## Winter Returns to State

A comparative heat wave at mid-week suddenly turned into another taste of winter, bringing cold rains, sleet and snow to Connecticut Friday and a chance of more snow tonight. The U.S. Weather Service predicted that the Farmington River would approach the 12day. Meteorologists had earlier warned of flash flooding along

small streams, but canceled that warning Friday night. Larger streams, however, were expected to continue rising today.

Despite hazardous driving conditions throughout the Manches-ter area last night, there were very few auto accidents. Manchester police reported three minor accidents with no injuries. State Police from the Stafford Springs barracks reported a flurry of "fender-bender" ac-cidents, none of them serious.

The rains, which began last Thursday night, were followed by sleet, freezing rain and snow Friday morning.

They think they have been promised, and they expect to get, a reduction in existing premiums.

If they see "no fault" enacted at Hartford, and then realize no cut in premium rates as a result, they are going to be a very angry Connecticut constituency. That is what lends point and force

to the contention advanced at Hartford the other day by Rep. Gerald F. Stevens of Milford, when he urged that some mandatory reduction in premiums be written into the "no fault" legislation it-

As it has turned out, the spoken gossip remained just gossip, but the memorandum complaining about it has survived and now seems likely to do much more damage than it sought to pre-



The actors play the parts of both parents and children engaged in heated arguments with the "parents forbidding their offspring to play with "those niggers" and the offspring demanding to know why not. It is inspiring to watch the black and white children in the audience laugh uproariously as the "parents" fumble for answers, and even more inspiring to see the black and white boys and girls happily singing a closing song, their arms

Racial incidents there have dropped from a schools-closing high to rock bottom since the kids took over from their parents. A properly concerned school administration supplied the leadership, of course. But nothing could have been accomplished in the Pontiac tinderbox if the children had not gone happily along. At what age is it that racial bigotry is born? - BOSTON GLOBE.

Mrs. Dille is the executive director of the Connecticut Child Welfare Organization. This is a voluntary citizen's organization of 4,000 members which has been in existence for over 50 years. It is the only social action group in the nation which is concerned only with children. In her talk, she explained the six welfare programs in Con-necticut: Old Age Assistance, Aid to Disabled, Medical Aid, Aid to Blind, Aid to Families and Dependent Children, and Child Welfare.

All but one of the welfare programs are reimbursed 50 to 75 per cent by the federal government, according to Mrs. Dille -Child welfare does not receive any reimbursement.
