But once he had assumed the office he sought, President Nixon soon revealed, quite openly, what his formula was. It was a bold and daring unliateral de-

He began taking American troops out of Vietnam without any negotiation or or even condition that the other side of the war must match our own withdrawal. All that was required of the enemy, in fact, was that he should not proceed to reescalate while we were deescalating. All the enemy had to do to be sure to be rid of our military presence in Vietnam was to let the fight-

This was a kind of action which was not expected from Richard Nixon, any more than there was ever any expecta-President who would step boldly into the Chinese situation with civil gestures toward Peking.
