





The Real Violence In Society

Mario Corradi, who teaches a course in nonviolence at Yale, was in print in the May lasue of the Yale Alumni Magazine which came through the mails just as new intensity of bombing was rocking Vietnam and just as a series of 38 calibre bullets were being fired into the stomach of Governor Wallace in a shopping center in Maryland.

With such excess of explosive drama in the news, being continued with new subsequent headlines such as those from the airport at Tel Aviv, all defying analytical solution beyond one more revival of the standing argument about whether or not, when such acts appear, leaders in high places or paranoids in low estate or society as a whole should be held guilty, it seemed cooling and constructive to find Professor Corradi concentrating, first, on that "form of violence that does not require physical

Professor Corradi took as his supreme example of the tragedy of violence all the preludes to the assault at Attica.

"Attica," he said, "epitomises the supreme violence that society can unleash. In the whole cycle of the Attica victims, from birth in a slum to death in a prison, the amount of physical viomostly the outrage of studying in an overcrowded school, waiting in interminable lines, being refused certain kinds of employment and a home in certain neighborhoods.

"Any analysis of violence that limits itself to physical and individual violence, in other words, would examine only a minimal part of the phenemenon.

"The real violence in society would go unnoticed by quantiative standards. It is committed not only in the streets and the slums, but in clean office buildings, in executive rooms and between martinis, accompanied by smiles, handshakes and applause.

"When men are no longer ends in themselves," continued Professor Corradi. "but are means to other men's ends then men violate each other

"When nature is considered not as an extension of man, but as a tool that man can manipulate for his own benefits. then man violates nature.

'Violence is not only the fist-fight, or only the first battle; it is the whole process that leads to these actions." Professor Corradi's broader definitions

of violence support those of us who have thought we sensored more violence inside a voting booth in the casting of a quiet, secret vote against busing, for instance, than in some open race riot, or more violence in some prayer than there is in some murder, or more violence in the merciless civil imposition of moralistic folkways than in an enfilade

The breadth of Professor Corradi's classification of violences leads us to respect his converse definitions of nonviolence. That, he said, "is more than passive conduct during a demonstration, or a political means to achieve social changes. In personal terms it is a life style, in political terms it is a different world order, and in terms of nature it is a new ecological consciousness. True nonviolence is indivisible, and yet it is not a metaphysical truth; it is realized through men and by men who are in a historical process of growth." In such a vein of thought we find the
