





Talked **Of POWs**

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Nixon talked to Chinese Premier Chou En-lai while in Peking last week about Vietnam peace prospects and possible freedom for American prisoners of war, an administration source says.

The source chatted with reporters Wednesday only on condition that he not be named. But the Boston Globe, which did not attend the briefing identified the official as Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, Nixon's chief national-security adviser. The official was asked if Nixon and other Americans had sought the good offices of the Chinese in helping resolve Vietnam problems, including POW question.

He replied that the Americans stated their point of view Asked if the Chinese said nothing on the topics, the source declined to discuss the subject further

Post Peking Pleasures

Just when we were about to chime in with the New York Times in its so very ophisticated complaint about the ornate kind of welcome home President Nixon's friends arranged for him, we began reading about the welcome Premier Chou's friends arranged for his return to

"The goal of a new, rational relationship between the two nations was hardly brought closer," complained the Times, "by the excessive ceremonial panoply that was staged for he President's return to Washington. The production, which brought to a climax the aper-spectacular TV atmosphere that characterized the entire trip, smacked more of the return of a triumphant potentate than of the successful end of a liplomatic mission."

That Washington welcoming crowd was gathered through the distribution among government employes of some 12,000 tickets for the occasion, a distribution which led some 5,000 people out to the airport.

Watching it, we thought it a bit rich, although we must confess it didn't annoy is particularly, since we could sense the President's hunger for a crowd of some

In fact, this was one occasion when we were almost ready to forgive the President his excessive preoccupation with pomp and uniforms and fanfares of trumpets. Then, in the same edition of the Times

complaining about wagance of the scene at Andrews hir Force Base, we read the news story emier Chou's return to Peking A few hours after Mr. Nixon landed to an enthusiastic welome," said the news account from Pekng, "the Premier stepped from his lyushin-18 turboprop to a drum-beating, ymbal-clashing reception from a crowd of 5.000."

This was a welcome, it seems, "which ar exceeded anything Mr. Chou normalreceives on return from the prov

"With dozens of red banners fluttering n the wind," the news account related, 'the Premier toured a three-sided square of soldiers, workers and Red Guards, many of them waving paper lowers and chanting quotations from Mao Tse-tung."

In China, as in the United States, it eemed a matter of high official rejoicng that the Peking meetings had ever een held and that each country was geting its own leadership back from them ale and hearty and none the worse for he fire water consumed in the process of dragon toasting dragon.

The truth is that those who are the ioudest champions of busing other peo-ple's children usually avoid Washing-ton's troubled, inner-city schools as they would the plague. As television commen tator Mike Wallace recently pointed out, of all the liberal Democratic presidential andidates in the Senate, only Henry lackson sends a child to the district's ublic schools.

Sen. Kennedy's son attends St. Alban's School for Boys, operated by the Episco-pal Church, where the tuition runs \$3,400 a year. Three children of Sen. Musicle also attend private institutions. And what about McGovern?

Wallace says that McGovern's daughter attends a private school in the Maryland suburbs before the family moved into the District of Columbia. This year she commutes daily to the Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School - out in the urbs of course - and McGovern is uired to pay \$1,450 tuition.


