"Despite the fact that the General Assembly voted \$168 million in tax increases, along with a state lottery, tuition fee increases, and higher professeem to be in store for next year. At the present time, it appears that a much as \$200 million in new taxes will be needed (1) to pay off one half (or \$122 million) on the 1971 budget deficit, (2) to offset the \$14 windfall effect of the speedup in the inheritance tax calendar, (3) to provide \$38 million for postponed teachers' retirement contributions, (4) to meet the commitment to the State Employes' Retirement Fund for increased state support, and (5) to finance increased debt service even before consideration of spending increases for other state programs."

The central fact reflected by such calculations is this: that the state did not, in its financial legislation for the current fiscal year, solve its financial crisis, but merely postponed it. Furthermore, the means it employed to postpone it have increased, not diminished, the size of the burden which has to be shouldered once the state finds itself really cornered into having to try to meet its obligations to

There was much talk, last year, about how painful a situation the state had to face. But it was never really faced, It lies just ahead, worse than it was a year ago, once more claiming the attention of the Governor and the Legislature who. in their quarreling last year, nevertheless did achieve one piece of partnership, that in postponing the day when the state, and therefore its taxpayers, are going to have to pay up. 





Director Mrs. Vivian Ferguson reported last night that the investigation never advanced beyond the preliminary stages because of the conflicting summer vacations and then the municipal elections. She too expressed skepticism over the district plan.

Soldiers Jam Ganges In Retreat to Dacca

India claimed today its troops had pressed to within 25 miles of Dacca, that thousands of fleeing Pakistani soldiers were trying to cross the Ganges River to that East Pakistan capital, and that enemy planes had been driven from the skies.
