Choppers, Allies Batter Reds In Cambodia Clash

SAXON (AP) — U.S. helicopter gunships and South Vietnamese troops battered North Vietnamese forces in Cambodia today, and a spokesman reported 78 North Vietnamese killed and 22 weapons captured.

The spokesman, Lt. Col. Do Viet, said there were no South Vietnamese casualties.

It was the second big enemy loss in as many days claimed by the South Vietnamese north of Highway 7 in the enemy's Dan Ze base camp area about 30 miles from the Vietnam-Cambodia border. Another 39 North Vietnamese were reported killed Wednesday by South Vietnamese ground forces and U.S. helicopters. The two Vietnamese soldiers were two killed and 22 wounded.

With improved weather there is more truck traffic along the trail, and a strong U.S. air effort is being made to intercept and interdict the enemy, said one informant.

Scores of support planes also were in the skies over Laos, including rescue aircraft and escort fighters on the lookout for North Vietnamese MIG's.

One F105 escort fired a Shrike missile at a North Vietnamese radar site 15 miles north of the demilitarized zone and 18 miles east of the Laotian border. Results of the attack were not known, the U.S. Command said.

The command reported that the plane's electronic gear indicated the radar was tracking the plane and speed preparatory to firing it.

The plane was fourth since incident along the Laotian border in two days and the 38th American air attack on North Vietnam.

U.S. B-52 bombers struck again in the area. Viet said only one of the attacks caused casualties and these were very light, with only a few deaths.

Eighty-five miles to the southeast of the Saigon task force, the outer defenses of Phnom Penh came under attack.

Southeast In Retreat

Col. Viet said it was the most significant action since the 20,000 South Vietnamese force drove into eastern Cambodia on Nov. 23 to keep North Vietnamese forces away from the borders of South Vietnam.

He said the battle took place from shortly before noon until mid-afternoon.

The U.S. Command said American helicopters flew 400 missions, nearly all of them gunship, in support of the South Vietnamese forces in Cambodia. But the only other North Vietnamese shelling reported were in the area. Viet said attacks on North Vietnamese camps and a defensive position in the area. 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Mail Deadlines Help Deliveries

Airmail parcels should be sent by Dec. 15 and airmail cards by Dec. 22. Parcels and cards to Alaska and Hawaii should be airmailed by Dec. 15.

For international delivery by Christmas, send cards and parcels by airmail. Sauter said. The recommended mailing dates for Canada and Mexico, Dec. 15, parcels, and Dec. 20, cards; South and Central America and Europe, Dec. 15, parcels, and Dec. 18, cards; Africa, the Near East and the Middle East, parcels and Dec. 15, cards.

The service windows in the main post office and all sub-stations are open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

House Weighing Tax Relief Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The complexities of exemptions and deductions, would be on this order:

For a single person with \$25,000 income, \$15 would be saved this year, \$25 next; for one with \$10,000, \$8 and \$14.

For a married couple with two children and \$40,000 income, \$17 this year, \$28 next; for such a family with \$12,000 income, \$22 this year, \$44 next.

In general, persons at or below the poverty level would receive the largest relief, with some \$2.8 billion in this bracket.

The House was expected to promptly approve the compromise bill, the Senate to follow suit without delay, and Nixon to sign it.

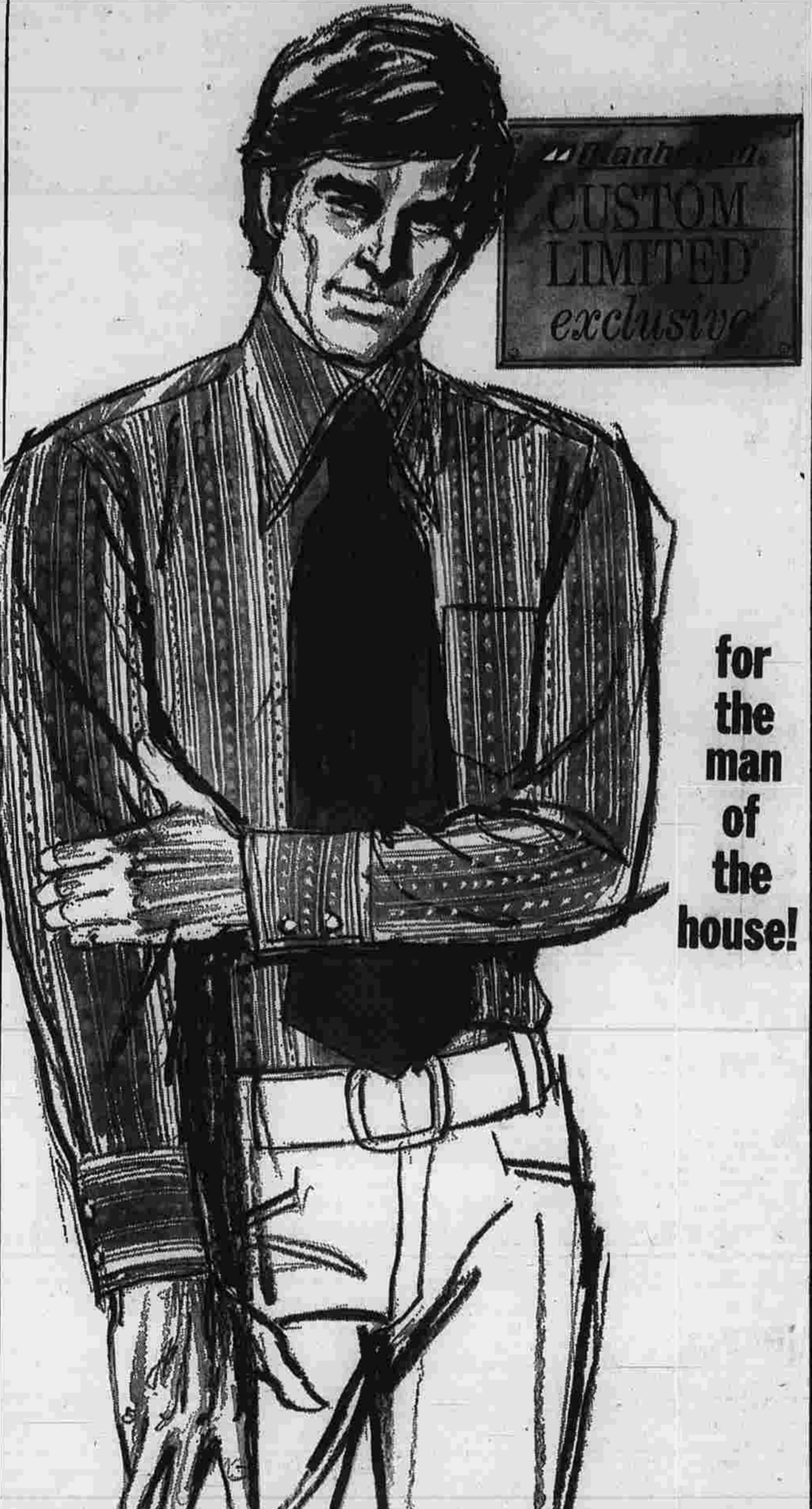

Soldiers Jam Ganges In Retreat to Dacca

India claimed today its troops had pressed to within 25 miles of Dacca, that thousands of fleeing Pakistani soldiers were trying to cross the Ganges River to that East Pakistani capital, and that enemy planes had been driven from the skies.

Indian troops were reported holding their ground in Kashmir on the western front.

Pakistan's eastern command in Dacca countered with reports of fierce fighting on most fronts in the east and said "many thrusts are still being successfully countered by Pakistani troops."

An Indian army communiqué reported its troops had advanced to the Meghna River 25 miles from Dacca.

Lt. Gen. Jagjit Singh Aurora, commander of India's eastern front, said in Calcutta that thousands of Pakistani troops under attack were trying to reach Dacca or the port of Chittagong in the east in an armada of sampans, barges and river boats.

Of these eight Pakistani battalions, about 7,000 men were attempting to cross the Ganges from the west to make a stand at Dacca, he reported.

Aurora claimed the last Pakistani plane in East Pakistan was shot down and India's air force "had a field day."

Aurora told reporters that Indian forces were making a swift advance and were leading many Pakistani troops.

India earlier reported the capture of the major towns of Comilla in the east and Sylhet in the northeast. Pakistan's Minister of Defense, Yousuf Khan, said the Pakistani army was being driven back from Dacca and Comilla.

Sabers Silencing Tashkent Pledge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Tashkent Declaration died long ago because Pakistan never implemented its provisions for a major power to play a role in settling their disputes.

The so-called "Spirit of Tashkent," bearing the name of the Soviet city where the declaration was signed on Jan. 10, 1966, had been hailed as the symbol of reconciliation between the two nations.

Observing the first anniversary of the declaration, Prime Minister Indira Gandhi of India called it a "pledge on the part of both countries to resolve their differences peacefully in an atmosphere of goodwill, cooperation and trust."

The agreement, reached after four days of talks between the leaders of India, Pakistan and the Soviet Union, was cited as a prime example of "parallelism" in which the Soviet Union and the United States helped to restore peace on the Indian subcontinent.

But now, with India and Pakistan at war again, Pakistanis say the Tashkent agreement was a mortal blow to the trusty India signed last summer with the Soviet Union and the United States.

"There's nothing I can't fix with nail polish, glue or a little paint," Dean declared.

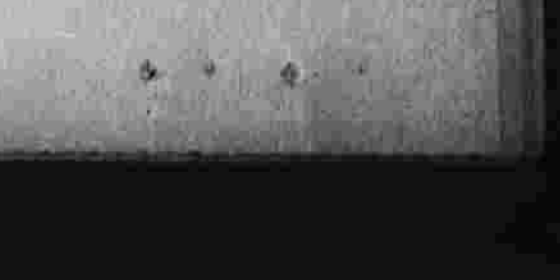

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — The impact of young voters on national elections next year will depend largely on how many of them get involved in local politics, say a young organizer and student registration drives in New England.

"The power of the youth vote is not going to be seen on the level of thousands or millions of young people rallying behind a national candidate," said William Koyserling in an interview. "It's going to have to start from the bottom up."

Reversing is one of 12 regional coordinators for The National Movement for the Student Vote, a non-partisan, tax-exempt foundation based in Washington.

From a basement office in Cambridge, Koyserling, 22, and year-old Brandeis University graduate, is working to organize and support local youth registration drives throughout New England. His efforts concentrate on major college campuses, but he hopes to reach beyond the academic community and to non-college towns.

"The first test of the efforts of the Student Vote and similar groups came in November when local elections around the country. The results were anything but clear, and the Student Vote is aiming now at the national elections next year and beyond.

Here is what Koyserling had to say to the Associated Press about his organization, the job of building an effective registration movement, his evaluation of young voters' impact this year and the prospects for 1972.

Q. What do you do as a regional coordinator?
A. My job in New England is to get as many voters registered as possible. I do this by moving around New England, visiting colleges, campuses, trying to get college students to organize voter registration drives on their campuses, as well as in their communities.

Q. Why do you concentrate on college campuses?
A. We use college campuses and student expertise to move our message into the community. We feel that because student governments tend to have a sizable amount of money, they can use it for other campus or community-related projects, because student governments are often in the position where they can donate free office space, telephone and a lot of times secretarial services, that this is a great way to minimize the necessary resources to get something going.

Q. How does it work?
A. Students decide they want to have a drive, they want to register themselves as well as other people in the community. But they don't really know how to go about it. So I go in, and I time between when registration is being done and the election is quite an organizing manual which significant.

Q. What's your approach to communities that don't have a campus nearby?
A. There's no such animal. There might not be a college campus, but there are a lot of high school students who are going to be voting, who are becoming part of the political system. I think it's extremely important to get them involved.

In Cambridge registration has been very low. There are so many high school students who do not go to college, and how are they to be reached? Then you might work even more closely with the League of Women Voters to do some sort of canvass across the town, which would open it up to reach the 15-20 group. I would be simply a cadre of high school students and to non-college towns.

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Friends Revive Christmas Hope Of Quintuplets

CHAVARRIA, Mexico (AP) — The four Maria, survivors of quintuplets, await Christmas this year happier and healthier than ever before, thanks to the generosity of many new friends.

Until last year the life of the girls was bleak, their future uncertain. A fantastic outpouring of human kindness has perhaps changed their lives forever.

The girls, who will be 7 years old now, are Maria de Jesus, Maria de la Luz, Maria Elena, and Maria Candelaria, the children of Mr. and Mrs. Pablo Ortiz. They live in a cement three-room house near Chavarría with their three brothers and a younger sister.

The children almost never had milk to drink, there wasn't enough food to go around, and their father's salary of 67 pesos of \$4 a month gave little hope for a better life.

Then an Associated Press story of their plight was published in the United States and Canada. Last December, many hearts and purses were opened and family life at the Ortiz home changed.

Rich and poor, healthy and sick, old and young deluged the family with words of kindness, prayer, money and gifts. Hundreds of dolls, toys, clothes, material and other gifts found their way to this small village where five girls were born on a dirt floor by the roadside the night of Feb. 2, 1967—one of the girls died at birth.

One of the presidents, Luis Echeverría's aides took personal charge and arranged for the girls' entry without delay.

"The girls' father has made good use of the gifts. The leaking roof has been replaced by a thick cement slab. An extra room has been added. There's gas for the stove and Mrs. Ortiz' daily chores of preparing meals over an open fire outside the house.

"The children each own a pair of shoes, a coat, a hat, a sweater, never afford that," said Ortiz, "so I've bought three cows."

There also are three pigs, chickens and turkeys.

The girls sleep together in a new double bed. Even their parents have had a bed instead of the cement slab they once slept on.

"The children each still serves as kitchen and eating area. Walls are plastered with birthday and Christmas cards sent by their many new friends, as well as

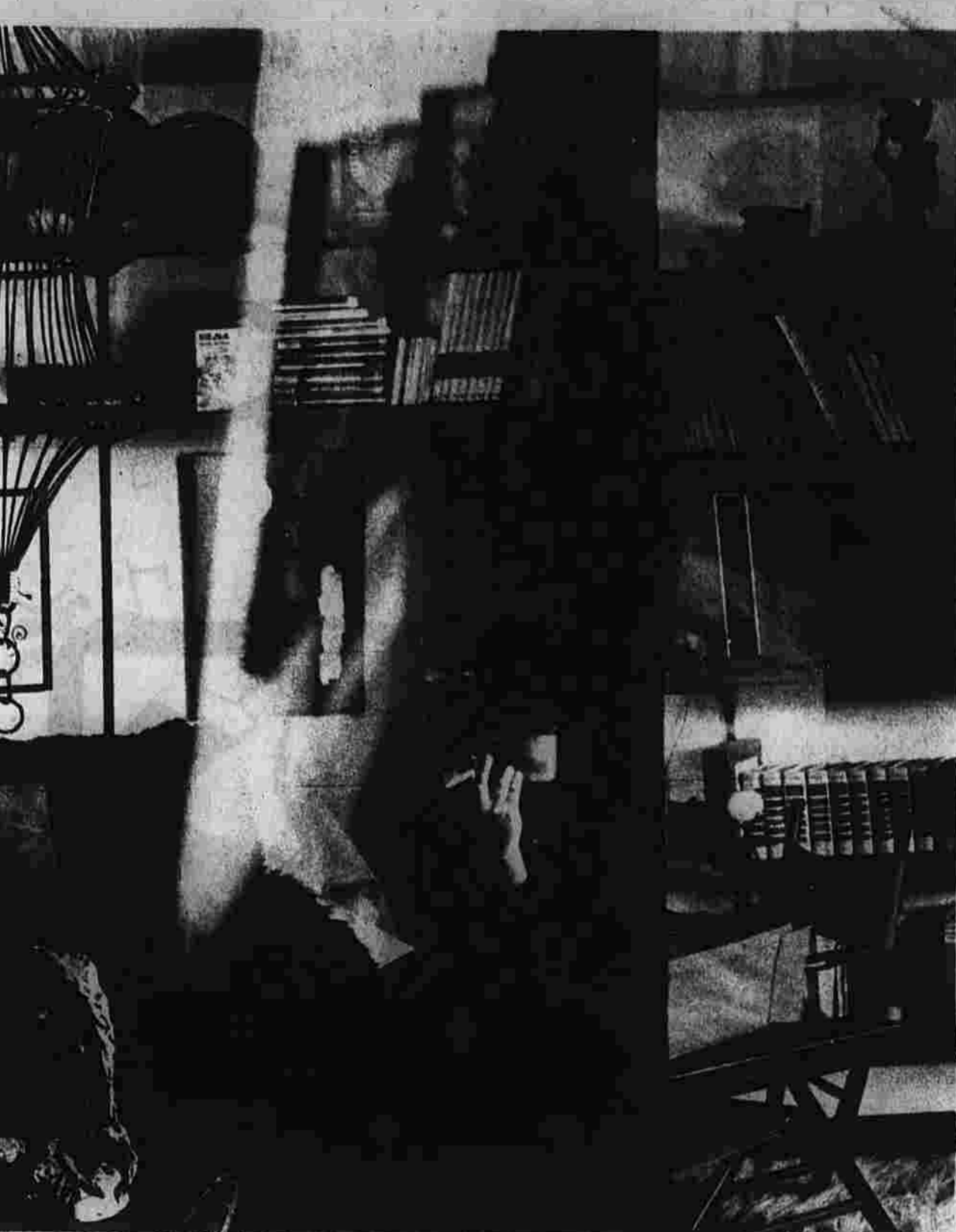

Mousse au Chocolat (Chocolate Mousse)

1/2 pound semisweet chocolate
1/2 cup water or strong coffee
6 eggs, separated
1/2 cup sugar
3 tablespoons dark rum or cognac, or 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
Melt the chocolate in the water or coffee over low heat. Cool slightly. Beat the egg yolks with the sugar until thick and very pale. Mix in the chocolate and flavoring. Whip the egg whites with the salt until stiff. Fold the whipped cream into the chocolate and then fold in the egg whites. Pour into 8-cup serving dish. Chill at least six hours before serving. Serves 8-10.

Chocolate Mousse Diane Lucas

8 eggs
2 tablespoons dark sweet chocolate
2 tablespoons cold water
2 teaspoons rum
Separate the yolks and whites of the eggs. Break chocolate into small pieces and place in a thick pan with the cold water. Stir over low fire until dissolved. Remove from fire and mix in carefully the egg yolks and rum. Add the stiffly beaten egg whites and mix thoroughly. Fill into small glass. Place in refrigerator at least four hours. Makes 8 small cups.

Pacific Floor Migrating, Study of Stone Discloses

NEW YORK (AP) — The North Pacific Ocean floor was under the equator 125 million years ago, two geologists reported today.

The findings are based on the oldest and deepest rocks ever drilled up out of the Pacific floor, the scientists said.

These rock samples were dug up 800 miles southeast of Tokyo and, the geologists said, showed that the ocean floor had migrated northward more than 2,000 miles during the period.

The finding, for announcement at a news conference, was made on the latest voyage of the research vessel Olinar Challenger, which has now made 20 voyages for the Deep Sea Drilling Project sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

Scientists aboard for the various legs of the project have made a series of reports, many devoted to similar movement of the earth's crust.

Today's report came from Dr. Bruce C. Heezen of Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Geological Observatory and Dr. Ian D. MacGregor of the University of California at Davis. The project is managed by Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

The geologists also reported finding what was once a volcanic island, now almost a mile beneath the surface. Seventy million years ago it was a volcanic island, they said, but "drowned" 10 million years ago as it migrated along with the rest of the sea floor.

Heezen and MacGregor said their deep drilling found deposits of sediment in the northern ocean floor that are found under the present equator and which apparently can't form without the special conditions that exist only at the equator.

The drilling southeast of Tokyo brought up samples more than 120 million years old, the geologists said. The drill bit was lowered through 20,000 feet

In Special Education Plan

The Talcottville School in Vernon has the distinction of being the first regional school for special education in the state. And now, it has added another first—in the form of a \$22-page curriculum guide devoted to the instructional phase of special education.

The guide is the culmination of two years' work by school administrators and special education teachers. It outlines, step by step, a program for those children of pre-school age who have learning disabilities, the perceptually handicapped, or the emotionally disturbed, and for the trainable and educable retarded children.

Dr. Joseph Lavender of the state's Department of Education has expressed enthusiasm for the guide which is not yet all the way through the printing process. "It's too hard to turn in the state cannot do this."

Headed by the project, under the direction of Superintendent of Schools Dr. Raymond Ransford, were Albert Kerkin, assistant superintendent, and Anthony Magliocco, supervisor of special education. Both had high practical experience in the field.

The lengthy document will be the special education program for the entire district, being expanded in the elementary schools. It is being added to the district's curriculum guide.

The guide defines the program as being for any child in that age group "whose educational potential will be irreparably diminished without special education at an early age."

The guide emphasizes an activity-oriented curriculum, because the students involved are unable to learn by doing, Kerkin explained.

Defining one of the characteristics of the trainable and educable retarded, the educators explained that the learning ability of the educable retarded is somewhere below the norm of the so-called slow learner, and of the trainable retarded, near the lower end of the scale.

The program for the emotionally handicapped and/or socially maladjusted children was initiated in the fall of 1968. This individual child in order to achieve a place in the world, they will need continuous supervision, the guide states.

Everything is outlined so clearly, step by step, that any teacher, even one who has never taught in a special school, can readily follow out just what is being done in every situation.

The guide states that the children and the staff both are beneficiaries of the program.

While these children are learning basic skills, they also have fun. They blow pinwheels, play with bubbles and even yawn, to give them a sense of humor.

Let's Consider No-Fault, Says State Commissioner

HARTFORD (AP) — Agents who had been a strong force for no-fault against the opposition of most lawyer members, cooled off somewhat on the idea when they learned it might open the door to the mass marketing of auto liability insurance.

The study of no-fault insurance is being done by a special commission which is reportedly focusing on the experience in Massachusetts.

In an interview yesterday, Altermatt said delays in compensating victims of traffic accidents are "built into" the present system, which spawns large numbers of lawsuits.

The system of deciding in the courts who gets how much damages also fails to help many people who suffer economic as well as physical harm, the commissioner said.

Of \$2.8 billion in compensable economic losses suffered as a result of motor vehicle accidents in the United States in 1970, only \$2.1 billion was actually received in benefits, Altermatt said.

"If you can shut your eyes to those statistics," he said, "then you can talk about a 'bandaid approach' and say there's nothing basically wrong with the system. If you look, you have to consider more basic reforms."

No-fault insurance—in effect in Massachusetts for nearly a year—compensates victims without the necessity of determining who was to blame for the accident. This saves a lot of money in lawyers' fees. However, it also requires the victims of less serious accidents to give up their right to sue.

The system is roughly comparable to the workmen's compensation system, under which the victims of industrial accidents are reimbursed automatically for their injuries.

There was a strong push in the General Assembly early this year for approval of no-fault legislation, but at Altermatt's urging, further study was authorized.

The legislature's insurance committee is expected to report on the matter by the end of the year.

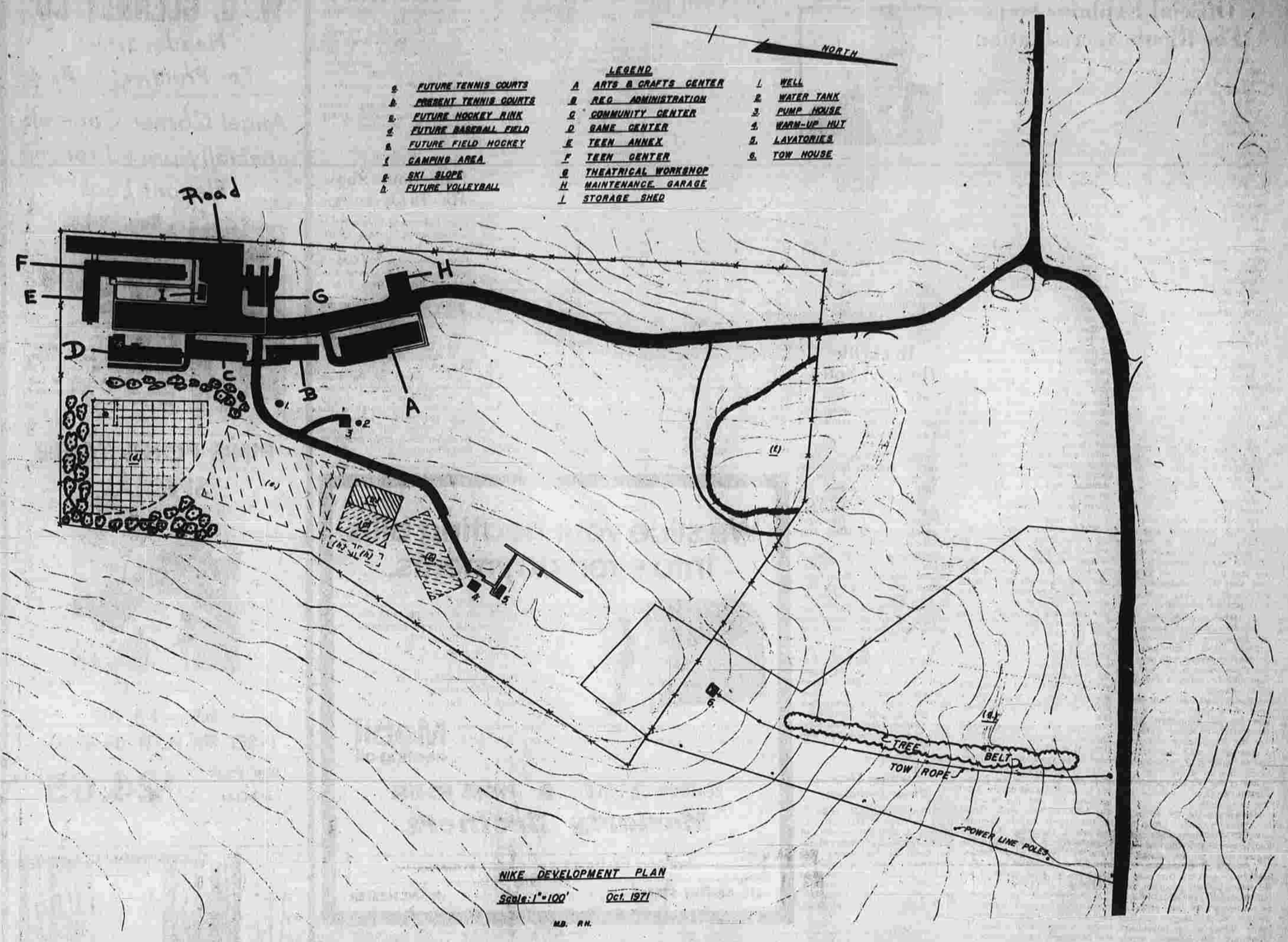

Ralph J. Bunche, 67, Dies, Nobel Peace Prize Winner

Franklin D. Roosevelt in the U.S. secretary. He had been under-secretary in charge of special political affairs.

He had been inactive in the world body since last summer because of various ailments and a broken right arm suffered in a fall at home.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete.

Bunche's hand in settling the 1948 Palestinian war came at a crucial time in the history of the then-floundering United Nations.

He took over as acting mediator of the dispute after assassins gunned down the U.N. mediator, Swedish Count Folke Bernadotte, in Jerusalem and also killed the man at his side, Swedish Ambassador Carl von Fuchsberg.

Refusing the protection of an armed guard, Bunche gathered all parties on the island of Rhodes and wrote the settlement that finally ended the fighting after seven weeks.

Col. Mohamed Ibrahim Self killed him as "one of the world's greatest men," and Israeli diplomat Walter Eytan called his efforts "superhuman."

Bunche, himself, marked the occasion by presenting each delegate at the Rhodes table with a reproduction of ancient Greek pots made in a local factory. Asked what he would have done with the gifts if the table had failed, he replied: "I would have smashed them over your heads."

Bunche joined the United Nations at its inception, first as a technical adviser in 1946 and then as a full-time member of the Secretariat, where he had worked two years as a specialist on African and colonial affairs.

He joined the U.N. staff full time in 1947 and after a series of special missions was appointed undersecretary without portfolio in 1950.

Living in New York, he gave himself freely to the cause of equal rights for Negroes, delivering countless speeches and taking part in civil rights demonstrations in 1960. He marched alongside Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in the Freedom March from Selma to Montgomery, Ala.

His dislike for segregation as practiced in Washington, D.C., led him in 1962 to refuse

Andover New Rec Head Talks Of Tentative Plans

Andover's Recreation Commission last night revealed a plan to put in the arm at its first meeting held in the town's new recreation and cultural director Gordon MacDonal.

Meeting at the town office building were members Thomas Bonneau and Arthur Weingart, Mrs. Julia Haveri, a new appointee, and the town's first selectman, Robert E. Post. Absent was the committee's chairman, Gary Coleman.

Resignations were received from members Dennis Kessan and Paul Juravsky Jr., who indicated that because of other demands on their time they felt unable to serve the committee adequately. Both members said they would like to see the posts filled with persons who could devote the effort and time to the commission that it requires in order to be effective.

Tentative Programs

MacDonal discussed with the members some of the programs which might be implemented for this winter, such as a skating program and a dancing program.

Discussed also was the possibility of setting up a square dance group which would meet periodically, and the possibility of setting up an all-purpose group for this group.

MacDonal said he is planning to send out a circular to townsmen asking what type of programs they would like to see in the town.

He commented that the extensive recreational program in effect in the town of Marlborough, of which he is also director. He said that with a committee of six people, that town has a gym program, swimming program, programs for teen-agers, senior citizens, and every age group.

Town Park Suggested

Post suggested that possibly the 80 or so acres owned by the town in the Burnap Brook vicinity could be designated as a town park.

He noted that it is one of the most scenic areas in town, with woods that are a square mile in size. He said that the brook winding its way through the property, many access roads, which he also said with a dirt road from Wales Rd.

Other Programs

It was mentioned that those students who are interested in basketball, but fail to make school teams at Rham, would certainly be interested in a town basketball team open to youngsters from Andover, Hebron and Marlborough.

Other such activities which are of interest to young people who do not participate on the school teams, could also be pursued.

MacDonal mentioned as a possibility the formation of a coffee house for teen-agers.

Little League Field

Weingart and Bonneau, who are in charge of the Little League teams in town, noted that they have a very difficult time in using the school's ball field. They said that considerable notice has to be given to the school when they plan to use the field, and it is impossible then to change practices or game dates at short notice.

Even with the use of the school field, they said it would be better if they had the use of another field, also. They noted the first selectman to look into the possibility of using some town property for this purpose, or perhaps having town open to use these facilities except by special permission and with adequate supervision.

Post said he would contact the chairman of the Board of Education to investigate the possibility of opening up the school grounds for use. The entire group felt it was a sad waste of facilities to have this area not in use every weekend, every week day after school, every holiday, vacation and all summer long.

Post said other towns also have school playgrounds, and many of them are open to the public. He cited the town of Manchester, where, he said, he sees youngsters in the school playgrounds on weekends and holidays. He noted that most towns and cities have public parks and other facilities, all open to the public and without supervision.

Post said that insurance coverage cannot be too prohibitive if all the other communities manage to keep their parks and school grounds open. He noted that perhaps the town in maintaining these facilities, assumes no liability for their use.

He will ask that the insurance angle be thoroughly checked out with the school's insurance agent and a report made on the pros and cons of having the school property open at all times. He returned only in this

Democrats Change Rule For Electing Committee

To comply with Democratic state and national party rules, the Vernon Democratic Town Committee has approved a change in its rules to have committee members selected by caucus rather than by the self-nominating method which has been used.

The self-nominating method of selecting the town committee gives the committee itself sole power in deciding who will be on it.

Atty. Alex Goldfarb, counsel for the State Democratic Central Committee, spoke to the Vernon committee Tuesday night. He explained that Connecticut statutes allow for the state and national party to do an end-around method, by which party could refer to the national convention if it did not change its method.

While revising its rules to comply with the state and national order, the local Democrats also voted to make some changes in the party rules, while some other suggested changes were discussed but not approved.

The number of committee members will remain at 15, making it one of the largest town committees in the state. It has been at this figure for about 15 years.

In the section of the rules concerning election of officers, the words "who shall be of the opposite sex" were deleted. "Within one week after election, the membership-elect of the town committee shall elect a chairman, vice chairman, secretary and treasurer." The reason for deleting the portion referring to the sex of the officers revolved around

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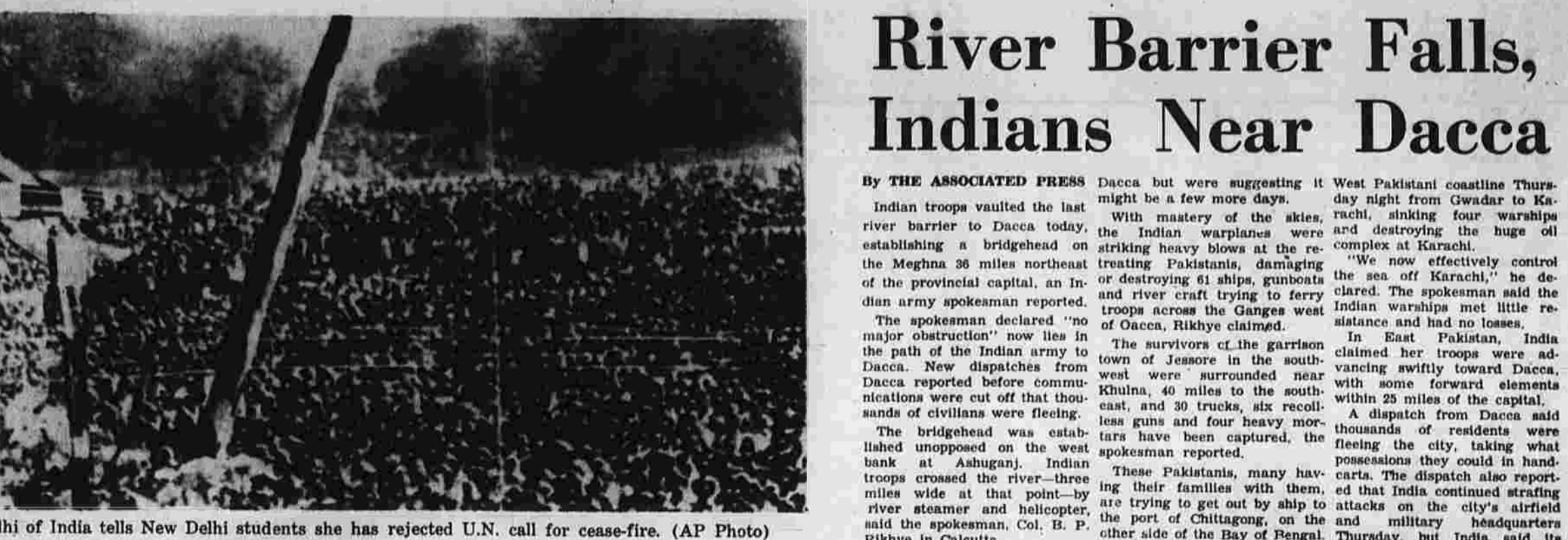
