Plants Grew Naturally
The question most often asked by visitors is whether the laurel plants grew naturally or were set out. They all grew naturally and the older plants were there when Paul was a boy. They were shaded by tall trees and in competition with other underbrush, however, and cutting the trees to give the laurel more light was the first step in developing the laurel

soil, Paul sets out small need evergreens each year, moving 60 or more seedling trees from other parts of his property. The needles they drop add acid to

the soll.

As the conifers grow higher than the laurel, they provide nice perches for the birds which nest here in numbers. When they begin to cast enough shade to inhibit the laurel bloom, the trees are cut and left on the ground to decay.

Paul uses no fertilizer and does not need to use any pesticide spray. He notes that, fortunately, the gypsy moth caterpillars seem not to like the laurel leaves. Cutting big confers and planting small ones is what he calls "balancing," and he believes it is necessary to healthy growth.
