

PHILADELPHIA (AP) -Mary Ann Harbert, the pert, 25-year-old secretary by the Communist Chinese for 31/2 years, says life in China's countryside was not too unpleasant af-ter the first year of captivity. Miss Harbert said Thursday

brown hair hung loosely around her neck, Miss Harbert related her story at a news conference. Taken at gunpoint from a friend's sailboat off the China coast in mid-1968, Miss Harbert was freed Monday along with 44-year-old Richard G. Fecteau Lynn, Mass. She and Fecteau, an Army civilian employe who was a prisoner of the Chinese for more than 19 years, crossed the border into Hong

Kong. They were flown to the Army's nearby Valley Forge General Hospital for medical

Downtown By The Bootstraps? It is good to have the perennially unolved problem of the Downtown Business District being discussed again.

Second Baseman Reinstated

The Little League has now been i existence long enough to begin to display some of its graduates on the big game major league scene. And that it would, in time, develop athletic skills toward the big game, was something to be expected.

We doubt that anybody has ever visualized the possibility that made its appearance in a decision from the Appellate Division of the New York State Supreme Court the other day.

It was a decision in which five ustices, five, no less, gave their sanimous verdict on a Little League controversy. It seems that, last May 6, the officials of the Staten Island Little League suspended a 10-year-old second baseman because his father, a busy surgeon who claimed he had no time in his schedule for such matters, had failed to take part in the "work parties" with which Little League parents maintained the playing field. The boy was allowed to sit on the bench in uniform, but suspended from play until his father should perform the duties asked of him. Instead of going to work on the field, the father engaged a lawyer, and sued the Little League officials on the ground that they were depriving his son of his civil rights.

Rather than deciding the question on such a broad issue, the five justices found that the League officials hadn't followed their own rules correctly, and used that as the basis for their decision. which was that the young player be reinstated next spring.



In cases where an injured person feels he is due more than the amount covering his bills and loss of wages he is still free to go to court. No-fault does not require proof that the other fellow was wrong nor does it require a claimant to prove he was in no way responsible for the ac-

The hearings now being conducted be fore the Massachusetts State Insurance artment are for the purpose of fixing 1972 insurance rates. The premiums under no-fault already have been reduced 15 per cent this year. The state is recommending a further 27.6 for 1972 and the ompanies are willing to give an 18.5 per ent reduction voluntarily

Naturally, there are all kinds of ramifications. One contention is that the companies actually have saved 73.3 per cent during the first nine months of no-fault compared with what they paid out during the first nine months of 1970. A request to include a rapid reading course in the high school curriculum will be considered in next year's budget by the Board of Ehucation. Mrs. Fred DeGiacomo told the board this week that she is 'only a housewife who loves to read" and has taken the adult evening course offered by the South Windsor school system. She said her progress charts show that when she began the 10-week , two-hour sessions, she was reading approximately 500 words per minute and, after the course, she has improved to ap-proximately 1,300 words per ninute and also has increased from 60 per cent to 80 per cent in comprehension.

U.S. goods would become cheaper, more competitive in world markets.

On the other hand, Germany and Japan favor a sizable U.S. devaluation. The mark and the yen are considered the most undervalued of the important currencies, and they are ear-marked for substantial upward revaluation as part of the set-tlement

A substantial U.S. deval-uation would let the Japanese and German governments get by with smaller up-valuations of the yen and mark. The same adjustment would be achieved in relation to the dollar, but the change would be more pala-table politically at home,
