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



All-out support from President Nixon for an antibusing constitutional amend-

Granted, the temptation to flirt with such an amendment is great. Busing to achieve desegregation, an issue for more than a decade, has hit new thermal levels, as a result of recent court decisions that could lead to the joining of city and suburban school districts. Congressmen are feeling the heat; nearly 30 of them have tried to get on record with some

form of antibusing amendment.

But the consequences of President Nixon's actually teaming up with the amendment's backers — instead of giving audience to them and qualified verbal support - could be too grave to jus

The consequences stem from a conflict which such an amendment would create in the Constitution itself. Basically, the purpose behind court desegregation ac-tion is to dismantle the separate school systems or districts set up knowingly or otherwise for black youngsters. The pur-pose has not been to mix black or Chicano and white youngsters. In eliminating segregated schools, such a mixing occurs. But this is not the legal impul sion behind desegregation decisions.
