MEMBERS' BENEFITS SET RECORD

ing about today's New Hampshire pri-It is getting more attention than it is really worth, and it can possibly have a lot more influence than it deserves.

It has, however, been precisely with such objectives in mind that New Hampshire has set it up the way it has. Somebody has to be first, and so long as New Hampshire holds to its first position on the presidential year calendar, so long is it going to be a compulsory madness for candidates and a compulsory event for the media to cover "in depth," however shallow the reality may be.

The New Hampshire primary has won such status, it must be confessed, because it has twice really helped make political history. It first came into the imelight when it gave the first demonstration of how the voters of this country would react to the presence of the name of Dwight D. Elsenhower on a.

It made history again when, 16 years later, it gave a demonstration of how the Democratic voters of the state were reacting to an opportunity to show their disapproval of the way a Democratic President was conducting the war in

even if no New Hampshire primary had ever been held. The event in New Hampshire was, however, the first dramatic public notice of what was going on, and it reflected more than any local idiosyncracy of political atmosphere.

Perhaps there is going to be some third dramatic notice in the results being voted in New Hampshire today. Perhaps Senator Muskie is going to be toppled. But if there is any pronounced upet of any kind in today's result, there will also have to be some suspicion of freakishness which may have resulted from the concentration of too many fringe candidates and too much national attention in a relatively small arena. There is, unfortunately for the laws of political justice, no way to prevent a freak result in New Hampshire, if we get one, from influencing successive decisions elsewhere.

A Dürable Controversy We find something hard to analyze -

but we think it comes out as something perversely comforting - in the latest news from Madrid, which concerns the outcome of two days of talks between the Foreign Ministers of Spain and Britain on the subject of Gibraltar. The result of this two day talking was

as close to nothing as could be imagined. It was that Britain and Spain agreed o continue to hold discussions, now and then, on the controversy which has existed between them for the past 200 years. Discussions, but not negotiations.

Draft Amnesty Young men who have fled the United States to avoid military service in Vietnam are not men without a country, because they have been taken in some-where, but they have presented this nation with one of the most delicate issues hat has come along in some time.

There is, however, a changing view. It is no doubt inspired partly by the feeling of many that Vietnam is a war that hould have never been entered into in he first place. Six months ago President xon answered with a flat "No" when asked if he foresaw granting amnesty to those who left the country to avoid service. But then in January he slightly modified his position saying: "I for one would be very liberal with regard to amnesty, but not while there are Americans in Vietnam fighting to serve their country and defend their country and not while P.O.W.'s are held by the enemy. After that we will consider it, but i would have to be on the basis of their of course paying the price that anyone

should pay for violating the law."

Presumably, the President means that would consider reducing the penalty pecause individuals may now surrender to the government and subject them-selves to court action. Senator Robert Taft Jr., R., Ohio, has proposed one method of granting qualified amnesty. He suggested enacting a bill which would permit draft resistors to be released from prison or returned to the U.S. if they agreed to serve their country in some form for a period of three years. This would approximate the alemative granted to conclentious objectors. The Taft Amnesty Act of 1972 would permit individuals to serve in the armed forces or in alternative service— Vista, Veterans Administration hospitals, Public Health Service hospitals, or other service designated by the Attorney Jeneral. They would serve at the lowest


pay grade, and no one would be granted mnesty if they actually deserted from the armed forces for any reason. Altogether there are some 70,000 young Americans living abroad, most in Canada, to avoid the draft. This is a staggeringly high number. In this country 327 are in jail, and 3,900 draft resistors are under indictment.

While it can never be argued that the cost of punishment should deter the nation from enforcing its laws-if they are 70,000 young people returned to this country it would cost \$840 million to keep them in jail per year. The cost of housing a federal prisoner is now some \$12,000 per year. Needless to day, America could make better use of that \$840 million, should perchance events ever so transpire that an exodus back to the United States really started. For that very reason, many people may argue, let them stay where they are."

One precedent for handling the prob-lem was established by President Trueman in 1947 when, upon recommenda-tions of an Amnesty Review Board, he ardoned 1,523 men who had avoided the lraft in World War II. This is a power constitutionally granted to the President

under his general pardoning power. Because of the great differences in the country, between those who would do between those who would require some service to win complete amnesty, and between those who argue that the "philosophy of retribution" lies beaind the concept of alternate service, little is apt to occur quickly. Because we have supported the con-

cept of alternate service for all that are called by the draft, in conjunction with moving toward a volunteer army, the idea of granting amnesty in return. alternate service is an idea that we would approve. Should the mood of the nation change, after the war, it still would be possible to go to full amnesty. At this time, alternative service shoul be insisted upon. - MIDDLETOWN


WASHINGTON (AP) - President Nixon's stand on school busing will remain a secret umtil after the Florida primary next Tuesday.
