One type of reaction centers upon the act that one lawless individual, who probably should have been in some kind of custody anyway, succeeded in obtaining a weapon the law should not have allowed him to possess, then penetrated a security guard which should have been stronger, and thus committed an act for which he himself should receive the death

To sum up this type of reaction, it says there is something wrong with our law and order apparatus.

The second kind of post-assassinationattempt reaction and analysis likes to assume that the individual who appears out of nowhere to deal the violent blow is sick; that his being sick is part of a general sickness in which our whole society shares; that the atmosphere in which this sickness trending toward violence develops so readily and so often is an atnosphere for which our whole society is to blame; that all of us, therefore, share collectively some of the guilt for the terrible thing that has happened; and termath, is to take just as searching a look at ourselves as we direct into the character and behavior of the would be

If one goes into the effort to resolve the conflict between these two kinds of analysis, one might reach, rather quickly, the baffling conclusion that one part of our national sickness is our inability to unite on one or the other of these theories. Certainly, it is difficult to write either of them off. A truly rigorous gun control law, for instance, might have meant no weapon in Laurel, Maryland, yesterday. An even heavier security system, with stricter rules against letting a candidate mix with a crowd, could have prevented the attempt. But, on the other hand, who can really escape the feeling that with this, the fourth major as-Saying a kind word about the boss sassination attempt within a political decade, there is indeed some kind of national madness upon us, somehow worse and more extreme than ever before, a madness which tricks us all into being

into some evil kind of physical violence? We will not settle this debate easily. Meanwhile, we are blessed and fortunate to have preliminary medical signs that the life of Governor Wallace has not peen taken. We would be still more fortunate if he were to have such a recovery as to enable him to resume his campaigning almost immediately, to receive, on his feet, the legitimate answer to his appeal to the American peoplean answer in ballots, not bullets.

they get rooted, must inevitably flower

We wish for such speedy and complete recovery, for his good and for ours.

As for our own recovery, as a people, we cannot but feel that depends upon some deep regeneration of our national sense of identity, unity and purpose which revives, with fresher clarity than the words or the visions of our own day seem to give us, the standards of mutual conduct and tolerance for which we originally organized ourselves. We imagine there was once such a love and prizing of freedom among us that we volunteered the necessary disciplines to it. We imagine there was a time when an instinctive feeling that we were one nation imposed a sense of responsibility

upon our conduct in our disagreements We do not know where to find the cure. Certainly, it is not in Governor Wallace and what he has been offering us; certainly it is not in the conduct of his would-be assassin. We see, in fact, no leadership of impressive quality or stature on high; the hope has to-lie within those embers of decency which glow somewhere inside millions of ordinary hearts, and which may, some saving day, find and reinforce one another.

To us, the explanations of such a sentiment seem readily available. For those of hawkish persuasion and

instincts, whose main reason for being sick of the war has been their belie that we weren't going all out to win it, the President's decision was a welcome, long-delayed display of toughness There are even some who, beyond relishing the toughness of the Preident's action, think it might even operate to speed the end of the war, by putting a really destructive pinch on North

But the main reason for a widening of public support for President Nixon in his decision to blockade and bomi North Vietnam into some kind of sub mission lies in the way a good many people who are neither hawks nor dove have analyzed the President's situation.

dent Nixon is a leader who has, despite

the nagging kibitzing of his dovish critics, demonstrated, by his withdrawal of nearly half a million American troops from Vietnam, the sincerity of his own effort to wind down the war. But North Vietnam, instead of accepting such a pointed, magnanimous and civilized initaton to a stalemate, decided to repay President Nixon by launching its biggest offensive ever, in the hope of gaining for itself that complete military victory President Nixon had proved willing to forego. To reduce this feeling to simplest terms, President Nixon was trying to do something big and right and North Vietnam repaid and rewarded him by trying to take military advantage of his effort


At this point all the human nature inside the President responded with an instinct to do something to punish Hanoi and make it pay dearly for its new "aggression," and the elemental human nature in many of the rest of us merely asked, perhaps reluctantly, what else he could be expected to do. There is no reason to believe a poll report of a 59 per cent approval of the President's action is not accurate, even though, in the main, it may have been a somewhat fateful and negative acceptance of a ituation of no choice rather than optinistic approval of a potential deliverance from our agony in Vietnam.




