



How Manchester's proposal to buy 100 acres of now dry Laurel Lake and use it for sanitary landfill fits into plans the state will be developing to solve solid waste disposal problems has been unclear in the past and will apparently remain so until the end of the month. At that time the State Department of En vironmental Protection (DEP) will be holding hearings to answer question about how local plans might fit into an ventual statewide plan.

Gov. Thomas Meskill will Tuesday ar nounce the name of the organization which will develop a Statewide Solid Waste Management Program. In a letter this week to all municipali-

ties in the state, Dan Lufkin, state environmental protection commissione streases the regional aspects of the impending plan. "We are especially enthusiastic about the program because i offers great potential benefits to all of the people in Connecticut. Although this is a statewide endeavor, it must be developed in a climate of local and regional participation."

He adds, however, "We realize that there will be many questions during the initial stages of the program. Shou present plan? How will existing facili-ties fit into the anticipated statewide plan, and so forth?"

He says a series of regional meetings will be set up at the end of the month answer these and other questions.

The owners of the lake bed, descendants of the Case family, are asking \$500,-000 for the land or \$650,000 over 10 years. After a recent public hearing on the proposal, the Board of Directors decided to try further negotiations with the owners to lower the price. If the town bough the land and developed it for a landfill, it would take care of the town's solid waste for the rest of the century.

This month's report of the building de partment offers some encouraging evidence about the state of Manchester's In June, for the first time in several months, the total value of building cov-

ered in permits issued was more than that for the same month last year. Total building covered in June was \$1,733,156 worth of work as compared to \$635,231 worth of work covered in permits issued last June. The building in June this year pro duced permit fees totaling \$8,780 as compared to \$3,255 from building pernits last year.

However, last June, other types of permits produced more revenue than similar permits issued this June. Certificates of occupancy, electrical heating, and plumbing permits last year in June raised the total fees collected to \$8,456.50. This year these additional types of permits raised the fee total only a little under \$1,000 to \$9,274.50.



A Humane Decision The Supreme Court, in its historic 5-to-4 decision, has ruled capital punishment to be "cruel and unusual punishment," and therefore a violation of the Eighth Amendment of the Constitution. By that decision it has placed the United States within the ranks of a growing number of modern countries which of chew the ancient law of an eye for an eve, a life for a life.

This newspaper, which has for many years consistently called for abolition of ports that decision. We are grateful that the overturning of this atavistic practice will spare the country from the brutalizing need to go ahead with the execution of 600 men and women who have been locked in death row cells. At the same time, we recognize that the high court's decision is not the last word on this subject. It raises a greater challenge for society both to find other ways to prevent crime, and to deal intelligently with those who do resort to major crimes. It is entirely possible that the court

could reverse itself in the future. The four dissenting justices were all appointees of President Nixon. And with the possibility of another appointment, es pecially is the President is re-elected, a future case could find a newly reconstructed "Nixon court" overturning Thursday's ruling. This point is only underscored by the fact that the five majority justices all gave different reasons for their decision, and did not agree on a single one of these.

Beyond that, as Chief Justice Burger pointed out there are ways around th decision. While the court outlawed executions of prisoners now condemned under existing statutes, it did not prevent conditions under which the death penal ty could be imposed. Nor did the court rule out the possibility of mandatory death sentences for specific crimes (in fact, two states now have such manda tory laws - Rhode Island for killing a prison guard, and Ohio for assassinating

One of the most touchy issues in such debate is capital purishment's use o a crime deterrent. The studies made of this question in the United States are not enclusive. As the Rhede Island law sug gests, one sticky point is the vulnerabil ity of prison guards who may be killed by a life-sentence prisoner in an escape attempt on the grounds that he canno lose anything in the absence of a death

It is likely that efforts will be made in some, perhaps many, states to rewrite laws to provide for this situation. However, 11 states have already abolished capital punishment, and four have so severely restricted its use as to have almade it obsolete. We would hope that in the forced reopening of the issue for public debate that such efforts would ioin those which have forsworn the prac-

From state o state, persons charged with the same rime have been given different punishnents, some getting prison sentences, others the death penalty. Nor has the death penalty been color blind. Book Publishers Worried By Demise of Talk Shows

By CYNTHIA LOWRY NEW YORK (AP) - Television, often accused of luring the public away from reading, really is one of the best friends lishers. Authors appear talk shows and discussion essions, contribute their expertise and in exchange plug

their books. But publishers are worried now because some of their best howcases are disappearing. David Frost quits at season's end. Dick Cavett may not survive beyond October. The book business is largely

concentrated in New York and Johnny Carson has moved to ready in California, doesn't use authors very often these days. A top program in most pub book is NBC's "Today

"Todays" book editor, Jane Murphy, estimates that three or four authors are interviewed

"Dick Cavett likes authors and almost every one enjoys appearing on 'The Mike Douglas Show' because they are treated well," said one publisher's representative. The other shows are good breaks for the book. But Frost or Carson often get so involved with earlier guests that the author doesn't get on the show after sitting offstage for hours.

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Jean Booth, in charge booking Doubleday authors on shows, recalls with a shudder a couple of nights when Thor Heverdahl and Jacques Yves Cousteau, both writers of stature, never made it to stage center after long waits. They were not amused

"Today's" Miss Murphy said that she has recently felt increased pressures from publishers to book their authors on the show and felt it was due to fewer outlets available in New

York. Miss Murphy depends on the help in picking authors who would be comfortable on teleas Dr. Margaret Mead, Jacqueline Susann and Dr. David Ruben who do very well as their own drum beaters.

With the network outlets diminishing in numbers, the publishers are trying to find some other way of reaching the public by broadcasting. One idea involves using local radio talk showa.

Democrats Plan ABC Telethon

A unique 181/2-hour entertainment telethon, presented by the Democratic National Committee to raise funds for the Democratic Party, will be presented live on ABC from Saturday at 10 p.m. to Sunday at 5 p.m., and again on Sunday from 8 to 9 p.m.

More than 100 popular personalities from the entertainment and sports field will appear on the telethon, either live from the Hollywood Palace in Los Angeles or from the Deauville Hotel in Miami Beach or in previously taped segments. These performers will serve as masters of ceremony of the show perform, or make brief appeals for funds.

The telethon has been described by the Democratic Party as an effort to "save the two-party system." The Democratic Party has said it is \$9,-300,000 in debt and will use the telethon to ask viewers for donations. The program will not represent an appeal for any particular political candidate, nor for all Democratic candidates.

Direct appeals for contributions will be interspersed in the 1814-hour entertainment special. The Democratic National Committee has established 32 regional telephone centers, employing 10,000 telephones, to which calls can be placed by the public.
