



We have, through various television documentaries, learned to admire the polar bear, for this strength, his agility, his magnificence in his own icescape, his part in the scheme of things as our universe has shaped itself through past

Remove all restrictions from public entertainment, and you insure that only what is artistically excellent will surrive, right? Wrong, it seems, as people connected with the theatre in New York

City have found to their cost. Authors, publishers, playwrights, producers, and actors have been in the vanguard of the movement which, under the ivil libertarian banner, has sought an end to all restraints on what is printed or performed. Pornography and obscenity re undefinable, these forces hold, and the courts have been pretty much of the same mind. Therefore any prohibitions or penalties would be unjustifiable. And there is no dirtier word in the language han censorship. Let freedom ring, and

Well, freedom has been ringing in New York's Times Square, and it has been wringing the theatre's neck. In that area pornography and obscenity have prolows. And all of a sudden the artistic ele-

It wants the city to take action to stop the degeneracy. The reason is that the legitimate theatre is hurting. Prospective customers are being driven away from the area because of the booming trade in utter filth. What was once—perhaps second only to London's West End—the prime theatre district in the world, has become a sewer, and is being shunned by people on whose pat-

ronage the theatre depends. So the artistic people want police action, and they want it right away. There are statutes, they say, which prohibit, kind of exhibitions which have made Times Square comparable to the worst stews in the waterfront areas of some Oriental cities. Let the police get busy

They are right, of course, in demanding a stop to the excess and outrage which are now the common thing in that part of the city. But what of the ridicule which their kind heaped on people who were concerned about their children's exposure to pornography and obscenity in books and magazines on display in neighborhood drug stores? These people were scorned as obscurantist and rypto-fascist. The argument was made that to allow control of any sort was to jeopardize intellectual freedom and facilitate the coming of a police state. Balderdash, of course, but self-righteously

In a related vein, Sunday's New York Times carried an article which denounced a new film as anti-Semitic. The writer said, "What makes me despondent over this dismal exercise (the film, not the article) is that those of us who fought long and hard against political and moralistic censorship are being rewarded not by the release of previously fettered creativity, but by an outpouring

"Moralistic censorship" is a term oaded with contempt. It is also loaded inaccuracy. Any attempt to persuade film makers to exercise social responsibility and refrain from resorting to indecency in order to exploit the young, impressionable, and vulnerable and to make a fast buck, was stiematized as censorship, which it certainly was not. And "moralistic" conveys the suggestion of puritanism, nervous-nellyism,

Cry "Moralistic censorship!" Thereby do away with intelligent and reasonable restraint on the irresponsible. And what do you get? "An outpouring of vulgarity"-and worse. Which was to be expected, but not by the naive who consider A few months ago in a certain airport

on the American mainland we observed that one of the two sections of the paperback book display was heavily patronized, while the other was almost deserted. The latter comprised books with the imprints of well known publishers, while the former was given over exclusively to hard core pornography put out by obscure, probably fly-by-night houses. 





their married life in a wagon house. It would seem to be quite possible in a bygone era, perhaps, but just nine years ago, the new Mr. and Mrs. James Kidney started out with one big empty space in what was originally a wagon house belonging to one of the Talcott families in Talcottville.

Mr. Kidney, who is a carpenter, designed the layout and built partitions from boards and beams which once were part of an old Talcott sawmill before it was torn down. The result is a charming setting for a young family. The wagon doorways have been filled in with siding and windows. Small window boxes brighten the front of the house with colorful flowers in summer. The front door opens into a large L-

shaped living-dining area. A section of sput-rail fence from an old cemetery marks a small entry with a colored flagstone floor. At one side of the entry is an old wagon seat which Mr. Kidney bought at an auction. His wife removed the horse-

hair upholstery (which she regrets having done as it spoils the antique value) and gave it a bright coat of paint. Mr. Kidney's paneled office off the living room (he has his own building business) has a cheery look with beetred print curtains. Mrs. Kidney shares her husband's office for her hobbies. At present she is working with stained

Mrs. Kidney has used family and local memoribilia in interesting ways. The lantern which hangs from an overhead beam was one her father carried on the back of his milk delivery wagon. Her father is Franklin G. Welles who owned and operated the Welles Farm. What

Mr. Welles converted a small antique stove into a lamp by welding pieces of bent pipe onto it as a wire guide. Mrs. Kidney finished it off with a stained glass shade which she made. Colored glass bottles on the window



Some old signs adorn some of the walls. One simply bears the date "1881." It came from one of the Talcott Brothers office buildings. Another unusual wall hanging is an owl on a background of red burlap. Mrs.

Kidney created the very real-looking owl from pine cone petals. The kitchen, completely equipped with ample cupboard and counter space, was outfitted from houses about to be torn

The children's room is shared by Bradford, 7, and Kristina, 3. It is carpeted in gold tweed and has matching cover-ing on one wall. Another wall is white brick and two walls are alive with such familiar figures as the Roadrunner running for his life, Linus with his blanket, Mighty Mouse, etc. Mrs. Kidney says originally she looked for decals. "But I figured I could paint them on just as well myself," she says, "and save some money besides." Her children suggested some of the cartoons and sayings. Red, white and blue striped bed spreads and matching drapes, and builtin shelves and work bench complete the children's bedroom. The brick walls of the master bed-
