An Election Should Be Ordered Since there are few rules and precedents which haven't been violated, on every court level, somewhere during the ertanglement of Connecticut's legislative redistricting, the panel of federal judges now in control of the situation ought to consider themselves free agents, free even of their own past commitments. and proceed to do the nearest thing to something right

The nearest thing to something right is to have elections held this year for the Connecticut General Assembly,

And the only way to be sure that this can be accomplished, no matter how frantically one political party or the othor may maneuver, is to order the elecion held on the basis of the old, present state districting, as it makes up the General Assembly now in office

Not to hold any legislative elections at ill would be the greatest injustice and harm that could be done to the state. It would interrupt the normal course of political activity and change needlessly It would deprive the electorate of its chance to register its appraisal of the conduct, during the past year and a half, of the people sitting in the General Assembly and of the new Governo

Either of the two redistricting proposals now within the reach of the court represents an injustice and an injury to the state. The so-called Saden plan, which the federal judges disapproved, was a monstrosity in the way it carved up various communities. The Bork plan, which the court itself ordered prepared, does a more orderly task of drawing districts, but it makes an arbitrary, oneman decision reducing the number of seats in the Connecticut House, and the decision as to what the size of the Legislature is going to be should properly be the decision of both the Legislature itself and the people of the state.

The districting plan under which the present Legislature was elected had its statistical violations of proper one-mancne-vote percentages, but it was not unfair to either political party. As Governor Meskill himself has pointed out, if the vote for the party ticket in 1970 had been its consistent as was the vote for Governor, he would have had at least control of the Senate.

The best citizenship, the best law available, and the best politics all lie in having an election take place this year. Both parties should join in asking the federal judges to order it.


As Ivan Goes Home

The late John Foster Dulles, with his dullard notions of how to keep Egypt away from Russian influence, actually blundered Egypt into Russia's arms, and the past 16 years of history in the Near East has largely been based upon the existence of that Russian position.

Now, suddenly, the relationship which the Dulles policy forced upon Egypt seems to have been broken up, by President Sadat's order to Russia to withdraw its military advisers and experts. This nitiative, from Egypt, may reflect Egyptian disappointment that these advisers and experts haven't been accompanied by a much greater supply of Russian planes. But it may reflect, as well, the inevitable resentment which the people of any newly independent nation, or any independent nation, for that matter, develop toward any foreign presence which becomes too conspicuous.

When the "whys" for a development are this obscure and debatable, it is dangerous to hall the development itself as clear good news. One waits, in such a situation, to see if somebody is going to drop another shoe. But one thing can be noted. This is a surprise development, out of the blue, not predicted or anticipated by any foreign office or foreign policy experts anywhere, and it could conceivably the most dangerous pressures out of two confrontations in the Near East, the one the big power confrontation between the United States and Russia, the second the confrontation between Israel and the Arab states. One can tell how highly the Nixon Administration foreign policy managers value these possibilities by the way they refrain from trying to exploit the discomfiture being dealt to Russia. The ideal, perhaps, would be for everybody to lose enough influence in the Near East to let the Near East realize, at last, that it must make its own peace and live by it.

State Lottery On Daily Basis Drops in weekly ticket sales of disneartening proportions are causing a healthy transformation in the frilly and fanciful thinking that has characterized the State Gaming Commission's approach to the State lottery. The commission is now beginning to

realize that the fewer the trappings, the better the chances for the lottery to sustain player interest at a high level. The asic gaming impulse, after all, is a matter of "You pays your money, and you takes your chances."

Following a most sensible decision to drop the clumsily-structured, over-complicated "Little Acorn" and "Mighty quarterly drawings, the latest hought wave is to launch the State into a daily three-digit lottery operation, following the historic model of the syndicate-run numbers racket.

The move toward simplicity to encourage sales is applaudable. The proposal to move into a daily lottery draws mixed feelings. On the one hand, a daily lottery would

come closer to achieving that muchtouted goal, cutting into the illicit gambling take, more than anything Connecticut or any of the other states have so far tried with lotteries. A daily operation could be justified, and undoubtedly prove itself to be a substantial surce of revenue, if it did succeed in that direction. Misgivings occur, however, that the State may be overreaching itself in a

role that is dubious and ill-suited for a government, that of a major enrepreneur in gambling opportunities. There are deep reservations, too, over promotional activities on the part of the ommission that overexuberantly encourage the wage earner to risk hi money on a game of chance - too much enticement makes the State sound like a carnival barker luring the crowd to a



land (AP)-The Irish Re publican Army launched one of its heaviest bombing onslaughts on Northern reland's capital today. The British Broadcasting Corp. reported nine persons were known to be dead and up to injured in 18 explosions Belfast. Six persons were killed

in one blast alone. The bombs exploded within a half-hour in mid-afternoon, just as the city was at its busiest for weekend shopping.

All emergency services were put on full alert. Dozens of ambulances weaved through the traffic with sirens screaming Hundreds of British troops swarmed into the city center. fierce fires.

The guerrillas struck despite stringent traffic controls which have barred much of central Belfast to automobiles during the past week. A huge car bomb added to the devastation in the center of Londonderry, Northern Ireland's second largest city.

One of the first Belfast bombs exploded at a bus station within yards of the city's fire headquarters, normally a top security area. It went off inside the station, killing at least four civilians plus two soldiers who rushed there in re-

sponse to an alarm. The streets were littered with glass and debris and stained with blood. A acore of ambu lances converged on the sta-
