What Chief Justice Burger did, the other day, was to put into writing a heory that a lower Federal Court might have "unjustifiably frustrated the efforts of the executive branch to comply with the will of Congress as rather clearly ex-

Chief Justice Burger went on to assert that "in these circumstances Congress, may, of course, take any further legislative action it deems necessary to make unmistakably clear his intentions . ... even to the point of limiting or prohibit-

ing judicial review of its drectves." What the Chief Justice was saying, was that any time Congress fear or resent the possibility that the judicial branch of government may find enactment by the legislative branch to be illegal, Congress can itself adopt a law forbidding the courts to review or consider, from the point of view of constitutionality, the legislation is

This is the kind of claim and argument that would be expected from a Franklin D. Roosevelt angry at the Court for striking down his New Deal legislation or even from a President Nixon who has decided to persuade the nation's courts into reversing themselves on the busing issue. Or it might come from some member of Congress, disturbed over the

Court's power to negate his vote. But this is probably the first time such an argument in favor of the actual supremacy of the legislative branch over the judicial branch has come from the highest holder of judicial office in the girls knew they had on the best, and To look at it from what may be Chief

Justice Burger's point of view, he may find it surprising that it is considered unusual for him to contend that Congress has the power to legislate what the courts can and cannot do. He, from his point of view, may con

But the other possibility would have been that the domestic tension and strife would have got far worse until the revolution we were forbidding turned out to be far more troublesome than

In either case, Chief Justice Burger writes as if he might almost like to go back and try.

## **Research:** The key to plentiful, DOOR clean electric power.

Some tough questions have to be asked and answered. How are we going to provide the power which will be needed in the future with the least effect on the environment? . . . How do we supply it while helping the best utilization of land and water? . . . How do we supply it at a reasonable price despite the inflationary

pressures present in the economy? Because the answers to these problems can come only through research, Northeast Utilities has doubled its research budget in each of the past several years to a 1972 commitment of over \$4,000,000.

But even though our involvement is substantial most research that's needed is too costly for any one company to carry alone. Therefore, we are pooling our efforts with several other utilities, the federal government and with electrical equipment manufacturers.

Major Northeast Utilities Research Projects Summarized briefly, here are some of the most

important projects we are involved with at this time: The Fuel Cell - This is probably best known as the power system aboard the Apollo spacecraft. By taking oxygen and hydrogen and putting them through a catalyst, an electric current is produced. Compact, quiet and nonpolluting, fuel cells could be located in substations in shopping centers or industrial parks, reducing requirements for new transmission lines. We have joined a group of companies working with Pratt & Whitney Air-

craft in exploring potential applications. Underground Transmission Lines - With our present technology, the cost of putting high-voltage transmission lines underground can be many, many times greater than building them overhead. Hoping to reduce this cost spread, we have directed our biggest single research investment toward the study of a new system in which high-voltage lines would be enclosed in a conduit, insulated with compressed gas - and buried underground, below water, or mounted on low, ground-hugging sup-

Magnetohydrodynamic (MHD) Electric Generation -This system, with the forbidding name, eliminates the conventional rotating generator and produces electricity directly from a stream of hot, electrically conducting gases passed through a magnetic field.

MHD offers many exciting possibilities, so we are contributing to research which we hope will lead to a working model by 1980.

Nuclear Breeder Reactors - Reactors of this type, in producing electricity from uranium, actually create, or "breed," more fuel than they use by converting uran-ium oxides into fissionable fuels. The widespread use of "fast breeders" could extend the life of known uranium reserves from mere decades to perhaps thousands of years. We are exploring three promising types of breeder reactors: Liquid Metal, Gas Cooled, and Molten Salt. It is the goal of government and industry to have a breede reactor in commercial operation sometime in the 1980s.

Controlled Thermonuclear Fusion - Unlike nuclea power reactors in use today - which split the atom fusion plants would create energy by combining atoms available in ordinary water at tremendously high temof fusion it could mean a new and practically unlimite source of electric power. For example, enough electricity to heat and light a home for a year could be produced by an electric company fusion plant from the energy in

Sulfur Dioxide Removal - Looking for more effective, more economical methods of reducing emissions of sulfur dioxide gas from our power plant stacks, the Northeast Utilities system recently made a substantial commitment toward cooperative research into sulfur dioxide removal through a molten carbonate process.

Results of a test program are expected to be available by the end of 1973. High-Energy Electric Storage Batteries - Our companies are sponsoring promising research into storage batteries of a new type through one independent project, and through a second, group effort. If this research is successful, batteries that are noiseless, economical and pollution-free might be located in substations near centers of high electric demand, to store energy at night

(when charging power from base load units is available) for use as needed during peak demand hours. Environmental Studies - In 1972 we will continue to spend a substantial portion of our research budget on projects dealing with environmental sciences. These projects range from studies of the effects of warm water on marine life to radiological surveys. They help us to design our generating plants to minimize environmental

A Vision For The Future

Last summer, the Northeast Utilities system made a proposal which has been receiving serious study both within and outside the electrical industry. Called "A Project for Prometheus," the proposal envisions a longrange electric industry research and development effort aimed at delivering abundant, cheap, virtually pollutionfree energy from a system that would be essentially without risk to the environment. The overall program, which would cost an estimated \$40 billion and span 30

years, would be funded principally by the electric industry. This is one of a series of subjects covered in our Open Door Discussions. It should be recognized that, like virtually all research programs, the projects we have discussed are part of a long-range effort. Any one of them could run into a dead end. But we truly believe that most will be successful. Your comments and questions are welcome and would be helpful to us in evaluat-
