





Busing: The Moderates Emerge rationally at the school busing issue

Not that some politicians and leaders are not trying to be rational. Vice-President Spiro Agnew, interestingly, and HEW Secretary Elliot Richardson have tried tentatively to put the constitutional amendment issue into perspective. They don't see an amendment as necessary, Sen. Walter Mondale also has tried to

cool the busing discussion. He heads the Select Committee on Equal Education Opportunity, which has been studyin desegregation issue for two years. argued last week that busing is already a fact of school life for 65 percent taking public transit are added to the 40 percent who ride on special school buses. He pointed out that desegregation has not meant the distribution of al black youngsters throughout a system, since a third of black youths in large Southern "desegregated" districts still attend all-black schools. Elsewhere in Congress, a move is on to keep the antibusing reaction from getting out of hand. Again in the Senate, Republican leader Hugh Sott and Democratic leader Mike Mansfield have offered a bipartisan compromise plan the courts that busing is a "permissible" tool for desegragation. It would not outlaw the use of federal funds for busing, but would leave it up to a district to ask for funds if it wanted them. It would keep various non-court govern mental agents from prescribing busing, eaving it up to the courts to carry the

Sen. Abraham Ribicoff of Connecticu has restated his own compromise integration plan. It would stretch out the job of integrating Northern and Western schools over a 10-year period. It would require schools to reflect half the per centage of black children in a given district — in effect helping whites avoid black-majority schools.

Taken together, the Mondale-Scott-Manatield-Ribicoff moves of the past week show a definite movement toward setting up a moderate busing position in Congress. This should be seen to counsentiment in America is turning the issue into a rout. Indeed, such a moderate position is
