

WASHINGTON (AP)-President Nixon's nomina-tion of Lewis F. Powell Jr. and William H. Rehnquist to the Supreme Court has left battle-primed Senate Democrats without their expected targets.

The President disclosed his choices for the two court vacancles in a television-radio address to the nation Thursday night. The immediate reaction, and out of Congress, indicated they may escape bruising battles that have divided the Senate in the recent past.

Powell, 64, a Richmond, Va., trial lawyer, and Rehnquist, 47. an assistant attorney general, were described by Nixon as judicial conservatives like him-self. He indicated he expects them to correct what he called a shift in the balance of power in American society against "the peace forces."

He said, however, that "their sole obligation is to the Constitution and the American people and not to the President who appointed them."

Republicans in Congress were generally quick to laud the President's selections. And even such Democratic senators as Edward M. Kennedy of Mas-sachusetts and Birch Bayh of Indiana, who had been blasting Nixon's rumored choices, had no fault to voice.

Bayh said Powell and Rehnquist "appear to be sig-nificantly better qualified" than some of the names that had been leaked as under consideration to fill the vacancies created by retirement of John M. Harlan and the late Hugo L. Black.

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### A Pleasant Surprise

Until the President began mentioning names last night, this nation had been given reason to fear that he was somehow engaged in a deliberate search for a lack of distinction for his next appointees to the Supreme Court.

Whether it was due to the newly found muscle of the American Bar Association screening committee, or to the President's better secret intentions all along, the actual selections proved a surprise as to identity and as to calibre.

The result is that, today, there is wary disposition to congratulate the President and expect a non-controversial course of approval by the Sciate.

The wariness still lingering in the situation is justified by the fact that everybody has been burned once or twice before, by the assumption that a presidential appointee must have been thoroughly investigated before he was announced.

But the general expectation is that we are in for a more pleasant experience this time.

The main thing President Nixon seems to have done, at last, is to demonstrate that he could find potential judges who would share his own conservative views and who could also be rated creditably on the basis of their professional record and their legal mind. Perhaps the President could have found better nominees. perhaps many more better nominees. These are, however, presentable.

### Cambodia Gives Up A "Game"

Premier Lon Nol of Cambodia, whom our policy thinks it likes better than it did Prince Norodom, asked himself a rhetorical question the other day, which he followed with a decree.

"Should we," he asked, "vainly play the game of democracy and freedom that will lead us to complete defeat or should we curtail anarchic freedom in order to achieve victory?"

And his answer to his own question "The Government has made its decision. We have selected the way that

will bring us to victory." That way was to suspend the Cambodian national assembly and to announce that, henceforth, Premier Lon Nol would

be operating the government by decree rather than by constitutional law. Politically, Washington is embarrassed, to have Cambodia, in the wake of the one-candidate election in Saigon, showing a similar lack of dedication to the forms of government which might conceivably, some day, lead to the de-

cracy. Practically, Washington may find itself in some quiet agreement with Premier Lon Nol, at least on the point that he may be able to rule more efficiently by himself than with an obstacle National Assembly in his way.

But, whatever the Lon Nol statement does to Washington, its main service is to represent and express, with bruta rankness, the instinctive attitude of the whole Asian culture toward the political blessings so many Americans have sincerely hoped to be able to spread to that

It remains, probably to a great ma jority of Asians, "the game of democracy and freedom," not only as it is offered to them, but, we must suspect, as they sometimes analyze its operation for us. We enshrine it not as a game but as cur hollest principle of national life. But those who do not share our dedication to it, or our hopes for it, concentrate easily on its imperfections, which continue to be many. And it is really in our own concentration on those imperfections, to remedy them, rather than in our sometimes too complacent assumption that we are the best, that our real hope of influencing and helping the world has to be found.

### How Humane Can You Get?

It has now been certified, by benign verdict of a special panel of veterinarians called together by the Department of Commerce, that the annual harvesting of seals on the Pribilof Islands is "highly efficient and humane."

Secretary of Commerce Maurice I Stans hopes that the release of this report will "put to rest once and for all false rumors of brutality and poor conservation practices being circulated by a few yocal critics."

The crux of the matter of humaneness came down to the panel's defense of the use of a five-foot two-inch hardwood bat or club which is used, by hunters who have evolved skill with the clubs over 100 years, to stun the seals before they are bled to death.

"Clubbing," read the official language, "as indicated by visual observations and necropsy studies, is a rapid, highly efficient and humane method of rendering the animal unconscious when properly performed. Occasional instances occur when more than one blow is required. These instances generally result from the presence of older bulls, which con-

stitute a hazard to the sealers." That seems to cover just about everything, except the possible opinion of the seals themselves, who were not interviewed.

### Welfare Group's Assault

Whether one believes that the State's current level of welfare payments is adedeplores the ordered 15 per cent cut in benefits, and whether one had adopted or rejected the concept of welfare as a "right," there can be no acceptance of the slightest toleration of the kind of behavior that passed for a welfare demonstration at the State Capitol before the

Ends which are self-serving. Gov. Meskill's prompt and forthright statement that the intimidation of elect ed officials cannot be tolerated was the right answe to the belligerent welfare demonstrators.

The grievance of the welfare recipients is one that is tied to the present state of Connecticut's economy and the need for a tight grip on government spending - it is unfortunate that some are bent on making it a political issue, even to the extent of making provacative speeches, as was the case when some Democratic legislator spoke at a rally here last week.

The right to protest about reduced benefits does not, however, give welfare recipients the right to invade a hearing of the Legislature's Education Committee and prevent it from being carried out. The group had no legal right to interfere even if the Education Committee had anything to do with the welfare question, which it does not. Nor did it have any right to take over, by force, any room or part of the State Capitol. And physical nanhandling of legislators, both men nd women, is out and out hoodlumism. The welfare protestors have been receiving considerable counsel and encouragement from Legal Assistance attorneys (who are supported by public funds hemselves), and the question arises whether the conduct exhibited in Hartford is to be condoned or whether there will be some statement of condemnation of law-breaking and violation of the

rights of others. The citizens of this state, who elected their government and are governed by it, will not stand for any part of that government to be coerced by any group acting violently and outside the normal emocratic process.

Connecticut taxpayers have made i amply clear they want government spending to be kept in check. The governor is well attuned to the wishes of the ending and holding the line on taxes. In view of the present tight budget situation, we don't know on what ground the welfare demonstrators would want to hallenge Meskill's statement that "the State does not have enough money to ontinue welfare payments at the cur-

ent levels. ..." The plain fact is that the welfare recipients are carrying their story - in whatever fashion — to the wrong people The taxpayers, who are footing the bill are the ones to be sold on the need for higher welfare expenditures. Storming the State Capitol and assaulting legisla-tors is not the way to do it. - NEW HAVEN REGISTER
