A current advertisement recalls those unhappy days when we had to drink orange juice. It shows some of the stuff. But then, it says, came the tinned juices and the reconstituted concentrates, and the frozen kind, and the world kept getting better every minute. Finally, in the supremest triumph of its kind, we have a glorious orange juice substitute which tastes more like orange juice than or-ange juice does. The thing set me to thinking about oranges, and Gresham's

It wasn't the custom when I was a boy to take juice for breakfast. We had or anges, but not above three or four times a year, and we were sure of them only on Christmas, Mother felt she was start ing us off on adequacies with oatmeal molasses, a pork chop, fried e and hashed potatoes, her own bread, tal glasses of cow-fresh milk, and a piece of pie. That was supposed to see us through the forenoon quite well enough. It pret-

When we got an orange it was something we took in hand, skinning it with our fingers, and breaking away the sec-tions. Mother would call for us to put the skins in the trash bar'l, and not leave any about the doorstep. I was grown up before I ever had any orange juice, and I thought it was rather good — not knowing that it was to be improved on some

Our family, in those days, owned bachelor uncle who wandered a good bit, but always made an appearance at cars, but before arriving home in Maine he would pause in Boston to visit some friends, and to pick up the odds and ends that would be his holiday generosity. He always scouted the Faneuil Hall market stalls to find the biggest oranges.

We observed Christmas to the hilt, Even prim Aunt Mary, who later at 102 tough ones, hung her stocking with care, and seemed as fully delighted as we youngsters at what Santy brought her. I think we indulged our elders somewhat in this myth — it was unrealistic to see Aunt Mary knitting red and black mit-tens in November, and then blame them Santy at Christmas. When a child opened the tissues and found his mitten and turned directly to thank Aunt Mary Mary knit many, many pairs of mittens and each pair was always tagged

It was so with the oranges. Uncle would arrive to be received in due form, and if we youngsters had been forced to a choice 'twixt him and Santy, Santy would easily have won second price. The bundle of oranges was double-wrapped extra-tied, and it always had one of those wooden carriers on the cord. We'd all have an orange, Then, on Christmas morning, we'd frisk our stockings and find that good old Santy Claus had kets, too. We'd all have another orange.

Once in a while, nowadays, I'll see some oranges in our store that remind me of Uncle and Christmas, but not of-ten enough. Somebody, somewhere, grows them. But as day-to-day retailing pursues its insensitive course such orwas one year, not too long ago, that we had an orangeless Christmas. Well, when our own children came along, perhaps mindful of how much an orange had meant to me, I started a Christmas fruit bowl. We have a turned maple antique that measures 27 inches, and full of fruit on the sideboard 'tis a brave sight. Weatherwise, seasonwise, cropwise, December is the low month for u and save for apples we send out for fruit. 

Leaders of this movement depend upon personal charisma for their influence. One says: "I want to make it so hard that only the real Christians will stand up." This "I" betrays the same egocentric traditionalism Jesus condemned: "They bind heavy burdens, hard to bear, and lay them on men's shoulder's; but they them-selves will not move them with their finger," Matt, 23:6.

SAIGON (AP)—An armada of 350 American fighter-bombers pounded antiaircraft defenses and supply de-pots in North Vietnam around the clock tonight. "Every sign points to further operations," said informants, indicating a third day of heavy raids Tuesday.

North Vietnam claimed that five F4 Phantoms were shot down Sunday, two of them by antisireraft fire about 80 miles south of Hanol. Radio Hanol said two American airmen were killed when their plane crashed nose first into a rice field. Earlier Radio Hanol said that other "pilots were killed or captured" but gave no numbers.

The U.S. Command remained that three to bases in South Vietnam and Thailand and from the carriers Constellation and Coral Sea in the Tonkin Gulf. The raids continued around the clock.

While informants in Saigon said the raiders were making an all-out assault to lessen the threat of North Vietnamese MiGs, surface-to-air missiles and antisircraft artillery, the were of "limited duration" and would end at an undisclosed

The U.S. Command remained silent on Hanol's claims and withheld details of the raids. But field reports from search and rescue units indicated there had been some American losses.

Informants said President Nixon ordered the raids in retaliation for the loss of six U.S. planes in the past 2½ weeks would end at an undisclosed time. 
