Why not balance things out and live with what we have, recycling natural recources and materials, improving the quality of life, enhancing cultural values and excellence, but spurning growth as

Good Thing. The proponents of a "No-Growth So-ciety" also support the crusade for Zero-Population Growth. The two zeros go tother: population and GNP . And, with great force, they point out that if either pulation growth or economic growth ontinues at the recent exponential rates, we will come before long to an abolutely interolerable result.

We cannot continue these rates indefnitely, it should be quite obvious. So, say they, as a corrective measure why not attain zero growth and stabilize the lear old planet, making total peace with

Facing this seductive theory and these undeniable dangers, a group of scholars are about to dig into the implications of zero growth. They expect to ask a num-ber of questions: For example, if there is zero growth, if the GNP doesn't go up, then anybody who wants more than he has now will have to deprive somebody else. Think of the tensions that would

produce in society. How would the poor like zero growth? The poor inside an affluent society or the poor nations in the world? Obviously they would reject it altogether. Alree they look with suspicion upon most anti pollution crusades as conspiracies to rob them of the things others have aleady achieved. For them a No-Growth

society would be no Utopia—but the op-Humanity in many societies, though not all, has been conditioned to the idea. of growth as progress for a long time. Certainly the concept has been dominant since the birth of the Industrial Revolution, and perhaps since the beginning of the age of exploration. Indeed, the idea probably far more ancient than that

echnologies — are less arrogant and Most of us believe in a rising standard living. That requires some degree of rowth. But it seems evident that we seed to redefine our goals and standards. The rape of nature is not a worthy goal. Men once respected nature,

Perhaps we will reach a zero population growth situation in some nations. It has already virtually been attained here and there. That will help keep economic growth from striking intolerable levels This may give us time to revalue the terms of growth, emphasize quality in-stead of quantity, and prevent the disaster that worship of the Great God Growth might well bring. The banana was once called the "Apple of Paradise" and sometimes "Adam's Fig." A mythical story tells us that the serpent who tempted Eve in the Garden, of Eden, or Paradise, hid in a bunch of bananas. Some say banana leaves were the first articles of clothing and not fig leaves.

The banana is a native of the

East Indies, It requires a hot, damp climate with rich soil, and now is cultivated in all tropical countries. Only one stalk of bananas grow on a plant. The small end of the fruit points upward when growing and not down as we sometimes see them hanging in the grocery

Bananas are not allowed to ripen on the plant. They are almost always picked green. In areas where the banana is common, the natives use the fruit much as we would potatoes. They are fried, baked, boiled and are a staple in the diet of many poor people.

Originally, the name banana applied to those varieties which are consumed raw. Plantains were the cooking vari-sties. Today, there is not as much differentiation. In India, for example, all varieties are-called plantains.
