Cong Casualties Reported Heavy In Major Battle

SANGON (AP) — The South Vietnamese command claimed today that American and South Vietnamese air strikes and ground troops killed 146 North Vietnamese in the second major battle in the central highlands this week.

A spokesman, Lt. Col. Do Viet, said there were no South Vietnamese casualties.

He said the action took place Thursday 15 miles east of the border of Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

This is close to the area of the battle last Sunday in which the South Vietnamese reported 168 North Vietnamese and 29 of their own men killed and 38 South Vietnamese wounded.

Rackley Case Judge Suspends Sentences For Black Panthers

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Both also were sentenced to suspended three months terms after pleading guilty to assault and battery on a police officer.

Nixon Faces Labor: Vows He'll Continue Efforts on Economy

MIAMI BEACH (AP) — President Nixon told a labor convention today he will continue his efforts to halt inflation whether or not he gets their cooperation.

Nixon told some 2,000 AFL-CIO delegates and others that he wanted continued labor participation in his wage-price control program.

Whether we get that participation or not, it is my obligation as President of the United States to make this program stop inflation succeed," Nixon said.

Pay Unit Allows Coal Agreement To Take Effect

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pay Board voted 10-3 today to allow the first year of the coal industry contract to go into effect without change.

The board said the second and third years of the contract will be voted on as they near implementation.

The board said the first-year provisions of the agreement between coal operators and United Mine Workers were "not unreasonably inconsistent with the criteria adopted by the board."

According to the business members of the 15-member board, the first year of the contract provides for an 11 per cent increase in wages and a 4 per cent boost in welfare benefits.

Living Costs Rise Despite Price Freeze

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government reported today that the cost of living rose two-tenths of one per cent last month despite the price freeze.

The increase was a result of higher prices for 1972 automobiles, winter and fall clothing and smelter.

The increase was about half the average month-to-month increase that prevailed before the price freeze began Aug. 15. It compares with a three-tenths of one per cent increase in August.

Prospect Up For Halt In Bus Service

HARTFORD (AP) — The prospect of three of the state's largest cities being left without bus service Sunday has increased as a result of the breakdown of contract negotiations.

Contract talks between the Connecticut Co. and the union representing bus drivers and mechanics broke off Thursday night without a settlement being reached.

The Connecticut Co. serves Hartford, New Haven and Stamford and carries more than 100,000 passengers daily.

A spokesman for the Amalgamated Transit Union, AFL-CIO, said the union rejected the company's latest proposal and that the company turned down the union's counter proposal.

No further negotiating sessions were planned Sunday because of the breakdown of talks available for additional talks.

Plans for a 55-unit apartment complex, which if approved would probably become Ver- non's most luxurious such de- velopment, were disclosed to the Zoning Commission last week.
Designed by the architectural firm of McHugh & Associates of West Hartford, with the help of Steinman of Long Island, Vir- ginia, and Philadelphia, the de- signer, the complex would be built in a cluster-type arrange- ment. It would be constructed on about six acres adjacent to the Vernon Garden Apartment complex on Rt. 82.
Drawings presented by Wil- liam McHugh last night re- vealed 21 units in each building and 210 units to be built in the first stage and the other units to be built in two more stages.
The parking facilities would be at a 2:1 ratio with provisions for the parking of 1,000 cars, 250 of which would be in covered carports.

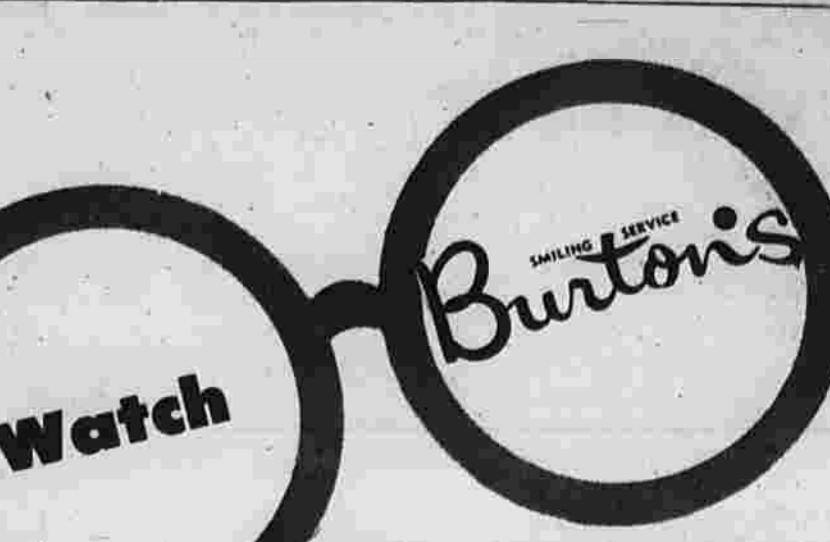

The absence of Constitution and Parliament creates a little more convenience for the dictatorship of the moment, and that seems to be all. It would seem, that the coup in Thailand makes relatively little difference to the United States. The regime which was in power and which has now consolidated its grip has always played ball with our own purposes in Southeast Asia. We have never gone overboard in claiming that Thailand was our ally because it was a democracy. In summary, if one could imagine a coup which made almost no difference at all to anybody, Premier Thanom Kittikachorn's would seem to come close to qualifying.

Returned to Life
The ancient Hebrew lawyers, wise men, they decreed that every seventh year the land should be left fallow. That is, left uncultivated so that it could rebuild itself. This caused the Roman historian, Tacitus, to complain later that the Jews devoted every seventh year to idleness. Not being true that was a canard, but a misplaced one. Instead, the lamentation should have been that this wisdom of agronomy was not incorporated in those commandments handed down on Mount Sinai. After all, what's good for the vineyard ought to be good for the laborer there within.

Train Subsidy Unfair Too
The kind of messy tangle the breakdown of mass transportation systems leaves for the public domain is illustrated sharply by the validity of a principle Governor Meadall has enunciated with regard to buses which he himself is part of the violation of the same principle when it comes to trains. Governor Meadall says, quite logically, that for the state alone to assume all financial responsibility for keeping the buses running would be to take tax money contributed by Connecticut localities and people in no way involved with buses and spend it for the benefit of those particular communities where buses do run and would be kept running. But the state has already contributed millions of dollars, and continues to contribute millions, to the continued operation of a railroad service which reaches only a percentage of the people who pay the taxes with which the state finances its subsidy.

This is just as unfair, and unprincipled, as it would be to have the state subsidize the operation of buses which serve only a percentage of the state's population. Why did the state enter into its subsidy of trains without trying to assess part of the cost to those particular cities and towns which were, by their geographical location, most likely to receive some service from the trains? The answer would seem to be that no one would have known how to solve the problem of setting the proper assessment for each individual community or the further problem of selling the people of each community on the idea that they should pay.

We suspect, from the reaction of Connecticut mayors to the Governor's stand, that the same difficulty lies ahead of any subsidy should be divided among the various communities involved, let alone the effort to persuade these communities they should chip in financially. The fact that we are already doing with trains what Governor Meadall refuses to do with buses doesn't mean that it is right. The sad truth is that what might be right, and fair, and equitable is not to be found in any of the solutions to the recurrent situation in which private enterprise, having operated special franchises for generations at profit, suddenly turns around and points the shotgun of its own bankruptcy at the public.

One common concern, in such an unhappy situation, is that nobody, who ever it is, shall be too generous in bailing out the private enterprise which now seeks help in the franchise it was once eager to have. Beyond that, the top priority goes to the selection of whatever system of rescue will work. It seems to us that, even with injustice built in as it has already been experienced and accepted in the case of subsidy to the railroads, the only pragmatic path to follow is that of having the state do it, for each group of local communities, as the apparently inevitable evolution of private enterprise failures spreads from one transportation operation to another.

The Constitution which has been abolished in Thailand had been in existence only since 1932. After World War II, it functioned mainly by a series of military coups. Or those coups, that which took place Wednesday seemed the quietest and the mildest. So far as the business themselves were concerned, it seemed to make almost no difference.

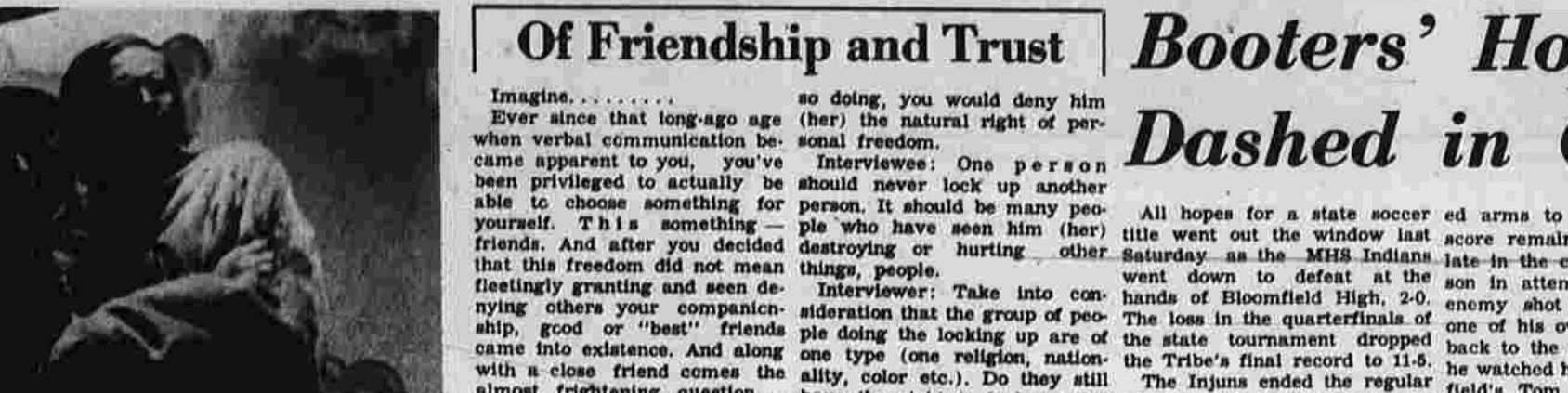

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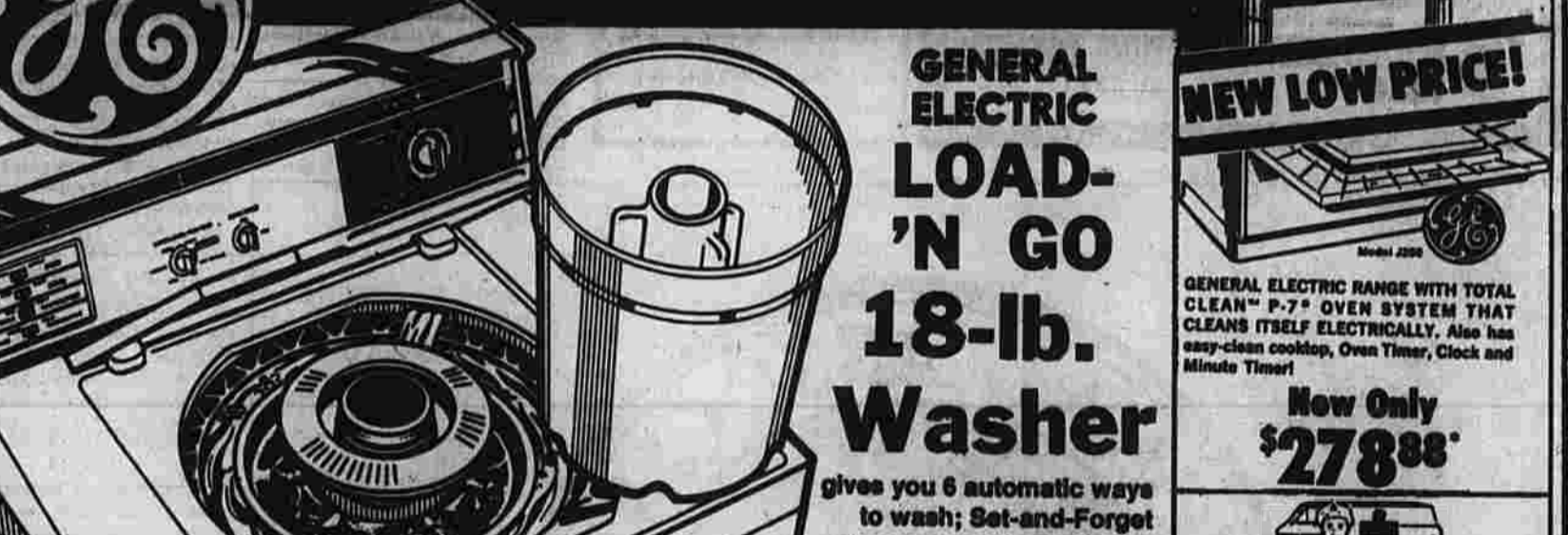

Drivers Set Vote On Bus Contract

HARTFORD (AP) — Bus drivers and mechanics of the Connecticut Co. will vote today and Sunday on a contract settlement which could avert a bus strike scheduled to begin at midnight Sunday in three of the state's largest cities.

The tentative agreement with the Amalgamated Transit Union, AFL-CIO, was reached Friday night and union leaders recommended that the drivers and mechanics accept the pact.

Terms of the agreement were not revealed. Union members in Hartford will vote at 7 tonight and members in New Haven and Stamford are scheduled to vote Sunday.

The negotiating session Friday was called by federal and state mediators after the contract talks had broken down Thursday without settlement.

Meakill promised state funds to help keep the buses running, but only on the condition that the cities served by the Connecticut Co. share in the total costs.

Meakill said his company, which carries 26,000 passengers daily, is losing \$500,000 a year "and we just can't continue doing this without speedy assistance."

Monastery Scrutinized By British

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — British troops carried out new searches today around a Roman Catholic monastery following the arrest of two of its monks on charges of sheltering guerrillas of the Irish Republican Army.

The British first searched the monastery at Portlengua, 30 miles northwest of Belfast, on Friday but found nothing.

Leaders of the Trappist monastery said they had no complaints about the search.

But Ivan Cooper, a Protestant member of Northern Ireland's Parliament who sits for the mainly Catholic Social Democratic party, assailed the search operations.

Senate Sets Vote Date On Campaign Bid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has broken its deadlock over a bitterly controversial presidential campaign-financing plan and agreed on Monday as the day to vote whether to let it to the \$27 billion tax-cut bill.

Rep. Charles Stenholm (R-Ore.) said the Senate vote would be a major party nominee up to \$24 million in tax funds next year.

It would be particularly attractive to Democrats, who have had many problems since the 1968 election.

The Senate put the campaign financing plan to a vote on Monday after a long session on Tuesday.

Democrats continued to insist they had the votes to tie the plan to the tax bill which is a key part of President Nixon's economic program.

They defeated a Republican effort to kill the plan on a 49-46 vote Thursday.

Senators said the week-end respite would give them time to try to change enough votes to get a Senate rejection.

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101st Airborne Unit Begins Phasing Out

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. 101st Airborne Division, the capitol of bloody Hamburger Hill, began phasing out of combat today, six weeks ahead of schedule, as part of an accelerated troop pullout to send thousands of GIs home from Vietnam for Christmas.

The 101st is the last remaining U.S. combat division in Vietnam and its withdrawal marks a milestone for President Nixon's Vietnamization program.

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Nixon Cancels Weekend Rest

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon cancelled his weekend rest at Camp David today, a move that surprised many.

The President was reported to be in a bad mood today, and his decision to return to Washington was seen as a sign of his determination to shake up the reaction to his hands with scores of well-wishers.

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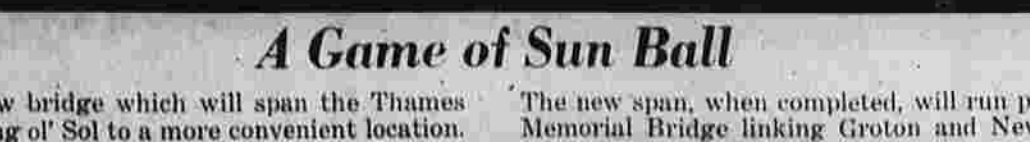
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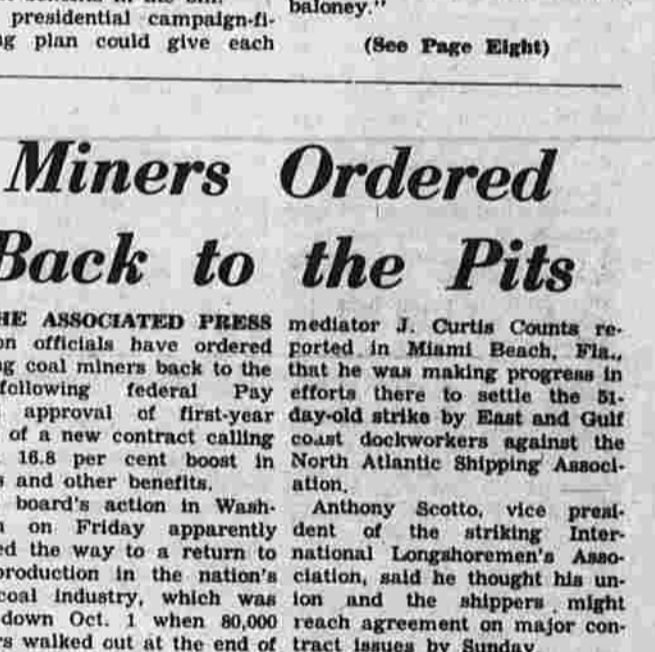
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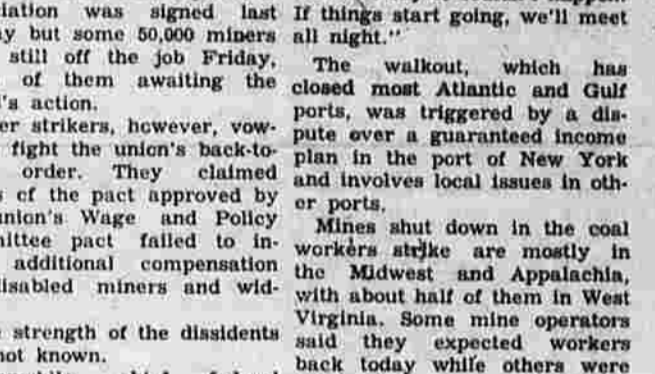
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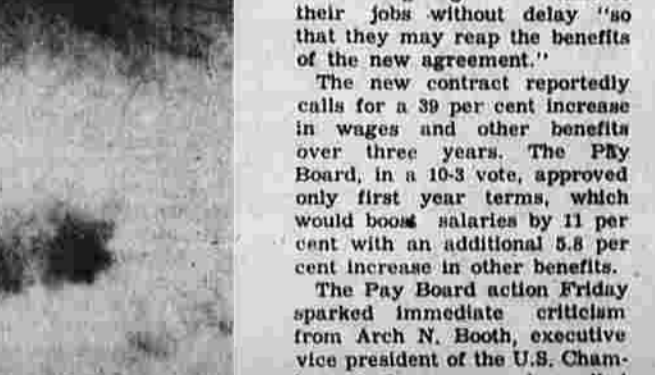
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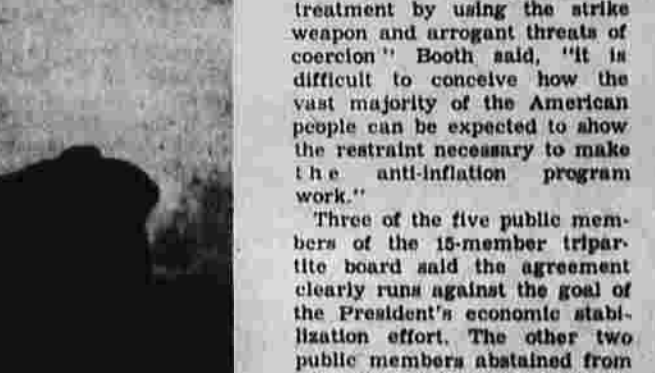
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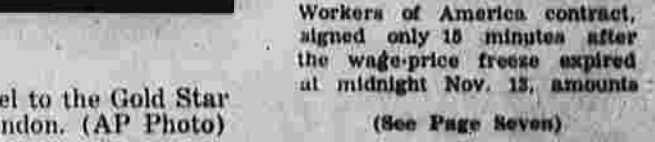
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A Game of Sun Ball
