



WASHINGTON, (AP) Democrats are expected to nominate Sargent Shriver as their new vice-presidential candidate tonight, amid growing predictions that he can help unify the party for the uphill struggle against President Nix-

Democratic National Committee members spoke warmly of Shriver, chosen by presidential candidate George McGovern as his new running mate, as they prepared to make the selection official during a 7:30 p.m. meeting.

But before taking up its main business, the DNC this afternoon must settle credentials challenges to members from five states. The DNC's Credentials Committee ruled on four of the challenges Monday and will hear a challenge to the New York delegation this morn-

arresting inflation. It is now down to about 3.5 per cent on an annual basis. It had been close to 6 per cent in 1970. Three and one-half per cent is considered a "moderate" rate these days but only because of the "galloping" inflation-6 per cent or more— that went before. It could be misleading.







Question Of Who Corrupts Whom Over in New York state, the Knapp Commission, after spending two years investigating police corruption in New mendation for a five year "war" against such corruption.

As one of its first strategies in such a war against corruption, it recommends the legalization of additional forms of gambling, beyond the lottery and the off-track betting already available.

The Knapp Commission's reason for

recommending the legalization of more gambling is almost brutally realistic. The Commission has figured it out that the way to have more honest cops is to essen the amount and variety of temp-Legalize more forms of gambling, and the police will have fewer anti-gambling laws to enforce, and will, therefore, encounter fewer efforts to bribe them out of their sworn duty. Carrying this principle out to the ridiculous extreme, we would legalize all crime and relieve the police of all law enforcement responsibiity and thus guarantee ourselves totally

against corruption. The assumption underlying such a recommendation of policy in New York state is that the people of that state are already so far gone in their addiction to everything should be dismissed as silly

and unnecessary. We doubt that this is so in New York. We have even greater doubt that it is valid in Connecticut, where the true philosophy of a state which goes into the gambling business for purposes of revenue has now begun to reveal itself. Here in Connecticut, we are not merely trying to serve those who would be gambling in one way or another, and il-

legally, even if there were no legalized state gambling. We are also, now that we as a state are in the operation, engaged in the still questionable business of inviting and teaching our own citizens how to gamble,

and how to gamble more. This is going to come into very clear focus when Connecticut enters the next phase of its legalization program, which will be, perhaps around the first of the year, the opening of off-track betting

If the state were to depend, for the success of its off track betting parlors, merely upon the custom of those Connecticut people who now place bets illegally through bookies, the state would probably go broke on the operation. What the state will need will be to have large numbers of Connecticut people who have never bet on a horse before learning how to do so, contracting the fever, and making it a daily habit.

One incidental result of this, as in New York, may be to make everything more honest, and less open to corruption, than it has been before.

But the first goal of the state's efforts has to be to corrupt, if we may use a word with which there would have been no quarrel a short moral era ago, the people of Connecticut into a gambling abit they didn't have before.

There is one common madness around the world. I is intended to terrify, and it does, for it makes us doubt ourselves as human

questions. One is whether we could become such mindless, motiveless killer animals ourselves. The second question is whether we, conceding we may be sane and safe from turning into senseless slaughterers, in ourselves or by proxies, possess any healing, positive power which can reach out into this world and heal it of its demons.

In the latest development, the National Cancer Institute has swarded \$44 million in construction grants to 17 U.S. medical-research institutions. Award of the grants, soon to

be announced formally, means the first time in almost a decade that the government has provided funds for construction work in the cancer field.
