This is not a partisan phenomenon; it has nothing to do with whichever party happens to be in power. It is a suspicion and a fear that, under present conditions, government is incapable of performing is faltering badly without any assurance that repair is likely or even possible. In the political campaigning so far, not yet out of the primaries phase, there is ample evidence that people are discon-tented with things as they are. Once again, this is not a partisan phenome-non. It is generalised, crossing party lines and most social distinctions. A pro-found dissatisfaction is being registered, and a desperate desire for radical im-
