Business Mirror
Pilot Sees Rail Travel
'Unlimited' in It's Scope

NEW YORK (AP) — Harold Graham is a former commercial pilot and airline executive who believes that the business of carrying passengers over railroads is a fascinating concept with unlimited possibilities. Graham becomes enthusiastic about the future. "There are few new industries in this world," he says. "Rail travel, he claims, can be a brand new way of life."

In 1920 about 20,000 passenger trains rolled the rails. They carried 77 per cent of all passenger traffic between cities. In 1970 only 490 trains remained and they carried only 7.2 per cent of intercity traffic.

Whether they were driven off by poor service or whether the passengers deserted the rails for the car, bus and plane is a moot question. But what the figures seem to say is that

been indifferent because they were abused by passengers for management's fault. Management thought passengers were an interference. Now, he feels, there is a chance to recapture the business and the way of life. "It simply has to be found through experimentation and then then we can make a family train trip an event," he says. He returns to Chicago, he promotes such land cruises also for Americans who have flown over but never ridden through their country. He also feels they'll be popular with visiting foreigners."

What's this about ecology? He was asked. The train, he suggests, is beautiful. It doesn't take up space. It doesn't pollute the atmosphere. "A normal four-lane highway takes 40 acres a mile," he said. "How much more do you want to strip the land as the expense of housing and greenery? An acre of land where you are going to find that kind of tract is really close to tract centers?"

Hearing such talk from a railroad man, especially one who has spent the past 30 years in some form of air travel, is not such a shocking as it is encouraging. But one problem remains: Can all this be done? No, nobody can say for sure. They just hope.

President Nixon broke the stalemate earlier in the week when he announced, after a meeting with French President Georges Pompidou in the Azores, that the United States would be willing to devalue the dollar as part of general currency realignment.

U.S. Treasury officials spoke optimistically of hopes for a settlement, as Secretary John R. Connally met privately on the eve of the talks with the finance ministers of Japan, Germany and the United Kingdom.

What might result, U.S. sources said, is a temporary system of exchange rates that could be ratified by the International Monetary Fund and remain in effect until Congress takes formal action on dollar devaluation.

As the monetary talks got under way, informal trade negotiations also were initiated. Trade officials from Canada met with U.S. officials from the State, Commerce and Treasury departments Thursday to discuss trade barriers.

Personal Income Up in November, Says Government

WASHINGTON (AP) — National personal income showed a moderate increase in November as the thaw from President Nixon's wage-price freeze began to take effect, a government report said today.

The Commerce Department said personal income increased by \$3.3 billion compared with a \$1 billion advance in October. The wage-price freeze expired Nov. 13.

Most of the November rise was in wage and salary payments, with a \$1.5-billion gain in government wages and salaries a main feature of the increase. About two-thirds of the government pay step-up was attributed to the military pay raise approved by the Pay Board just in effect.

Downtown By The Bootstraps?

It is good to have the perennially unsolved problem of the Downtown Business District being discussed again.

It is especially good to have the new discussion beginning with a realistic realization that any new effort toward a solution is going to have to depend upon the vitality, creative thinking, and sheer survival instincts which can be found among the component members of the District itself.

Once there could have been a great definite assurance of cost help, and we do not doubt that, if the taxpayers of Manchester could have visualized the final outcome of the much more modest redevelopment of the North End, their vote would have favored, instead of rejected by a narrow margin, the downtown Main St. proposal.

There is no use, however, crying over spilt planning.

The important thing, the necessary thing, is for those who already have their own irrevocable commitments to the area to strive to determine, among themselves, what the tasks can be done, and what they themselves are willing to do.

There is, for the moment, no other way to begin.

Later on, it might prove, as it so often does when initiative and energy are discovered operating anywhere, that those who help themselves have opened up ways in which they can be helped.

There should be, as General Manager Weiss has suggested, more discussions.

These further discussions should, in the mood of that held the other day, adopt the theme that no proposal to too small or too modest to be considered, so long as it stands a chance of leading into and helping build a pattern which might be called a pattern of renewal by regeneration. The one big program that once was possible has gone by the boards; it remains to be seen how many small things can be done toward what could still be the big result - new life and prosperity for the Downtown Business District.

Despite these issues, there can be no doubt that no-fault is capable of delivering to policyholders the same amount of insurance protection at a lower rate, paying off claims faster and eliminating protracted and costly court battles. — NEW LONDON DAY.

Second Baseman Reinstated

The Little League has now been in existence long enough to begin to display some of its grantees on the big game major league scene. And that it would, in time, develop athletic skills toward the big game, was something to be expected.

We doubt that anybody has ever visualized the possibility that made its appearance in a decision from the Appellate Division of the New York State Supreme Court the other day.

It was a decision in which five justices, five, no less, gave their unanimous verdict on a Little League controversy. It seems that, last May 6, the officials of the Staten Island Little League suspended a 16-year-old second baseman because his father, a busy surgeon who claimed he had no time in his schedule for such matters, had failed to take part in the "work parties" with which Little League parents maintained the playing field. The boy was allowed to sit on the bench in uniform, but suspended from playing until his father should perform the duties asked of him. Instead of going to work on the field, the father engaged a lawyer, and sued the Little League officials on the ground that they were depriving his son of his civil rights.

Whether the precise grounds for the legal decision, however, the major principle involved seems to be that a Little League player is not a chattel slave to the team that owns him, and that he, and perhaps his father with him, has certain individual rights and dignities which cannot be ground down to the fancied requirements of a successful league operation of the sport.

What would happen if Little League laws should be amended to move up to the majors, just like the players?

Bay State Checks No-Fault

Massachusetts put a no-fault automobile liability insurance law into effect the first of this year. When the system started a significant drop in the number of claims filed and in the amount paid out during the first six months of operation, insurance companies advised caution on grounds that larger claims often are delayed.

Now the experience of a full nine months is on record. It shows that the average cost of a paid liability claim for the first nine months of this year was \$108. This compares with an average cost of \$141 for the same period during the first nine months of 1970, when the very system was in effect. That's a reduction of 40.6 per cent. The reduction, accompanied by a 34 per cent reduction in the number of claims filed.

Moreover, the anticipated increase due to delays in filing claims has not materialized beyond a modest \$1 per average claim during the third quarter of 1971.

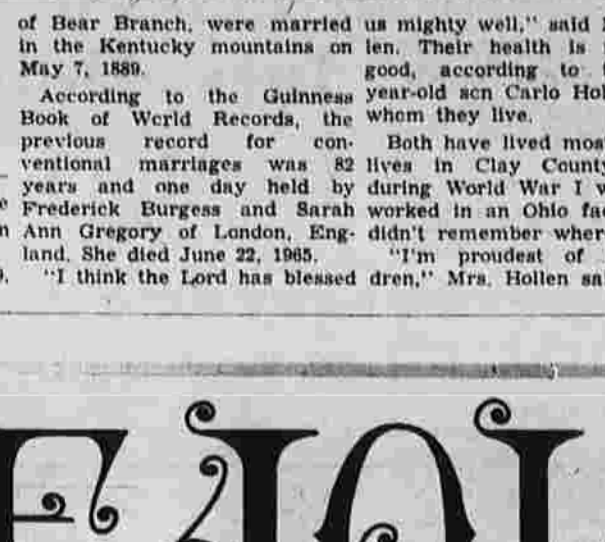

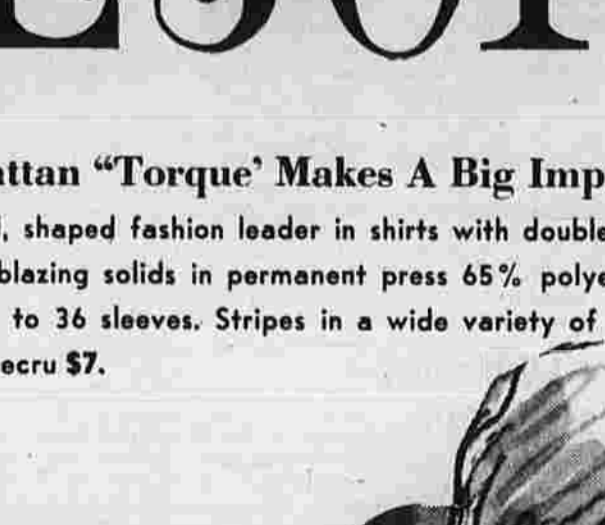

This was the feeling at last night's Park and Recreation Advisory Commission meeting, attended by representatives of the Midget Football League.

David Odegard of the softball association reiterated for the commission requests for improvements to the field, first suggested last month. The commission members examined the field, first hand, and through aerial photographs, since their last meeting, and agreed much could be accomplished at Mt. Nebo. If the softball and football facilities were separated, Ernest Turcek, park superintendent, said he is not able to propose it is in use from April through softball practice begins until December, when midget football ends.

Recreation Director Mel Siebold granted the wisdom of relocating the softball players. Those 107 softball days were for the Can-did and recreation leagues.

Way Sought to Cut New School Cost

The Board of Education met last night, until nearly midnight, to reassess the proposed \$10.8 million high school expansion project and to explore ways to reduce this cost figure as requested by the Town Council.

Three weeks ago the council turned down the \$10.8 proposal and brought it back to the school board with a request that it be most board members were unyielding in their feeling that the curriculum should not suffer while making the cuts.

The original \$10.8 figure was based on an April 1, 1972 bid date and at that time it was noted each delay would cost the town some \$50,000. It had been said originally that each month the project is delayed would cost the town about \$100,000.

Kenney Criticizes Thompson Letter On Bargaining

Manchester Memorial Hospital administrator Edward Kenney has taken Mayor John W. Thompson to task over a letter written by Thompson, a Democrat, to Local 26 of the Connecticut Nurses Association voicing support of the principle of collective bargaining.

Thompson's handwritten, undated letter to Mrs. Arlyne Anasald, chairman of the local unit of CNA, was reportedly passed out Monday by nurses supporting the union, as part of a campaign literature in advance of yesterday's collective bargaining election at the hospital.

Kenney has voiced complaints over the matter in letters to the Board of Directors and to Ted Cummings, chairman of the Democratic Town Committee. These letters, made public today, were dated Dec. 15, the day before the election.

Thompson, the high vote-getter in the Nov. 2 town election, was named mayor shortly thereafter. He is director of members services for the Connecticut State Employees Association.

His letter to Mrs. Anasald, chairman of Local 26, and Kenney's complaint to the directors follow in their entirety. In a similar complaint to Democratic Town Chairman Cummings, Kenney enclosed a copy of the letter written by Thompson and requested that group to take action on the matter and advise him of the outcome.

Kenney wrote in part to Cummings: "As you can see from the enclosed sample letter, the mayor of Manchester has obviously assumed the prerogative of using his office to influence the outcome of this important election."

"To me, this flagrant abuse of a public office cannot be condoned, regardless of what one's personal philosophy may be concerning collective bargaining. I feel very strongly that neither Mr. Thompson, nor any other town official, should in any way interfere in a difference of opinion by two groups of employees at Manchester Memorial Hospital."

Thompson, asked today to comment, said he had learned of Kenney's concern and contacted him personally. "I told him," Thompson said, "that I responded to an inquiry from Mrs. Anasald, as I would from any citizen of Manchester. The question was asked to me regarding my position on the collective bargaining procedure, and I gave an answer through the letter."

Nurses Vote 59-49 To Keep Local 26

By a 59 to 49 vote, professional registered nurses at Manchester Memorial Hospital yesterday chose Local 26 of the Connecticut Nursing Association (CNA) to continue as their collective bargaining agent. The total gave CNA two votes more than the 57 needed for a clear majority.

Of 116 nurses eligible, 112 voted in the election held under the auspices of the State Labor Relations Board. Four votes were challenged, all by the board agent. These were discounted because they were not sufficient to change the outcome.

After the results were made known, hospital administrator Edward M. Kenney said the administration "will continue to work with the union to arrive at equitable solutions to any problems. Our first concern is the patients, and I am sure the entire hospital staff will continue to regard this as a privilege."

Preliminary talks toward a new contract were started about the end of November, according to Mrs. Anasald, and more are scheduled for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday with Paul Romano, assistant administrator.

Following the vote, she complimented both sides for waging "a mature campaign. 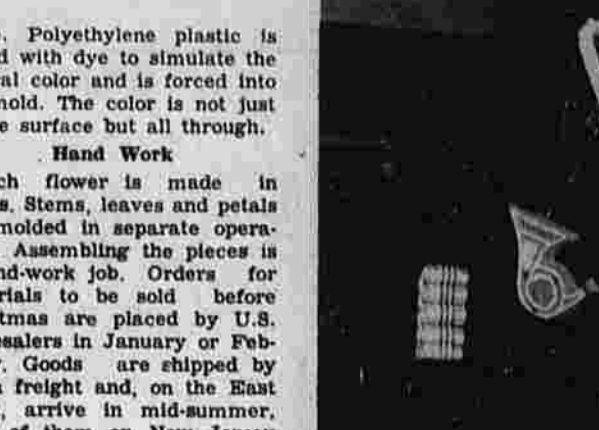

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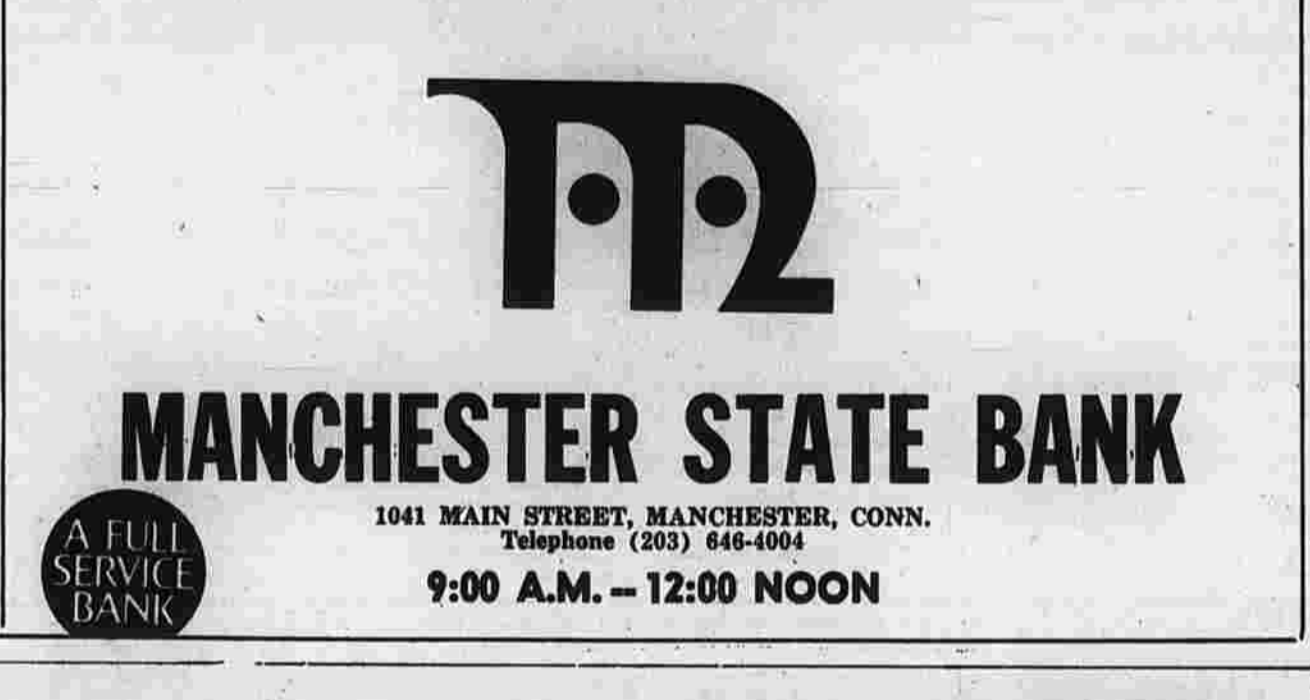
