the needs of modern society. The study for New York concludes that the future livability and efficiency of governmental functions for that city many as 35 districts, each to govern and sanage itself in many of the departsents of modern city living and func-

This, says the study, would be "one way to deal with the frustrations, the irritations, the alienation of citizens. It is one way to deal with the remoteness and inaccessibility of government."

Although such a set-up would involve a considerable addition of cost of government, in that it would take many more officials to staff 35 local governments than one central government, the authors of the report contend that the \$30,000,000 a year that might be involved n increased salary costs would eventually turn into an economy because the districts would provide rival standards of efficiency for one another, as against a situation in which New York City as one unit has no comparative operations to use as a yardstick.

out fear of being bombed back. The same side has been free to use bombers, fighter planes, and helicopters in conjunction with its own land operations without having to guard against the possibility of enemy fighter plane inter-

Under such conditions, the helicopter has become a main instrument of the war in Vietnam. But even those who have been directing, expanding and benefiting from its use must have been trying to figure out, all along, what the role of the helicopter might still be if the enemy had fighter planes in the air, or even other helicopters.

Why has it been this kind of war? First, the United States decided that it could and would risk the use of its air

power. Its decision balanced a fear that North Vietnam's big backers might respond with air power of their own against the immediate military threat, which seemed to be, back in 1965, that North Vietnam might win the war very quickly if air power didn't get into ac-Second, Russia and China did no

choose or dare to back up their lo cal clients with their bombers, their fighter planes, or their helicopters. For some reason, fortunately, they held back from the act which would have converted this into world war. Perhaps it was because they were afraid. Perhaps it was because they feared they would lose in any such contest with us. And perhaps it was because they calculated, with considerable accuracy, perhaps, that their little friends in Indochina could stay in the war against us even

without any air power of their own. Of course, Russia and China still have the option of changing their minds, and of doing it at a point when they might catch us going the wrong way, trying to get out of the war. Would we then head back to face, at last, the full scale world conflict that has been avoided so far?

We hope Russia and China aren't rash mough to try and find out what we would do, if that "new dimension" should now appear. It would seem to be to their benefit to let what seems likely to be the verdict of military history stand - that we are getting out of Vietnam because our unchallenged command of the air failed, not because it worked.
