Instead it continued with the delusion that it still could speak for mainland as well. Had it given up this fiction, it might have survived longer. Its stubborness now may only give more impetus to the movement among the 85 per cent of the population who are native Taiwanese for self-determination within Taiwan.

The seating of Mao's China certainly makes the United Nations more repretive. But on the other hand it also creates more opportunities for disrup-tion and the veto. But the United Nations has always worked on the basis that conflicts exist in the world outside, and are reflected at the UN, and not vice versa. If conflict exists it is better that it be iiscussed, ventilated, and possibly desed within the UN rather than explode

vond its walls. The dismal truth too is that the kind of ce initiatives which the UN has taken in the past are no longer so readily forthcoming. It is possible to suggest is-sues on which the Chinese might use a veto where the Russians and Americans agree, say over India and Pakistan, bu past few years-without Chinahave not produced any great United Na tions contribution there. Increasingly the issue which is taking time at the United Nations is Southern Africa.
