Wildlife with Captain Bob

In the Age of Aquarius, where "conservation" and "ecological balance" have become catchwords of the times, Bob Cottle — better known as "Captain Bob" on WTIC-TV (Channel 3) — instills children and adults alike with respect for the wildlife that roam our land and dwell in its waters. It is this New Englander's legendary regard for the land and sea, plus a desire to impart this regard to future generations that accounts for the success of "Captain Bob's" weekly television program.

television program.
Cottie, who speaks with a distinct Downeast flavor, even looks like a white-haired sea captain, the kind who salled Yankee cippers out of Gloucester for San Francisco or Cathay. But in working out the format of his program, Cottle's outlook is definitely contemporary and in tune with the times.

"The main objective of the Captain Bob program," Cottle said, "is to infuse an appreciation of wildlife into children and adults, for that matter. Each program deals with a different subject, not just one particular animal. One program might be devoted to the subject of seaguils, and the next to the many types of anthers and horns found on different animals around the world. I usually start the program by showing a mature film on the

subject I'll be dealing with, then draw a picture of it on the drawing board, while giving viewers various little-known facts

Newers versus to an active to his grandfather, "a senfaring New Englander. When I was a youngster, I would just sit at his knee for hours, enthralled by his stories about deer and squirrels, or his adventures while sailing a ship out on the ocean. As he continued to talk, I could just picture them as vividiy in my mind's eye as if I had been there, or had watched the animals he was talking about."

For children who have never had the experience of listening to a grandfather tell them stories collected from the far corners of the globe, "Captain Bob" combines the dying art of storytelling with that of fine art. Studied Art

Cottle was born in Brockton, Mass., and graduated from the Vesper George Art School in Boston, and also studied art in Provincetown.

"Then World War II broke out, and temporarily interrupted my career, as it did the careers of many others. I served in the Air Force as a flying instructor, and once that stint was over, I decided to use my artistic training as a newspaper artist."

"They were a combination of

"They were a combination of nature fact and fantasy," he recalls, "We created a little fellow called "Jasper," and tried with little success to place him in a newspaper as a comic strip.
"In 1953, we discovered television, and now it seems that these little stories actually did fit into a television format better than a newspaper. I created little nature stories and illustrated them, but a professional actor would deliver them on the air.

TV Auditions

"Then it was suggested that instead of having an actor do the show, I do it myself. After six auditions for a large television station in the Boston area, I finally sold them the idea of the 'Captain Bob' show," Cottle said.

"Captain Bob" spent the next 12 years on the New England air waves, gaining invaluable experience directing, producing and acting in his own show.

By utilizing a background rich in nature lore, his own boundless creative imagination, and careful research, Bob Cottle and "Captain Bob" prove to thousands of captivated viewers that an educational and informative program can easily be entertaining as well.

"I think a great many people still feel that an educational program must be dry and uninteresting. That may have been true years ugo, but certainly not today, with programs such as 'Sesame Street' debunking that theory," Cottle said. "And I hope that's what we're achieving with 'Captain Bob.' Aithough I'm teaching viewers about the world around them, I hope I'm entertaining them as well. That's what's most important."

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
