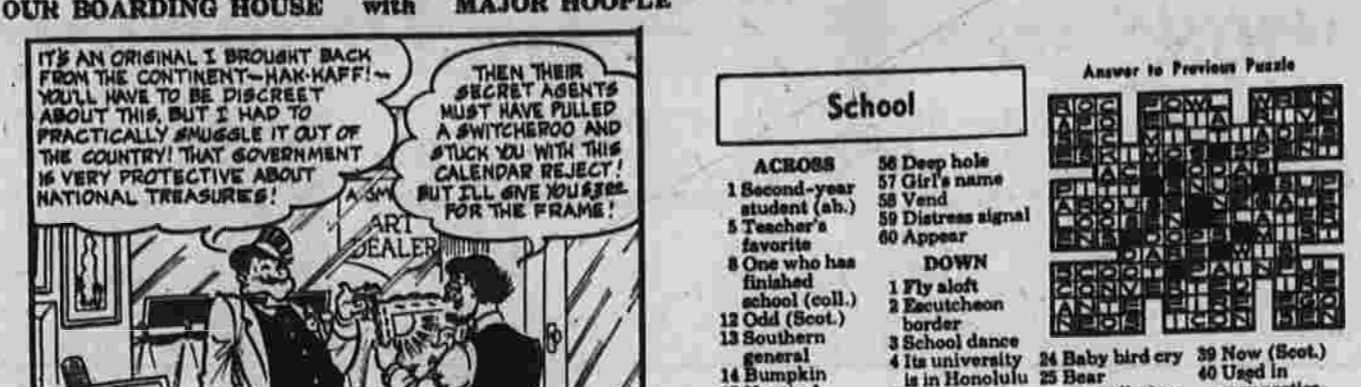
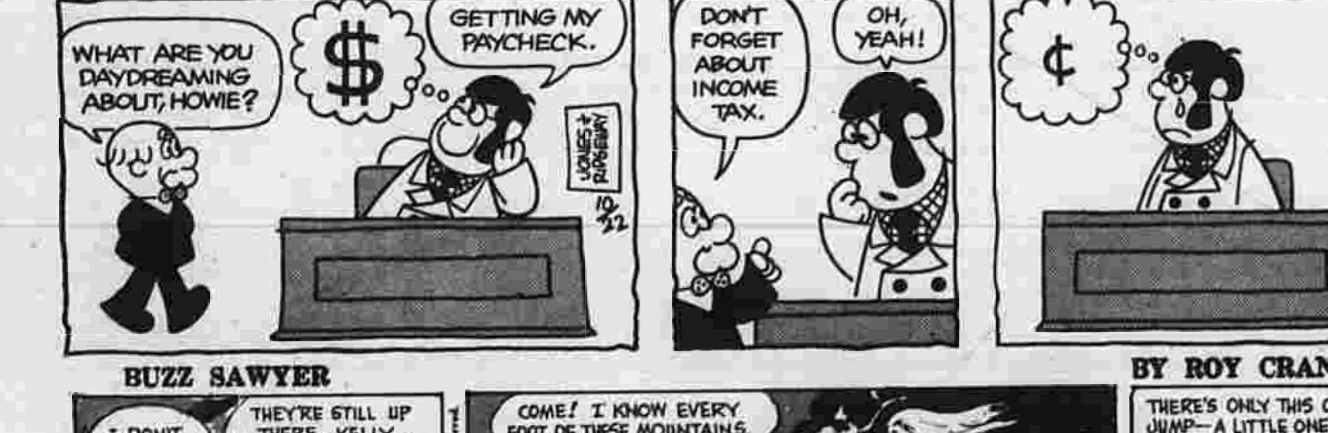
