The McGovern - Wallace Majority One surprising reading of the Demoratic situation now shows Senato George McGovern, not so long ago as tong a shot as there could be, winning almost by default.

We look, for instance, as the desultory primary over in Rhode Island, which ended up giving Senator McGovern that state's 22 delegates.

Only 10 per cent of the state's voters othered to participate in the primary. Senator McGovern's grand total of votes received was 15,501, or 41 per cent of the total number of votes cast in the Democratic primary.

The primary in Oregon, where Senator McGovern gathered himself another 34 delegates, was more respectable More people came out to vote, and Senator McGovern got over 200,000 votes as compared to some 80,000 for Governor Wallace and 50,000 for Senator Hum-

In both Rhode Island and in Oregon, however, McGovern victories were conceded in advance.

And in the wake of these easy victor ies, it is now almost being conceded that Senator McGovern may be the winner, on the first ballot no less, at Mlami

to be lucky if he came in third anywhere. This reversal of the McGovern fortunes has developed so swiftly that nobody has had time to try to figure out whether it has been due to his own appeal and his own campaign exertions or due merely to the dismally unappetizing alternatives in the Democratic field.

For our opinion, we suspect that the appearance of something that can be called a "McGovern bandwagon," as one headline called it the other day, reflects a growing disposition of the American electorate to go reckless and berserk in its search for something it hopes will be different from the established political

Add the proportion of McGovern votes which may reflect such a desperately romantic search to the votes being given to Governor Wallace for much the same emotional kind of reason, and you have a frightening prospect which shows these two, together, apparently able to capture a clear majority in any primary test, a majority which is with them not because it realizes very much what they stand for, but because it thinks it knows that they are, in some magical way, against what we have been having. How absurd it may be for the followers of Mc-Govern and Wallace to be joined together in a majority would, in a more normal political era, be plain enough. But who can guarantee that the present mood and instinct of the American electorate is not to deliberately try the absurd, for a change?

The Shy One And The Bold One Our analysis of the resignation of John B. Connally from his post as Secretary of the Treasury is limited to a guess as to the timing of its announcement. We wouldn't be surprised to have President Nixon decide to refuse the Republican nomination and go to Mlami Beach to lead a movement to nominate Connally in his stead. We wouldn't be surprised if the two men decided to go on a space journey to the moon together. We wouldn't be surprised at anything

Then there were, this spring, two incidents of massive fish kills traced to the warming of the water created by two Connecticut nuclear plants, one on the Sound, the other on the Connecticut. In spite of all the advance testing and experimentation, it developed, there still were fish foolish enough to plunge from natural cool water into the high temperatured water coming out of the nuclear plants, and fish frail enough to die as a

The problem on the Sound was supposedly resolved by the use of a screen to keep the fish away from the warm water. But the latest news about using a

screen to protect fish is that the state of New York has just levied a fine of \$1.-638,160 against Consolidated Edison befoolish little fish came along and somehow managed to impale themselves on the screen Consolidated Edison had put in the Hudson River to keep fish out of the cold water the plant was sucking in for its own use. Apparently more screens, to keep the fish away from the intake screen, and some reduction in the velocity with which the cold water is drawn into the intake system, will be

The experts can analyze and experiment and pronounce, but not until the new system, whatever it is, has been operated for a considerable period of time can we be sure that it is not going to present problems. If the fish were reading, during those planning and licensing years, they would have had the idea that nuclear plants were benevolent wild life conservation devices. Presumably, the ingenuity of man being what it is, they will eventually be made as safe as they were supposed to be. The fish, meanwhile, should veer off to deep, cool

The plan or idea of Multiple Listing did not originate with the Manchester Board of Realtors.







Loan Terms Eased For Quality Homes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government has made it possible for home buyers to purchase more-expensive houses with smaller down payments.

The Federal Home Loan Bank Board decided this week to increase maximum amounts that federal savings-and-loan associations can lend on conventional mortgages in which a down payment is only 5 to 10 per cent.

For loans covering 30 per cent of the cost of the home, federal savings-and-loan associations may lend as much as \$45,000, up from the present \$36,000.

On \$5-per-cent loans, home buyers may borrow \$36,000 instead of the present \$36,000. The new maximums are effective June 1.

Conventional loans, those neither guaranteed by the Veterans Administration nor insured by the Federal Housing Administration, are harder to obtain, and the interest rates are higher than on FHA and VA loans.


