The Danger Of Any Crutch The National Commission on Marijuana and Drug Abuse has now formally

released its long-discussed report. As was predicted, the Commission fails to find that marijuana is anything like the peril some anti-drug crusaders have pictured it. Indeed, the Commission concedes that the use of marijuana can be such a harmless thing that the private use of it should not be disturbed.

But, although it may be such broadmindedness, and such refusal to join in any hysteria over marijuana which make the headlines for the Commission's report, some of the published excerpts from that report are certain to make all thoughtful minds uneasy.

Like alcohol, cigarets, other drugs, or peanut butter, marijuana is one of the things human beings can turn into a crutch upon which they rely to tide them over their own moments of unpleasant psychological stress.

But the answer with regard to whether any crutch is good has to be this: No crutch is good if it leads to increased human dependency on it.

The crutch does not have to be classified as "addictive" in its influence in order to receive that increased human dependency which sometimes evolves more from the problems and character of the individual than from the composition of the crutch he begins to use.

Get such increased human dependency on the crutch, whatever kind of crutch it is, and the nature of the results from the use of the crutch may begin to intensify and change, as might be imagined in a case of an all peanut butter diet.

If we should become a nation of marijuana dependents - dependents, not addicts — that might, the Commission

Russia's Link With Free Speech

The United States has become deeply disenchanted with "involvement abroad; "non-interference" in the inter nal affairs of other countries is the new iberal wisdom, and "detente" the ob lective. But does detente mean that the non-Communist world should stop speak ing up for itself, or that non-interfe should mean silence? That is the question, raised by Senator William Fuloright's determination to cut off funds for the broadcasting stations Radio Free Curope and Radio Liberty. These stations broadcast from Munich in Russian to the Soviet Union, and in their own languages to other countries of the Communist Bloc. Senator Fulbright says they are relics of the cold war and an irritant which stands in the way of better understanding with Mcscow. Largely at his instigation, a joint House-Senate committee of Congress has blocked the renewal of funds. Some last minute move must now be made if these stations are not to be silenced.


Senator Fulbright, whose liberal sympathies have rarely been questioned. must be puzzled by the dismay this has caused among so many liberal friends around the world. They have been saying that the Senator is on a disastrously wrong tack. And so he is. He should think again. For Radio Free Europe is not what it was. It used to be the mouthplece of Dulles-style cold war. It was covertly financed by the CIA, but not now when its State Department grant is open and accountable. Reputedly it is providing an alternative free radio proramme for Russian listeners, and has come, with a large audience, a channel for broadcasting back to Russia what the dissident Russian writers and

ntellectuals are prevented from publishing in their own country. It has become an important source of uncensored news and ideas.
