To President Nixon, it has been the formula by which he could get the Inited States out of Vietnam without hose sufferings of conscience and eputation which would be in store for him if he should get us out and Hanoi should then proceed to the easy military conquest of Saigon.

To the President's political critics, and to the more irresponsible among our doves, Vietnamization is a deceiving slogan which is intended to gloss over the fact that the President is still out after a military victory in Vietnam.

The current military news is that, whatever it is, Vietnamization is now eing put to the critical test in the battlefields of South Vietnam.

The trend of the military news, so far, indicates that, if Vietnamization is succeeding, it is not succeeding in any way which would suggest its capacity to press toward an old-fashioned military victory over North Vietnam, but merely in an ability to defeat North Vietnamese efforts to claim a positive and recognizable victory in its present cam-

From the present nature of the dispatches, one could guess that there may have to be fighting for several weeks more before there is any real assurance the North Vietnamese attacks have been dealt with.

At this point, our observation is this: imagine the alternative consequences, even the President's critics and even the doves would have to join in the hope that Vietnamization succeeds.

We can conceive of no way in which military success for North Vietnam in its present operations can produce peace for anybody. In fact, now, as it has been from the very start, the only good military news from Vietnam would have to be news of stalemate. To give President Nixon's Vietnamization what we believe to be its proper interpretation, it was in itself an effort to make policy on the basis of, and to guarantee a continuance of, a condition of military stalemate not victory. Hanol has rejected that offer of military stalemate in order to make its own try for a decisive military victory. We deplore the new fighting and tragedy this decision by Hanol involves. But even dove Democrats ought to hope that Vietnamization works well enough, even though that may redound to thepolitical credit of President Nixon, to keep North Vietnam from attaining its objective.

### Also From China

Down in Washington, D. C. long lines have been forming at the zoo for a glimpse of the giant pandas which are modern China's gift to the American people, Premier Chou and President

Nixon being the agents. Running up the seaboard from Washngton to Hartford there is, these days, the yellow flicker and flash of another gift from another China, the China of nore than a hundred years ago. The agents who brought forsythia to

this country were the clipper captains of New England. As against the limited mortality of the

Let us stand up and e counted. We must rise up against the English jokes that imply the English are lirty, stingy, lazy, and stupid. The English are a great people. Send contributions to the English-American Anti-Defamation League. Lloyd Featherstoneaugh, Treasurer."

My personal interest in ethnic organisations is small. Like most Americans, I posseas an erratic lineage that winds back to an assortment of foreign countries, making a passionate attachment to any ethnic group impossible. But it is still possible to understand those feelings of loyalty that many of my countrynen share toward this or that foreign state.
