And for some of the older residents, it may seem eruel and unjust that people who have come to the District in the last thirty years do not pick up and share the sentiments of the old timers.

But there is not, of course, much real disputation possible about sentiment. It cannot be argued or pressured out of existence. It has its own right to determine a vote, regardless of other factors. It is free to play its part at the Eighth District polling place next Monday, and it represents a spirit which will survive no matter what the outcome of the voting itself may be. We hope that outcome will, while yielding honor to the past, look to the future, and to the future advantage of all of us.

A Changing Time Frame?

beginning to look at all-year schools, the question becomes: What has happened? And the answer is that more and more people are beginning to look at things in ms of time, space and architecture This is highly appropriate because, as has been often said, between now and the end of the century we must build as many buildings as have been built since colonial times. The trouble is that most citizens perceive life, and especially ed-ucation, in the farm-type thinking of the colonial era. Schools originally did not operate in the summer mostly because children were needed to help with the harvest. Then the thought arrived that it would be nice for children to be outdoors in the summer - which it is and then finally as vacations became a part of life - and that's a relatively recent development — the summer vaca-tion fitted in with the plans of parents. The school year has relatively little to do with education, although the case may be made that children, especially younger children, can benefit from ner vacation. It can also be argued that children forget so much during the summer - which requires long periods of re-

view - that there is a very large educational loss involved. While the educational merits of such a change will be debated, there can be little question that all schools could be more efficiently run if they were open all year. And this is not an idle speculation because so large a portion of people's taxes go to education. Nor is the matter limited to the public schools. There is no single act that a college or university could take which would increase its fi-

nancial solvency more than going to an all year school. It should not be thought that ancient time spans cost money only in education. Only a relatively few factories run three shifts. Marshall McLuhan points out that electric light abolished the divisions of night and day, of inner and outer, and of the subterranean and the terrestrial. It

altered every consideration of space for work and production as much as the other electric media altered the space-time experience of society." But our inner time clocks have not caught up with inention. We work during the day, we work a certain five days, we use buildings for single purposes and only a third of the time, we behave, in short, as if we never left the farm. As Don Fabun has pointed out in "The Dynamics of Change," we have created many problems by our use of time and

space. He says, "The result of this. . thinking is to create the sort of problems that result when everyone goes to work at the same time, has recreation at the same time, gets up and goes to bed at the same time. The way we solve the problem is to build generating capacity n our power plants for peak hours; to build highways three times as big as they need be, to take care of peak traffic to and from work, and to overload cur parks, beaches, resorts and other ecreational areas to saturation two days a week, and leave them virtually deserted all the rest of the time. As population increases, and becomes more highly congested in urban areas, the problems' compound too, and we are forced into an insensate (and ultimately useless) frenzy of designing and building to take care of urban problems created by rural thinking.

"It may be that within the next tweny years, driven to it by taxes and frusration, we will begin to run our lives around the clock, and stagger our days off, and thus reduce peak traffic loads by two thirds, and use our shopping and creation facilities the week-around We have done this in war times; but why does it take a war to make us do so?" The all-year school is merely the tip of the iceberg of a new society. It may or may not come to Middlesex County soon. But as the nation moves toward four-day weeks, as more and more stores remain open at night and on Sundays, and as we begin to think more seriously about conserving resources by using them better, education will be the first to be scrutinized. It is the only nine-months business in a 12-month year. - MIDDLETOWN

to buy securities on credit? The President replied that lowered margin requirements vere certainly one weapon still in his recovery arsenal but the time to use it was not now. Contradicting the import of Wilson's suggestion, the President was confident the economy was responding well and Republicans running for re-election next year had nothing to fear. That satisfied neither Wilson nor his fellow Republican leaders. Indeed, the President's characteristic hyperbole in describing 1972 far and wide not just as a "very good" year but as a "great" year finds little support today even at strategic places inside his own Administration, The proof of this lies in the fact that high-level Administration planners are be ginning to look for politica capegoats to explain away the allure of a strong recovery aftr more than three months of the New Economic Policy. One such prospective scape-goat is Dr. Arthur Burns, the

immensely prestigious chair-man of the Federal Reserve Board, In tones that are still muted, Dr. Burns is now being described by some Nixon economic operatives as the man who holds the real key to economic recovery by his power over the money supply.

Burns, it is being said, has now reduced the growth of the money supply to zero, after sev-eral months of rapid expansion, an alleged reduction that endangers strong recovery, partic-ularly in the absolutely vital sector of capital goods (new plant and equipment). Burns has been on the receiv
