Social scientists at the University of Michigan have just concluded a four year study of what happens to high school dropouts. They found that the popular assumption that dropouts had more trouble finding jobs than high school graduates, the percentage of dropouts who had full time jobs coming out of 71 as compared to 87 per cent of the graduates. They theorized, however, that many of the dropouts who had jobsness to personal factors which would still have been operating against them if they had completed high school.

But in two other respects, the results of the study reversed the common assumption. The study found that dropouts, once they had abandoned what had become for them the unequal struggle of school, tended to restore to self esteem which had been damaged in the competitive school experience.

Finally, the Michigan study came up with a statistic which is a real surprise. It found that among the people it studied, the average weekly income of the dropouts was \$119 while for the high school graduates it was only \$112.

Immediately, one imagines qualifications for that statistic. This was only a four year study, so the high school graduates, obviously, had surrendered a head start to the dropouts, while they themselves had not yet begun to hit their own potential stride.

We can't see how the Michigan survey really recommends dropping out, except, perhaps, for very special cases. But it does at least warn us all, once more, to beware of the glib generalization certainties which creep into even the best-intentioned public crusades.

Some dropouts make more money than some graduates. We happen, for our part, to consider that no more of a real argument for dropping out than the lure of making more money was ever a real argument for continuing in school. Education is supposed to help determine what kind of people we are, not how rich.

**Control With Loopholes**  
 One can employ a certain reliable rule of thumb for judging just how restrictive the new Pay Board is being in its new regulations for the nation's pay envelopes.

So long as labor's members of the Pay Board go along, and do not wash their hands of the whole business, one can assume that the Board's regulations aren't as severe as they may look, and must contain room for negotiation and interpretations labor expects to win.

The further corollary — a sad one but also an inescapable one in the state of our society — is that so long as organized labor tolerates the rule of the Pay Board, we are not likely to have an real firm control of inflation.

Strangely enough this — although it may be termed an unsatisfactory state of affairs — is probably within range of what President Nixon and his advisers really want, and within range of all anybody really wants them to try for right now.

The possibly common objective on which we might all agree is not any really efficient control of inflation down to the point where wages, profits, rents and prices are held motionless, but merely the attachment of some snubbing device which will keep the inflationary forces present in the economy and in our whole way of life from staging any wild runaway performance.

We don't really want — any of us — to enter upon a truly efficient set of controls. Our main reason is, quite simply, our fear that if we ever let such firm controls settle down on us now, in this particular period of economic trouble, we will never get rid of them again.

What President Nixon is trying to do — probably with the secret well-wishing of many of those who pretend to criticize him for not acting more authoritatively — is to hold the wild forces loose in the economy down to such proportions that we can roll with them and live with them and gentle them down until they become spent wakes in the rear of our economic progress instead of raging breakers ahead.

What this means, to be realistic, is that the Pay Board's directives are not supposed to sound impressive but must also contain loopholes, to hold the image of control while they still permit almost everybody to get away with something.

Or, to summarize, if inflation is still down, not really change our ways.

Since the ebb and flow of economies has been going on for some few centuries, without there ever yet having come about any such transformation of human and business nature as to produce any workable communal wisdom and practice, who knows there is really any higher objective than that of trying to sidle our way past the present danger of shipwreck?

Let the ship get off that reef today and put off steering for the millennium until tomorrow — that's all the President and any of the rest of us really want, and certainly as much as we are going to get.

**The Out Cure**

**Think Twice Before Resigning**  
 Please to members of boards and commissions and to city employees who are thinking about resigning if the wake of a "Resignation" is a "Resignation" twice. For the sake of your city and in recognition of the responsibility which you assume when you accept the position, consider staying on for a while longer.

**The Battle Of The Pay Board**

WASHINGTON — Just before the ten public and business members of the Pay Board outvoted the five labor members Monday, an exchange took place behind closed doors which intensified the vendetta between the Nixon administration and organized labor that so darkens economic prospects.

Arnold Weber, the ex-Nixon administration official who as a public member has emerged as the Pay Board's strong man, spelled out that the majority proposal permits retroactive granting of deferred pay raises for some of the biggest labor unions. To the AFL-CIO president, George Meany and other labor members, this constituted a blatant attempt to split labor's ranks.

"Thus, less than three weeks after President Nixon appointed Weber, George Meany and other Pay Board, big labor is fighting the administration has declared open war against it in Phase Two of the economic controls program. Both sides talk privately of widespread strikes erupting and retaliatory actions against labor.

What makes this so worrisome to thoughtful officials high in the Nixon administration is the unsettling effect on a shaky economy. Even if Phase Two survives the present turmoil, the economic prospects for next year are being undermined.

The present core of the dispute is the citizen boards and commissions. The charter provides an overlap in most of these, with staggered terms so that there will be continuity both of personnel and of policy. It is the duty of commissioners and board members to serve out their terms unless they are legally dismissed or until they find themselves in a position where they are no longer effective.

unions eligible for retroactive wage increases. The Independent Teamsters have been retroactively wooed by the Nixon administration. AFL-CIO officials have feared Teamsters' president Frank Fitzsimmons might be the one labor member of the board to defect.

Consequently, Meany and his lieutenants feel the Administration is less concerned about quelling inflation than splitting organized labor to give date during the 90-day wage-price freeze ending Nov. 18. By last Saturday, the Pay Board was divided into two armed camps. While labor members munched on drug store sandwiches brought into the Executive Office Building next to the White House, business and public members discussed strategy down the street over lunch at the Black Star Restaurant. Hope for a compromise had vanished.

The final version rained home, 10 to 5, Monday over labor objections have retroactive wage increases but gives the Pay Board power to grant exemptions under certain conditions. Included among those conditions is what Nixon officials call "Catch 22" — specifying that the board may grant retroactive increases "to remove severe inequities."

At Monday's meeting, Weber was asked who could benefit from these exemptions. His reply: East Coast and West Coast longshoremen, steelworkers, aerospace industry workers, coal miners and railroad workers. All these, said Weber, would be "taken care of."

Weber hastened to add this was but one man's opinion. But economic Weber, returning to the University of Chicago after a hitch with the Nixon administration (most recently as director of the Cost of Living Council), is the dominant member of the Pay Board and overhauls the nominal chairman, U.S. District Judge George Solt.

Meany was reduced "over Weber's answer. Would not this discriminate against the weak or labor unions without high-powered lawyers such as the retail clerks, the butchers and the laundry workers? President William Copies of Kenyon College, a former Inland Steel vice president, replied regretfully that there would be inequities.

Big labor's worst suspicions were confirmed after the meeting when members of the Pay Board's majority added the Teamsters to Weber's list of

**Connecticut Yankee**

 We don't think there is the slightest doubt that the supposed attitude of the people of Connecticut played a decisive part in the final outcome of last summer's tax drama, which ended with both the General Assembly and Governor Meskill throwing out an income tax which had already been enacted.

The political world assumed that there was a huge and genuine public outcry in Connecticut against the income tax.

There were, however, always reasons why this assumption by the political world could be questioned.

On the day when income tax fees from all over the state were scheduled to stage a mass meeting of many thousands at the Capitol, this columnist counted 380 actual demonstrators.

During all the period when the state was supposedly seething with protest, we encountered no ordinary citizen who seemed upset.

Admittedly, when a question was asked if one were opposed to an income tax, the answer could be almost automatically negative, as it might be for any other kind of tax.

Such legislators as we questioned about the extent of pressure they had received from their own constituents had surprising few letters and telephone calls.

Nevertheless, the impression of a fierce, massive state protest against the income tax did arise and did influence the outcome, both in the Governor's office and in the General Assembly.

This is why the vote up in Maine the other day must have created a perhaps anguished kind of reassessment, both on the part of the Governor, who might be enjoying serene fiscal weather now if he had far outdone law and the legislature to himself at some times appeared to want, and on the part of those in the Legislature who voted for the income tax once, in what will remain a great demonstration of courage, but then gave up the fight after the apparent appearance of ideal public protest convinced them the cause was lost.

Up in Maine on election day the voters of that state refused, 18,554 to 82,319, to repeal the new income tax on the state books. Before the vote, most of the state's political experts predicted the tax would be passed. After the vote, the Republican Governor Kenneth Curtis, who had supported the income tax, reported that the vote insured that "badly needed services and school subsidies will not be cut" and that "the fair part of all forms of taxation will remain part of the state's revenue system."

Another comment by a leader in the fight to retain the income tax was that "it was an enlightened electorate that went to the polls."

The point of this present comment is, of course, that we don't really believe that it was any particularly "enlightened" qualities of the Maine electorate which determined the outcome. We think it might also have happened that way even in unspecial, ordinary Connecticut.

Which makes a rather poignant post-mortem on what happened in Connecticut last summer because the political world assumed it knew what the Connecticut electorate was feeling and thinking.

### General Electric Denies Threat In Strike Pay Bid

BRIDGEPORT (AP) — The General Electric Co. today denied threatening to reconsider its decision to relocate its headquarters in Fairfield, if the legislature votes unemployment pay for strikers.

A spokesman for the Connecticut Business and Industry Association was quoted Wednesday as telling a legislative committee that GE would make such a reconsideration.

The company has already announced plans to move its corporate headquarters from New York City to the Fairfield site which it is already preparing for the office complex.

Said the GE statement: "General Electric has denied it will reconsider its construction of corporate headquarters in Fairfield on the issue of unemployment compensation benefits for strikers."

A company spokesman in Bridgeport notes that this issue was under consideration as part of the decision to relocate the facility but that the (Connecticut) General Assembly recently voted down the (strike) proposal "this past spring."

The statement said GE, however, will continue to oppose unemployment benefits for strikers.

The proposal defeated would have given strikers unemployment compensation after they had been idle for several weeks.

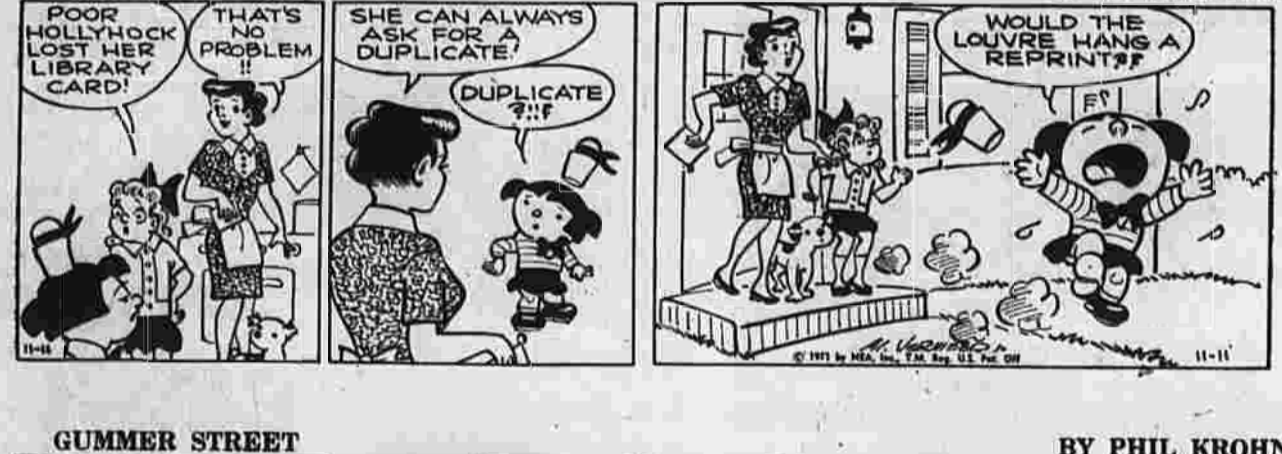

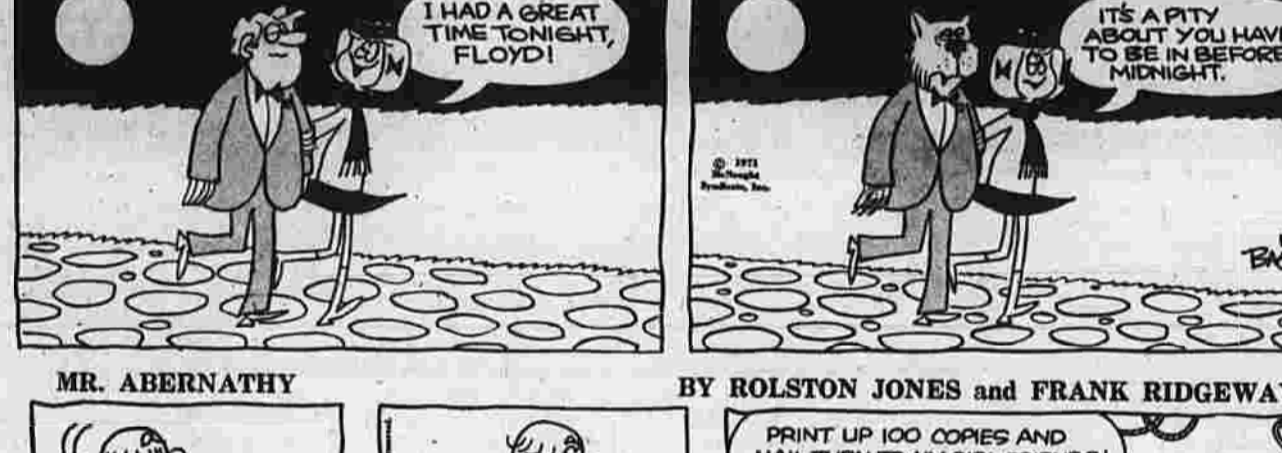

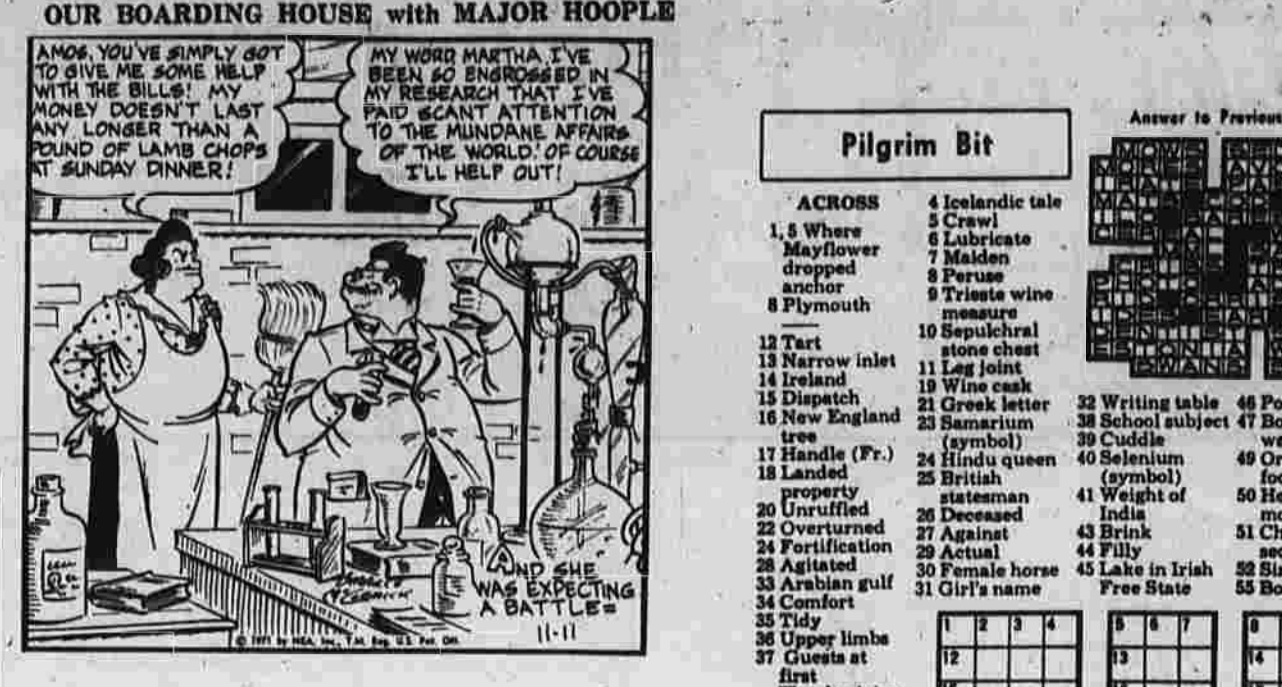
