Both political parties have names ready for Monday night, when the Town Council makes appointments to various agen-cies in this post election month. Most expired terms on these agencies ran out in November but the council has a month to name replacements or make

Both Democrats and Republicans have endorsed their choice s at the town committee level, and final action will be up to the Town Council:

With the Democrats now in control of the council, the Planning and Zoning Commission, with three vacancies on the five-man board, will become Democratically controlled also. Therefore, the GOP has put up only one name, that of Thomas Dolan who presently serves as an alternate to the PZC. The Democrats have three choices, Steve Loyzim, Robert Fitch and Paul Goodin. several decades in the old Nat-ural History Society building after landing in Portland in the late 1800's on board globetrotting sailing ships.

When officials of the Natural
History and Audobon socities
learned the building would be
razed, they decided to ask members of the Coastal Maine Rock and Mineral Club to begin the tedious, dirty job of cleaning and sorting the shells. The group of diligent ladies, headed by Mrs. Joseph Scholl, have scraped the encrustations off shells from such diverse wa-

ters as the Arctic Ocean and

the Sea of Japan. They even have discovered a few from the Gulf of Maine. The director of the Maine Audobon Society, Richard Anderson, says the best samples from each species of shell will be set aside for future use in lectures and demonstrations. One penny to \$4 will buy anyone a shell, the great majority of which exhibit the colorful, abstract design of shells with a tropical origin.
