350 U.S. Planes Slam Red Depots In Heavy Raids

(TWENTY-EIGHT PAGES-TWO SECTIONS)

SAIGON (AP)—An armada of 350 American fighter-bombers pounded antiaircraft defenses and supply de-pots in North Vietnam around the clock tonight. "Every sign points to further operations," said informants, indicating a third day of heavy raids Tuesday.

It was the biggest air attack on North Vietnam since President Johnson's bombing halt three years ago.

North Vietnam claimed that five F4 Phantoms were shot down Sunday, two of them by antisireraft fire about 80 miles south of Hanol. Radio Hanol said two American airmen were killed when their plane crashed nose first into a rice field. Earlier Radio Hanol said that other "pilots were killed or captured" but gave no numbers.

The U.S. Command remained that three to bases in South Vietnam and Thailand and from the carriers Constellation and Coral Sea in the Tonkin Gulf. The raids continued around the clock.

While informants in Saigon said the raiders were making an all-out assault to lessen the threat of North Vietnamese MiGs, surface-to-air missiles and antisircraft artillery, the were of "limited duration" and would end at an undisclosed

The U.S. Command remained silent on Hanol's claims and withheld details of the raids. But field reports from search and rescue units indicated there had been some American losses.

Informants said President Nixon ordered the raids in retaliation for the loss of six U.S. planes in the past 2½ weeks would end at an undisclosed time. The command said only "military targets" were being hit, but Radio Hanol claimed that the planes bombed and strafed a hospital in Thanh Hoa, a provincial capital 70 miles south of Hanol, and populated areas in two other provinces along the Laotian border.





The Right Principle

All punditdom is chalking up the de-feat of Pakistan as a major setback for American foreign policy, and the American denunciation of India's aggression as a major blunder. We suspect that as events work themselves out, though, the diplomatic losses will prove to be less important than they now seem, while the principle that dictated the American at-titude will prove to be far more important than the pundits have grasped.

The war has of course had bad consequences for the American position in that area of the world. The outcome leaves India predominant on the subcon-tinent, with its attitudes more pro-Soviet and anti-American than ever before. The Soviets may win new naval rights

has never had great influence in India, and Soviet influence there has been growing. In this respect the war reveal-ed more than it changed. The effective power of India in the future will depend in no small part on how it copes with the Bengali problem it has assumed; now, instead of 10 million refugees on its hands, it has a whole nation of 70

If the American denunciation of the rinning side cost it influence with governments beyond India, it was not obvi-ous in the United Nations voting, where the division was India, Russia, Cuba rest of the world. In terms of the larger Soviet-American balance in Asia, finally, the Russians' better relations with ndia are unlikely to offset our better re-

Even more impirizant, we find it difficult to assume that any steps by the Americans could have altered the chain of events in any significant way. The war could have been averted only if Pakistan abruptly reversed its national colicies and granted independence or near-independence to East Pakistan. The critics imply it is somehow an rican responsibility that this did not

'irue, the U.S. government allowed emmercial outlets to sell Pakistan miltary spare parts even after most Amerbloody repression in East Pakistan. But to suppose that such last straws would in fact have persuaded Pakistan to dis-solve itself is to base foreign policy on he suspension of disbettef.

Now, it's sensible enough to argue that in the situation even grasping at straws should have been tried, and that the U.S. would look better today if it had reacted more strongly to the Pakistan brutality. To this extent, a case can be made that American policy faltered Still, if the argument is less over how events could in fact have been changed than over what rhetorical policy should

have been chosen, the thrust of American policy was far more right than For while Pakistan's internal policies were an affront to anyone of conscience. it was India that broke the peace among nations. Most of the commentators and loudest Senators seem to have trouble understanding that this is a matter of principle. We suggest they talk it over with the Rumanians and Yugoslavs, who attack has come earlier in the dry season than last year. Principle is not notoriously effective in deterring the Russians, to be sure, and eventually they might indeed invade Yugoslavia when they consider the mo-ment ripe. Still, if the Indian affair is a matter of pick your principle—a democ-racy cannot be guilty of aggression against a military regime, or invading your neighbor is wrong—then the United states picked the right one. — WALL

WASHINGTON (AP) - Internal Revenue Service agents will begin checking retail stores closely next week for violations
